TIED IN HIS CHAIR.

Michael Sweeney, Signal Operator. Robbed, Beaten and Burned to Death Near Girard, O.

Youngstown, O., Feb. 4.—Robbers attacked Michael Sweeney, who was in charge of a signal tower on the Pittsburg & Western road, near Girard, O early this morning, and after binding him, went through his pockets, taking his pay that he received yesterday, and then set fire to the shanty. His body was discovered by trainmen shortly after the fire had started and was removed from the ruins with great difficulty.

The positive facts, aside from the fire and fatality, are of a meager character, but circumstances go to show that Sweeney was a victim of foul play. Detective Fowler of Youngstown is working on the case, and it is said he has a good clew to the murderers.

When an engineer and fireman broke in the door of the shanty, after discovering the place was on fire, they found Sweeney bound tightly with telegraph wire in his chair, but he was dead. They were badly burned in getting Sweeney's body out. Sweeney came to Girard from Columbus, O., a few weeks ago. He was single.

KIPLING ON THE WAR.

He is Afraid That at the Eleventh Hour Great Britain Will Too Lenient With the Rebels.

London, Feb. 4.—The Times publishes extracts from a private letter which Sir William Gower has just received from Rudyard Kipling. The letter was written at Cape Town, and is in part as follows:

"Things are going forward well in the country as regards the war. Our only fear is the old one that England at the eleventh hour will declare an amnesty for Colonial rebels, and thereby let in men who have been shooting, burning and horse-stealing for the last eleven or twelve months to legislate for the loyalists. So far as one can judge from the almost inconceivable levity of Lord Rosebery and Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, the Liberal party is quite prepared to give that amnesty. One gets so weary, so ashamed of one's motherland when one leaves it. I do wish you could make some moderately sane politician; I don't say statesman, because they seem as dead as dodo, to understand that the question of amnesty to rebels is not only life or death to the Colony, but will mean, if persisted in, the severest blow to the Colonies' trust in England (I speak too of Australia, Canada, etc.) ever administered."

NINTH FROM NEW ZEALAND.

Another Contingent Being Raised.

London, Feb. 4.—Despatches from Wellington, New Zealand, and Melbourne, Australia, announce that in compliance with a telegram from Mr. Chamberlain intimating that the Imperial Government would be glad of an additional 1,000 New Zealanders for service in South Africa, New Zealand is sending her ninth contingent. There will be no difficulty in raising them, seeing about 3,000 more than were required volunteered for the eighth contingent.

Mr. Chamberlain has also intimated to the Australian Government that the Imperial Government would be glad to avail itself of the services of an additional Australian contingent of 1,000 men.

A Sydney, N. S. W., despatch says:—Hundreds of surplus volunteers for the new Federal contingent are receiving emigrants' permits for South Africa, encouraged by a message from Lord Kitchener and intending to enlist in irregular corps, preferably in Tullibardine's Horse.

Three hundred Boer prisoners at Bermuda have expressed their willingness to take the oath of allegiance and return to South Africa in order to lend their aid in putting an end to the war.

TAME FISH IN A RIVER.

A Traveler's Story of What He Saw In Upper Burma.

When in camp the other day, I was riding through a village when the village headman asked me if I would like to see "the fish." I, not knowing what the headman meant, at once went with him down to the banks of the stream, followed by several villagers with baskets of seshanum and paddy mixed together. Then the thuggi called "Lay, lay, lay, lay," for a few moments, when, lo and behold, a large herd of ngatwe, or big, short, flatfish fish, came up just under our feet and were promptly fed by the Burmans.

The fish were amazingly tame and tolerated being stroked and petted even by me. There were in all about thirty-three of them, varying in size from eighteen inches to three and a half feet long, the larger ones having a girth at the gills of about thirty inches. They would go away and come back whenever they were called.

The villagers told me—and I see no reason to doubt what they say—that these same fish come up against the monsoon flood at the end of June and go away about October every year. They can recognize individual fish by marks, scars, etc., which they pointed out to me.

The Mon is nearly dry in the cold and end of the hot weather, and the fact that these fish return to this one village landing stage every year regularly and never go to any other is quite worthy of remark. A villager who kills any of them has to undergo a penalty of 10 shillings by common consent, and great care is in consequence taken of them.

The ngatwe of upper Burma is a very short, thick fish, tapering rapidly from behind the gills to the tail, has long feelers on both upper and lower lip and has no noticeable teeth. He makes very good eating and has but few bones. I have often heard of tame fish in tanks, but a herd of tame fish in a monsoon river connected with the great Irrawadi is a very bizarre phenomenon.

ATTACKED BY A HERON.

Boy Tries to Capture the Bird and Nearly Loses His Life.

"I've hunted everything from gray squirrels to grizzlies," said a veteran Philadelphia sportsman to a writer in the New York Times, "and the nearest I ever came to being seriously injured by any sort of game was one time when a wounded bird attacked and tried to kill me.

"I was a boy then and went down to a creek that flowed through my father's farm to watch for a mink. It was early in the evening and a blue heron came and sat within tempting gunshot. I knew it would spoil my chances at mink to shoot the bird, and I didn't intend to do it, but, kidlike, I raised the gun and took aim just to see how I could kill it if I would. I lowered the gun and then raised it again. Every time I raised it I would touch the trigger gently. After awhile I touched it too hard, the gun went off and I started toward the heron, which was wounded.

"I thought it would be a good scheme to catch the bird and started to do so when its bill shot out like a sledge hammer and struck me between the eyes. When I came to my senses, it was dark, and it was several minutes longer before I could remember where I was or what had happened. A little harder and the bird would have killed me. I shudder even yet when I think what would have been the result if the bill had struck one of my eyes."
