YOUNG LADY'S DEATH.

Deceased Well Known to Many in Fredericton.

A despatch to the Herald from St John announces the death of Miss Trixie Lockhart, daughter of Mr. W. A. Lockhart, Collector of Customs. The sad event occurred this morning, and death was due to typhoid fever, from which the young lady had been suffering for nearly a month.

Miss Lockhart, who was a bright, winsome young lady of some twenty years, was a frequent visitor among her friends in Fredericton, and when last here was the guest of Mrs. R. P. Foster, St. John street. She was a great favorite, and the news of her death is heard with sincere sorrow. Father, mother two brothers and one sister survive.

A Farmer's Death.

William Patterson, a well known farmer of the Rear Settlement, parish of Manners-Sutton, died at his home there Friday morning after a short illness from stomach and kidney trouble. He had not been in good health for some years, but was able to attend to his duties until about three weeks ago. He was the eldest son of the late William Patterson, one of the pioneers of Harvey. Deceased was about 60 years of age. His wife died about six months ago. He leaves two sons and two daughters, all of whom were at his bedside when he died.

Big Rush of Cattle.

Saturday was a record breaker in the matter of the arrival at St. John of live stock, consignments for transatlantic steamers. From 11.30 Saturday morning until 5.40 in the afternoon 88 car loads reached there by the Intercolonial railway and averaging 20 head to the car, it will be seen that the number of cattle brought here is about 1,760. They were all taken to Sand Point and will be put aboard their respective ships there. Practically all the cattle were received from the Grand Trunk Railway.

REMEMBERS DONEGAL.

Moncton Man Who Has Often Seen the Noble Lord.

The Marquis of Donegal, the story of whose romantic marriage to Miss Twining, formerly of Fredericton, has been read with so much interest by people in New Brunswick, especially, is remembered very well by Mr. P. Gallagher, proprietor of the Minto, who was born within two miles of the Donegal estates. Mr. Gallagher lived in Mount Charles, County of Donegal, and it was within a short distance of that town that the Marquis of Donegal had his summer residence. Lord Mount Charles, as he was called forty years ago, when Mr. Gallagher remembers him, used to spend two or three months of each year at his summer residence. Lord Mount Charles was a familiar figure to Mr. Gallagher who was then but a boy of 12 or 15. Mr. Gallagher's father was a butcher and supplied the Donegal summer residence with fresh meats, etc. Naturally the son often accompanied his father to the Donegal residence, so that he was almost as familiar with the place as his own home. Mr. Gallagher recalls that there were two children at the Donegal residence called Lady Blanche and Lord Slain, but he cannot remember to which one of the Donegals they belonged.
