

MOCK PARLIAMENT

House Opened With Elaborate Ceremony

BY GOVERNOR GENERAL LEGERE

Who Was Attended by a Brilliant Military Staff.

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE—DEBATE ON THE ADDRESS.

The University mock parliament had a more successful opening than usual Saturday evening. The large library was crowded to the doors, and even standing room was at a premium.

Promptly at eight o'clock His Excellency Governor Legere accompanied by his private secretary Mr. Massie, and his aide-de-camp Major Perley, of the Andover Dragoons, and Lt. Col. Howe of the Stanley Wood Rangers, entered the room. He was accompanied by a large and brilliant guard in charge of Major George Howie of the 71st York Co. Light Infantry. The members were Major Fenwick, of the Apahqui Micmac Regiment; Capt Baskin, Sand Point Engineers; Capt Jordan, Winter Port Artillery; Capt Grimmer, Charlotte Co Rangers; Lieut Bedell, Carleton Co Heavy Infantry; Capt Ryan, Royal Normal Artillery; Lieut Murphy, Victoria Co Light Infantry; Lieut Golding, Marysville Rough Riders; Lieut Miles, Mangerville and Otnabag Cadets; Lieut Whitehead, Fredericton Mounted Infantry.

The speech of His Excellency contained much interesting matter pertaining to the welfare of the country at large and the University in particular. His Excellency was decorated with the different badges of his office and carried out his part with the dignity befitting his office.

Mr J G Sippell in moving the reply to the address, spoke at some length upon the various measures suggested in the speech. He discussed the Duke and Duchess' visit to Canada, also the construction of a new gymnasium at the U. N. B., and dwelt some time upon the sending of the products of U.N.B. "Ladies cooking" school to South Africa. The address was ably seconded by J D McCarthy. Mr. Martin of the opposition was greeted with great applause, even the young ladies seemed forgetful of their position as spectators in the gallery and lent their aid in a very hearty manner. He spoke some time upon the position of the opposition and also severely censured two former conservatives who had found their way to the other side of the house.

Mr. McKenzie, leader of the government, spoke to some length upon the prosperity of Canada under Liberal rule. He took up the matter of the census showing them to be very satisfactory. Also spoke to some length upon the successful visit of Prince and Princess of Wales, he discussed the plans of Marconi and the government's attitude towards him. His closing remarks were devoted to imperialism, showing the great advances made toward promoting that imperial spirit now becoming so strong a factor in colonial politics.

POLICE COURT.

Warrants to be Issued for Witnesses in the Hudlon Case.

There was an unusually large crowd of spectators present at the police court this morning when Col. Marsh took his seat upon the bench. The notorious ragamuffin, Charles Hudlon, who was remanded from last week, was the centre of attraction, but he was not alone in the dock. Two tough looking Indians, Simon Sacobi and Michael Sapier, arrested by Policemen Rideout and O'Neill, for being drunk and creating a disturbance on the St. Mary's reserve Saturday night, were there to keep him company. Indian Commissioner Farrell, who was present to prosecute the case against the red men, asked for an adjournment until Wednesday, so that he might have a chance to find out where they obtained the fire water, and his request was granted by the police magistrate.

The case against Hudlon, who is charged with soliciting alms from house to house without authority from a clergyman or a justice of the peace, was next called. Hudlon started in to explain matters, claiming that he had never begged in his life, and had to be squelched by the police magistrate. Three citizens, who had been subpoenaed to attend and give evidence against him, failed to appear, and His Honor remarked that he would proceed to issue warrants to compel their attendance. He intimated that if Hudlon was found guilty of the charge preferred against him, it was his intention

to deal with him in such a manner that he would not be able to trouble the citizens of Fredericton for some time to come. He was going to probe the matter to the bottom, and wanted the evidence of those people who lodged the complaints. Hudlon was accordingly remanded until Wednesday morning at eleven o'clock.

The names of two Sunday night drunks were called by Sergeant Phillips and each forfeited a deposit of \$8.
