WOODSTOCK AND VICINITY.

March 3.—The recent thaw has laid our roads nearly bare and all lumber operations will be suspended until more snow. The early breaking up of the roads means a heavy loss to local lumbermen.

Mr. Albert Fields who for many years was foreman of Hon. H. A. Connell's foundry has accepted a lucrative position at

Cabano, Quebec. Mr. Fields was the recipient of a costly imported spirit level and an address from his former workmen on leaving.

A spirited movement is now on foot among the physicians and clergymen of this town towards founding a hospital. The idea is well received by the citizens and a good many nice offers of pecuniary aid have been already received. A public meeting is to be held in the Opera House March 11th to give the matter more careful consideration.

Gallagher Bros. have sold their high bred trotting stallion, Baron Almatore, to a gentleman in Birmingham, N. Y. The tidy sum of \$2,000 was received by the owners.

The Department of Public Works at Ottawa have called for tenders, up until the 15th of March, for the erection of a very substantial stone and brick armoury, the plan of which is now to be seen in the Post Office. This building, when completed, will be an ornament to the town and a great boon to militiamen.

Major W. C. Good of the 10th Field Battery has received instructions to fire the salute at the opening of the local House next Thursday. The detachment will consist of two officers and 12 men, who will be quartered at the officers and soldiers barracks according to rank. They take 2 guns with them.

CAT AND DOG IN WILL CONTEST.

Heiress Objects to Paying \$120 a Year for Care of Two Pets.

A little white spaniel of nondescript origin and doubtful beauty and a stub-tailed black cat are the central figures of a will contest now pending in Paris, which promises not only unlimited humor but unlooked-for legal technicalities.

Miss Eliza Maudit felt that her life was approaching its close, and she desired to leave her chief treasures, a dog named Forlette and a cat called General, in good hands. So she summoned a worthy couple, Mr. and Mrs. Gerard, and charged them to carry the animals to their own dwelling and care for them.

She promised in consideration of their trouble that they should not be forgotten in her will. Miss Maudit being a lady of means, the good couple readily consented.

A little while after the lady died, and her lawyer summoned Mr. and Mrs. Gerard to hear the reading of a clause of her will. It ran as follows:

"I leave to my goddaughter, Paule de Roger, living with her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Coudry, Rue d'Angouleme, the total of all I possess, under the following conditions:

"She will be expected to pay an annual income of 600 francs to the person who takes care of my animals after my death. This income will be paid as long as these animals live.

"These are a little white female dog, smooth-haired, with a chestnut spot on the right side of the stomach, another chestnut spot on the right side of the head, and a third chestnut spot on the upper part of the tail; also a little black cat having half the tail cut off, and the right ear slit the breadth of a centimeter.

"Paule de Roger will under no circumstances have the right to take these animals, neither to choose guardians for them. She will only see that the animals are living."

Armed with a copy of this extract of the will the good couple Gerard presented themselves before Miss Roger to claim their income. There arose the difficulty. Miss Roger replied briefly:

"You took the cat and dog of my godmother, knowing the clause of the will that you show us. But who can prove that Miss Maudit has chosen you to care for these animals. Besides, this legacy is null and void, it being left to a person not named. I owe you nothing."

The Gerards at once entered suit. The fate of Forlette and General hangs upon the issue.—New York World.

A JUVENILE RECEPTION.

Governor Snowball Addressed by Chatham Children—His Honor's Reply.

Governor and Mrs. Snowball visited the Chatham Grammar school Saturday and were given a very hearty welcome, the pupils presenting His Honor with a nicely worded address.

In reply among other things the Governor said: It moved him, to be so kindly received by so many of the youth of the town, those on whose shoulders the government would soon fall. He accepted the address as expressive of their devotion to the institutions of the country, and their loyalty to its rulers.

His Honor referred to the changes that had taken place in Chatham since he landed there from a sailing vessel, many years ago, and first set foot in Canada's shipyard, where his own mill

is now located, and where the hum of the saw and the steam hammer has succeeded the sound of the axe and creaking iron. The owner of the vessel, named Bartlett, was accompanied by his son, and that son has since been seeking to discover the North Pole while he (Mr. Snowball) had been achieving the Lt. Governorship.

He hoped the children would greet him in the streets, as their smiles would cheer him on and encourage him. He was sorry to say that he would have to reside for a part of the time away from the Miramichi, but he would never forget its beauties; it would remain dear to his heart. His gubernatorial flag had been first flown over his residence in Chatham and he would spend a large part of his time there. He returned thanks for Mrs. Snowball, who was as warmhearted as he, and fully appreciated their kindness, and thanked all from the bottom of his heart.

The children applauded loudly, and God Save the King was sung.

The pupils, to the number of seven or eight hundred, filed past, and the Governor and Mrs. Snowball shook hands with each of them.
