THE DEAN AND HIS PUPILS.

The St. Andrew's Beacon republishes an extract from the Standard, of that town, issue of Dec. 1872, giving an account of the Christmas examination of the St. Andrew's Grammar school. Rev. Dean Partridge was then principal of that institution, and among the clever boys who won prizes were Mr. Geo. J. Clarke, editor of the St. Stephen's Courier, and Mr. Carl Ketchum, late editor of the Woodstock Press. Both of these gentlemen are now lawyers. Mr. Clarke cleaned out all his fellow pupils in mathematics, and he has not lost his knowledge of how to juggle with figures. It was only the other day that the Courier was able to predict a majority for Mr. Hazen in the coming elections. Master Clarke also received, by the unanimous vote of the school, a big silver dollar for being the best behaved pupil, and it is said that he still wears it suspended around his neck by a delicate cord.

We have no doubt the Dean, then plain Mr. Partridge, gave Clarke and Ketchum the groundwork of a liberal education, but they both grew up Tories, and persist in following that heresy. However they profited by their teacher's excellent moral precepts and example, and are known in their respective communities as gentlemen of deep religious convictions.

The pupils were not the only prize winners at that Christmas examination at St. Andrews. The account reads:

"After the presentation of prizes was got through, two of the pupils, Masters Clarke and Drury, advanced to the directors' table, bearing in their hands a beautiful papier mache writing case and work box. Master Clarke, turning to Mr. Partridge, read from a paper in his hand a very neat address, in which was expressed regret that Mr. Partridge's connection with the school, as a teacher, was about to terminate, and best wishes for Mr. and Mrs. Partridge's health and happiness, and requesting Mr. P's acceptance from the scholars of the writing desk."

It was shortly after this that Mr. Partridge entered the Anglican ministry in which he has become such a bright ornament and useful force.

SETTLED IN CANADA.

The success of the Liberal government's immigration policy needs no elaboration. The official figures showing the great rush of settlers into Canada, tell their own story.

During the past eleven months the total arrivals of new settlers was 80,479. Of these more than 56,000 located in Manitoba and the Northern Territories and 24,000 in Eastern Canada.

There was a movement of population from eastern Canada to the west amounting to 24,300, which makes the total number of people locating in Manitoba and the territories for these eleven months, 70,300.

The number from the United States reported as having settled in western Canada in the 11 months of the present year is 31,489. For the same 11 months the free homestead entries were 21,000. In the number of homestead entries the increase has been about two and a half times more than last year.

THE FREEMAN'S SUSPENSION.

The St. John Freeman, a newspaper established at St. John three years ago

by the late W. K. Reynolds, announces that after Saturday next it will cease to exist, because its "pocket book is empty."

The Freeman was started as a Roman Catholic organ, and under Mr. Reynolds' management it was a bright, interesting and useful publication, but some politicians apparently secured control of the paper and introduced more politics than religion into its columns. The Freeman soon became an active partizan, ripping the Liberals and local government in almost every issue, and thereby alienating many of its old friends. Perhaps its suspension is a result of that course, which was much to be regretted in a professed religious newspaper.

The Monitor, another Roman Catholic newspaper, founded shortly before the Freeman, has carefully avoided meddling in politics, and under Mr. O'Brien's management has devoted its columns to the purpose for which it was started, and is seemingly prosperous and respected.

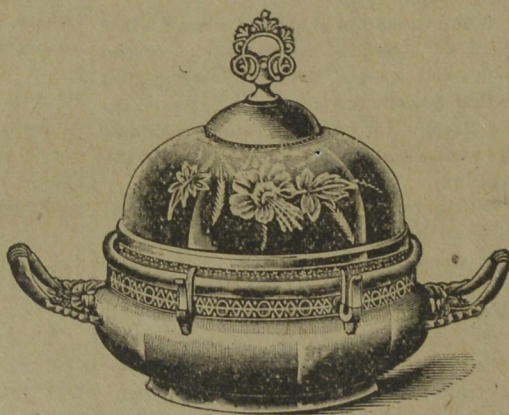

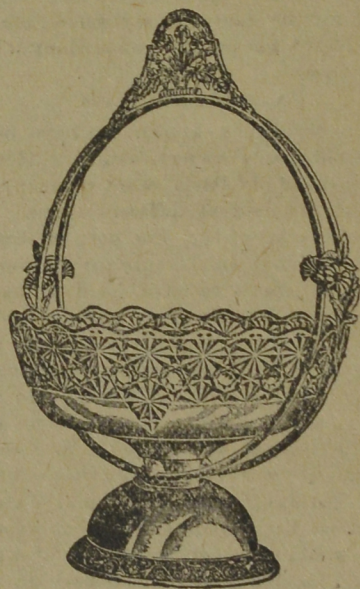
