THE METHODIST CELEBRATION.

The Herald makes no apology for the strong Methodist cast, which its columns present to-day. The good, enthusiastic people of that denomination are in the midst of a celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the erection of their present church edifice in this city, and all denominations are rejoicing with them in the event. When the fire of 1850 swept a large portion of the city into oblivion, the Methodist church was among the buildings destroyed, and the congregation was placed in discouraging conditions. However they were not dismayed, and two years later a newer and better church was completed and dedicated to the service of God, and this is the event which is now being so successfully celebrated. The practical end of the celebration is to raise sufficient funds to wipe off a small floating indebtedness largely incurred through recent repairs to the church, and in this enterprise success seems assured. Rev. Mr. Rogers, the pastor, was able to announce Sunday that already fifteen members of the church had subscribed \$100 each to the fund, and that \$500 more is in sight.

The congregation are much pleased to have with them several former pastors of the church, including the veteran Rev. G. O. Huestis, Rev. Wm. Dobson, Rev. R. W. Weddall, Rev. Dr. Chapman and Rev. J. J. Teasdale, and these gentlemen have been given prominent places in the celebration exercises. On Sunday Mr. Weddall and Mr. Dobson preached eloquent sermons to large congregations, including many representatives from other churches.

The Herald congratulates our Methodist friends on the great success of their celebration, and trusts that the financial problem involved in the affair may be solved to their entire satisfaction.

The Sun is panic stricken at the prospect of the local elections being run on federal party lines, and no doubt faithfully reflects Mr. Hazen's condition. TWENTY-EIGHT DEAD.

Passenger's Story of the Awful Grand Trunk Railway Disaster.

Montreal, Dec. 28.—The latest returns from the accident on the Grand Trunk railway at Wanstead, Friday night, give the number of dead as 28 and injured 41. Wanstead is on the Sarnia branch of the Grand Trunk and here occurred a terrible head-on collision between No. 5 Pacific express from New York to Chicago and an east bound freight.

One of the passengers described the accident as follows:

"We were running about 40 miles an hour when, without the slightest warning, the two trains met with terrific force. The two engines were hurled into the ditch. The baggage car was thrown on top of the first class coach, instantly killing a great many passengers and pinning down about 50 others in the debris. The screams, moans and prayers of the injured were heartrending. One poor woman begged that her child might be saved as she was dying. The little thing was carefully taken from the wreck and will likely recover. The mother was afterwards released and taken to another car, but only to die in a few minutes. One woman died singing Nearer My God to Thee, while another died in her husband's arms singing Jesus Lover of My Soul.
