

SUDDEN DEATHS

Three Old and Well Known Citizens Called Away.

ISAAC SMITH, WM. CRAIG AND JOHN DOHERTY.

Two Last Named Died Suddenly from Heart Failure.

Isaac Smith.

Death has removed from our midst three well known citizens since Saturday and in the case of two of them the call was very sudden and unexpected.

Isaac Smith, who has for a number of years carried on a trucking business here, died at three o'clock Sunday afternoon, after an illness from typhoid fever extending over a period of three weeks. He was 69 years of age and is survived by a sorrowing widow and family of five sons and two daughters. The children are Hiram traveller for T. McAvity & Sons, St. John, Hartley, brakeman on the C. P. R. Jacob of Aroostook, Maine, Harold employed at the Globe Laundry, Wellesley, of Gibson, Mrs. Edward Everett of St. John, and Miss Dora Smith at home. Peleg Smith of this city, and J. S. Smith, grocer, of St. John, are brothers, and P. D. McKenzie and Thomas W. Smith of this city, are consins of the deceased. Mr. Smith was a native of Hampstead, Queens County, but has made his home here for many years. The funeral will take place tomorrow at 2.30 p. m. with services by Rev. F. C. Hartley. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

William Craig.

William Craig passed away very suddenly at his home on George street at an early hour this morning. He had been a sufferer from heart trouble for some time, but was able to attend to his work and was about yesterday as usual. He was taken ill shortly before four o'clock, and his wife being awakened by a gurgling sound, which emanated from his throat, spoke to him but got no reply. A few moments later he ceased to breathe. The deceased was 69 years of age, and leaves besides a wife a family of three daughters: Mrs. Joseph Baxter of Westfield, Mrs. Newton Jarvis and Miss Martha Craig of this city. Mrs. John DeLong of Kingsley and Mrs. Thomas Craig of Royal Road are his sisters. Mr. Craig, was at one time caretaker of the old burying ground, and also for some years held the position of verger of St. Ann's church. Of late years he has worked as a laborer about the city. The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon, with Undertaker George W. Adams in charge of the arrangements.

John Doherty.

The awfully sudden death occurred this forenoon of John Doherty, the well known truckman, who for many years resided on College road. He had driven his team into the yard at Moore's marble works, and got off the sled

to pick up a board, when he was seen to stagger forward and fall. Several persons who chanced to be near by at the time, ran to his assistance, only to make the shocking discovery that his soul had taken its flight. Undertaker John G. Adams was telephoned for and had the body removed to the residence of his son-in-law George F. Wilkes, where the deceased has been spending the winter. Heart trouble was undoubtedly the cause of his demise.

The late Mr. Doherty was a native of the north of Ireland, and was seventy-five years of age. He is survived by a widow and one son, Hugh Doherty, of Risteen's factory, and four daughters, Mrs. George F. Wilkes, Mrs. Johnson McKenzie, Mrs. J. M. Torrance, of this city, and Mrs. Utton, of Carleton, St. John. The funeral will take place from Mr. Wilkes' residence on Wednesday afternoon at three o'clock, with services at the Cathedral. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

Daniel W. Clark.

Daniel W. Clark of St. John, West end, died Saturday, aged 85 years. He was well known as a contractor, and was the founder of the Free Baptist church at Carleton. Deceased was the maternal grandfather of Rev. F. C. Hartley of this city.

MURDER WILL OUT.

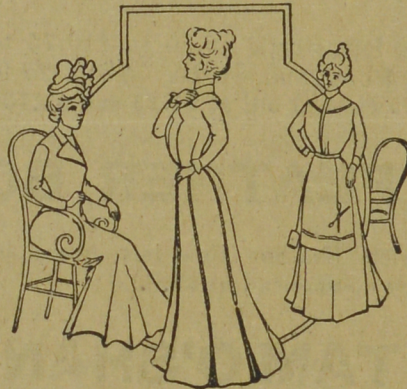
