DEATHS AND BURIALS.

Mrs. Green's Sudden Demise at Boston—
Remains of Rev. Donald Bliss and
Henry Maxwell Laid to Rest.

Mrs. Baird wife of Alex. W. Baird,
a well known St. John barrister, died at
Boston Saturday, whither she had gone a
week previous for surgical treatment.
Deceased was formerly Miss Roop, and
one of her daughters is Mrs. Frank B.
Ellis of St. John.

Mrs. Samuel Green, sister of T. E.
Babbitt, Gibson, died suddenly at Hyde
Park, Boston on Saturday of heart disease.
She was 60 years old and leaves a hus-
band four daughters and two sons.

The remains of Henry Maxwell, St.
John's oldest citizen and father of James
Maxwell, of this city, were interred at St.
John Saturday. Services were held at
Queen's Square Methodist church by Rev.
Mr. Weddall, Rev. George Steele and
Rev. G. M. Campbell, and interment
was made at Fernhill cemetery. Among
the mourners was Judge Burbridge, of
Ottawa, son-in-law of the deceased.

The funeral of the late Rev. Donald
Bliss, brother of Mrs. G. G. Roberts of
this city, took place Saturday at Mount
Whatly, Westmorland Co. The services
were conducted by Bishop Kingdon, Rev.
C. Wiggins, Sackville, and Rev Mr Quinn,
curate of St. Mark's; other clergymen,
men present were Rev. R. Campbell,
Dorchester; Rev A J Creswell, Amherst;
Rev R Marshall, (Methodist), Point De
Bute, and Rev. Mr. Hooper of Prince
William son-in-law of deceased. In the
congregation were many who had sat un-
der his ministry for 50 years.

DEATH OF T. B. DUNPHY.

An Aged Resident of Kingsclear, Called
Away Quite Suddenly.

The death occurred at Kingsclear, on
Saturday night after a few days illness of
heart failure, of Thomas B. Dunphy, one
of the oldest and best known resi-
dents of that locality. He was in
his 76th year and is survived
by a family of two sons and two daugh-
ters. The children are Austin, foreman
of the Herald office, Tyler of St. John,
Mrs E. L. Miller of St. Paul, Minn., and
Mrs Charles Herrin of Roxbury, Mass.
He also leaves one brother, George Dun-
phy of Douglas, and three sisters, Mrs.
Jacob Barker of this city, Mrs. Thomas
Wheeler of Marysville and Mrs. Douglas
Manzer of St. Mary's.

The late Mr. Dunphy, in the old days,
when travel was mostly done by stage
coaches, conducted a popular hotel at
Springhill, and was a man of considerable
prominence in that locality. Springhill
was then in its palmy days as a lumber
and meeting centre, and Mr. Dunphy's
hostelry was one of the best known and
most liberally patronized in the country.
In addition to his hotel business Mr.
Dunphy was a contractor for carrying Her
Majesty's mails over several routes lead-
ing to and from Fredericton, discharging
his duties in a satisfactory manner. He
took an active interest in public affairs,
and for a number of years sat at the
municipal council board as one of the
representatives of the parish of Kings-
clear. Mr. Dunphy was for a time a
resident of Fredericton, but of late years
has made his home at Springhill. He
had many old friends in different parts
of the province who will learn of his death
with much regret.

The funeral took place this morning at
eleven o'clock and was largely attended.
The services were conducted by Rev. G.
B. Payson, after which the remains were
taken to Douglas and interred in the
Pickard burying ground. Undertaker
John G. Adams had charge of the ar-
rangements.

THE HOUSE OPENING.

Preparations for the Event Have Been
Commenced.

The fourth session of the present pro-
vincial parliament will be formally open-
ed at 2.30 o'clock on the afternoon of
Thursday, March 6th, by His Honor
Lieutenant Governor Snowball. The
guard of honor will be furnished by No.
4 Company of the R. C. R. and it is quite
likely that a salute will be fired by a de-
tachment from the Woodstock Field
Battery.

The Lieutenant Governor and Mrs.
Snowball will hold a reception in the as-
sembly chamber from 4.30 to 6 o'clock
on the afternoon of the opening, and in
the evening there will be a state dinner
at the Queen Hotel.

A force of women started work this
morning scrubbing the corridors and
cleaning up the interior of the parliament
building.

The Lieutenant Governor has ordered
a Windsor uniform from London, and ex-
pects to have it here in time to wear at
the opening.
