THE VERDICT.

It is not putting it too strongly to say that most people who followed closely the proceedings of the Doherty murder trial in St. John, anticipated a disagreement of the jury, and the prompt conviction of Higgins as the perpetrator of the crime came as a surprise. There was probably a very strong belief in the public mind that Higgins did the shooting, but it was shaken somewhat by the prisoner's apparently straight forward story, charging Goodspeed with the murder. The verdict, however, has not given any shock to the public conscience, nor will the jury's recommendation for mercy to the convict meet with much opposition.

The trial throughout has been a remarkable one and has aroused intense interest all over the province and far outside of its bounds. The excessive brutality of the murder, the youth of the victim and of those charged with the crime, and all the circumstances surrounding the misguided youths who were mixed up in the fair, served to command the painful interest of the people.

Neither friend nor foe has reason to complain of the manner in which the trial was conducted by judge, counsel and jury. The efforts of Mr. Mullin on behalf of the prisoner were powerful and untiring, while Hon. Mr. McKeown presented the case for the crown in a singularly able and effective manner, without unnecessary harshness, but with fidelity to the trust reposed in him as an advocate of the state in its duty of protecting society and vindicating the law. Mr. McKeown's address to the jury was certainly a master-piece of eloquent and clear presentation of facts from the standpoint of the prosecution, and has immensely increased his reputation as a keen, energetic and successful criminal lawyer, and an eloquent and effective public speaker.

Must credit is also given Judge Landry for the dignified manner in which he presided at the trial, and for his clear, clean cut dissection of the evidence and presentation of the law in his charge to the jury. The jurymen had a difficult task to perform in arriving at a proper verdict from the tangled mass of evidence heaped up before them, but their decision was no doubt given after full consideration of the facts, and a sense of the responsibility of their position.

THE TELEGRAPH'S NEW EDITOR.

The Telegraph is now in the editorial charge of Mr. Ernest W. McCready, and the management of that paper is to be congratulated on securing his services. Mr. McCready is a son of Mr. J. E. B. McCready, editor of the Charlottetown Guardian, and a graduate of the University of New Brunswick. He started journalistic work as a reporter on the Telegraph, and afterwards served with the Boston Post and New York Herald. During the Spanish-American war he was one of the New York Herald's representatives at the seat of the conflict and did excellent work for that great journal. Mr. McCready while absent from this province for some years, kept in touch with his old friends in New Brunswick and with the political and other conditions of Canada, and will be able to pilot the Telegraph through the mazes of discussion, political and otherwise, which is necessary in the conduct of so prominent and influential a newspaper.

With a liberal education, valuable journalistic experience, youth and energy, the Telegraph's editor is well equipped for his new duties, and the Telegraph should advance more rapidly than ever

in the public confidence and esteem. Its news service, make-up and general appearance are not approached by any of the maritime province newspapers, and its editorial department under Mr. McCready's guidance will no doubt be as strong as any feature of the paper.

The Herald bids Mr. McCready a cordial welcome on his return to his native province to labor in the interesting and influential field of journalism.

The Moncton Times admits the government party in Restigouche has gained a strong man in Mr. McLatchey. They have also lost a weak man in the defection of Mr. Mott, so that the net loss is up against Mr. Hazen.

THE QUARANTINE CASE.

Dr. Morris of St. John Now on the Stand.

The Penniac quarantine case was resumed at the police court this morning, when Dr. T. E. Morris, the St. John smallpox expert, was called to the stand. Examined by Mr. McLellan, the witness said he lived in St. John, and was a medical practitioner. He was the health officer to the Board of Health of St. John during the late smallpox outbreak there. He diagnosed all the cases except a few in the public hospital. There were 21 deaths out of 105 cases. He knew Dr. Fisher, Secretary of the Provincial Board of Health. Saw four cases at Marysville on August 11th last. He remembered Mrs. Manzer and an old man in the same house whom he understood was her husband. Also saw two other cases near Marysville in a family named Collins. One was sick and the other approaching convalescence. Examined Mrs. Manzer and found her suffering from smallpox. She was in the pastures stage, which is the third stage of the disease, when witness saw her. This afternoon Dr. Morris is being subjected to a tedious cross examination at the hands of O. S. Crockett.

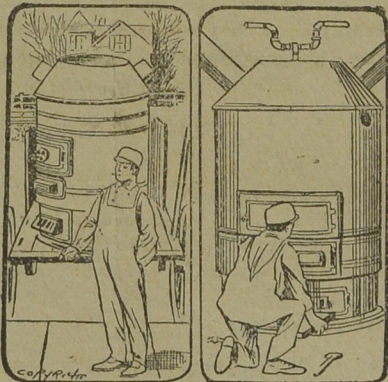

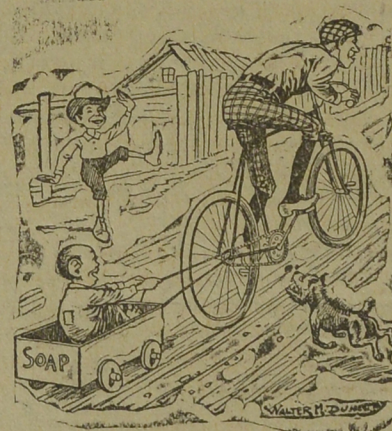

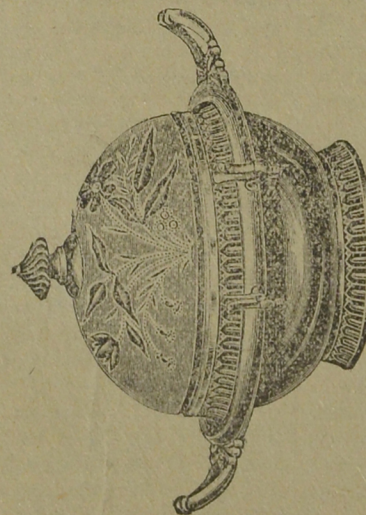
