Beef Tea.

It is the suggestion of a trained nurse,

fire perhaps two minutes on each side,
after which it is cut up into small

FARM PESTS.

Why Farmers Should Take an Interest in
Insect Life.

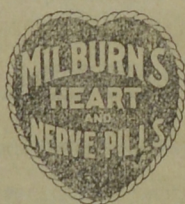
(1) Farming has come to be a pro-
fession, and in these days of small
margins, in many cases knowledge or
ignorance of methods of checking the
growth of insect pests means
success or failure. An up-to-date
farmer will do everything in his pow-
er to prevent a great loss which can
be checked by proper methods. This
special knowledge is not difficult to
acquire, for the Departments of Ag-
riculture in both the Provinces and
the Dominion are only too pleased to
assist the farmer who wants assist-
ance. Timely bulletins are distribut-
ed liberally, and the Farmers' In-
stitutes bring specialists directly
into contact with the person needing
help.

(2) There are beneficial as well as
injurious insects. While the farmer
may take full advantage of the lib-
erality of the Governments, he
should be familiar with both the
common noxious and beneficial in-
sects in order to obtain the best re-
sults of his work. He would be fool-
ish indeed to destroy every insect
that came in his way, for there are
many valuable insects which prey up-
on other injurious insects. Contrary
to popular belief, the number of in-
sects which are decidedly injurious
to the farmer is very small compared
with the total number which is to
be found in any given locality.

(3) It is a well known fact that in-
sects are perhaps the most important
agent in the cross-fertilization of
plants. As a rule flowers that are
colored have an odor, are fertilized
by insects, such as bees, wasps, flies,
moths and beetles, and many are the
special contrivances by which plants
secure a transfer of pollen from one
plant to another by means of in-
sects. Our clover seed crop is se-
cured by insects; the example furn-
ished Darwin with this notable illus-
tration of the inter-relationship of
plants and animals, when he stated
that the amount of wild honey is de-
pendent upon the number of cats
kept about a farmhouse.

(4) Recent studies have shown that
the "pollen supply is the most im-
portant factor in the production of
large and symmetrical fruits." The
pulp of the strawberry is scanty
where the achenes or pits fail to ap-
pear on account of non-fertilization.
Apples and tomatoes become lopsided
and irregular when some of the
carpels fail to develop seeds. Bunches
of grapes, too, have been found to
be larger when fertilized than when
unfertilized.

Again, when more pollen has been
applied than is necessary for com-
plete fertilization, very often very
large fruits result. "It is now be-
lieved that pollen often exerts sec-
ondary influence in stimulating the
development of the pericarp;" and
most pollen is conveyed by insects.—
Co-Operative Dairyman.
