

CALL WAS SUDDEN.

Marysville Shocked by the Unexpected Death of Chas. Dennison.

WHO PASSED AWAY AT HIS HOME EARLY THIS MORNING.

Under Rather Peculiar Circumstances.

AN INQUEST MAY BE HELD TO DETERMINE THE CAUSE OF HIS DEMISE.

Charles Dennison of Marysville, died last night under circumstances which have excited more or less comment. He was an employe of Gibson's grocery store and was at work yesterday in apparently his usual health. About eleven o'clock at night or shortly after, Dr. McNally was summoned to his home and found the man in an unconscious state and he inferred that Dennison had been drinking quite heavily. The doctor found his heart all right, but expressed a possibility of complications or a hemorrhage. He did not prescribe or give him any medicine. A little after midnight, Dr. McNally having returned to the city, the patient took a turn for the worse and Dr. Fisher was summoned, but before he arrived the man had died.

Another report says Mr. Dennison had taken but a single glass of liquor during the evening and that was after he had returned to his home shortly before eleven o'clock. Immediately afterwards he took to vomiting, and the opinion has been expressed that possibly he may have ruptured a blood-vessel in his head. The liquor he drank was taken from a flask which Dr. Fisher now has in his possession.

Coroner Mullin of St. Marys, visited Marysville this afternoon to see if the circumstances are such as to warrant him in holding an inquest.

The unfortunate man was about 55 years of age and is survived by a widow, his second wife, and family of seven children.

Funeral tomorrow at two o'clock. John G. Adams, undertaker.

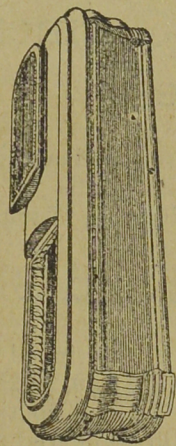
Fall Overcoats.

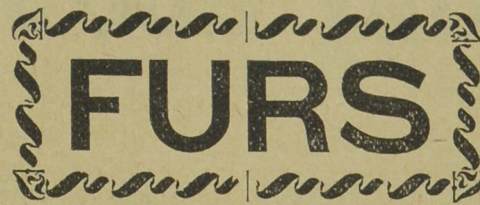

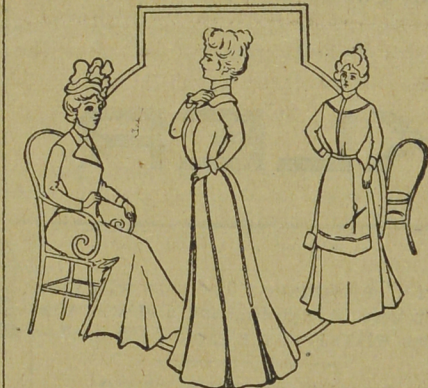
