DYING HORSE SAVED HIM.

Chicago Man Survives Long Struggle in Icy Lake.

CLUTCHES EQUINE'S LEG AND UNCONSCIOUS WHEN RESCUERS FIND HIM.

Team Plunged Into an Air Hole and Lost Bearings in the Dark.

Chicago, Jan. 23.—A dying horse that threatened to destroy him proved the preservation of Henry Haegele, treasurer of the Haegele ice company, in a battle with death in the icy waters of Twin Lakes, Wis.

As it was Haegele barely escaped with his life after a struggle of 20 minutes in the water. A companion, Charles Olson, an employe of the Haegele company, was drowned.

Shortly after 9 o'clock in the evening, Haegele, who had been superintending the cutting of ice on Twin Lakes, decided to return to Chicago. He had only a few minutes to spare, and a short cut across the ice offered the only chance to catch the train.

The ice was known to be safe except where the company had been cutting, and Olson offered to drive his employer across the lake. A horse was hitched to a light spring wagon, and the trip was begun.

The night was cloudy and dark, and Olson lost his bearings. To one side of the regular path was a space where the ice had been cut a few days before, and towards this point the horse was guided.

The first Mr. Haegele knew of the danger was when the horse plunged suddenly, dragging the wagon after it. In another instant the two men and the horse were struggling together in the icy water. Both men shouted for help, but with little hope that their cries would be heard.

Olson sank almost immediately, but Haegele, who is a strong swimmer, managed to keep afloat. The horse was kicking frantically in an endeavor to free itself from the harness, and a number of times its hoofs narrowly missed striking the struggling ice dealer's head.

Finally, in desperation, Mr. Haegele threw his arms around the animal's forelegs. Then came an awful combat—the horse striving madly to free itself from the grasp of the man, the man to protect himself from the horse's hoofs and at the same time keep afloat. The struggle was still in progress when Mr. Haegele lost consciousness.

Back at the camp of the ice cutters, Mr. Haegele's employes had heard faint cries for help. At first they were inclined to doubt their ears, and then after some minutes of delay, a party started out on foot to investigate. Moving cautiously toward the thin ice the rescuers saw by the light of their lanterns that the horse which had threatened to kill Mr. Haegele really had saved him.

The water was no more than eight feet deep where the break occurred and the dying horse had so entangled itself with the harness and wagon that its forelegs protruded from the water. Still clinging to these legs was Mr. Haegele, unconscious, rigid, and half frozen, but not past recovery.

The rescuers quickly seized hold of their employer with ice hooks and dragged him back to the solid ice. Mr. Haegele was carried back to the camp, where restoratives were applied and the half-drowned man was placed close to a rousing fire. In a short time he revived and then the ice cutters turned back to the lake to search for Olson's body, a task that was accomplished after an hour of work.

Mr. Haegele has suffered from exposure, but said: "I am lucky to be alive."

DOG CAN USE A TELEPHONE.

Albany Skye Terrier Has Developed Wonderful Sagacity.

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 23.—A certain officer of an Albany corporation owns a pet skye terrier named Rags. It is a very intelligent animal, for it not only reads signs of a certain class of beer, but when the 9 o'clock bell rings at night it will manage in some way to awaken its master and lead the way to a place where that particular beer is drawn — of course the dog wants the beer not the master.

This famous dog so the master says, was locked up one day in the room occupied by the master during the winter, and was forgotten. The telephone in the room and its use had been carefully studied by Rags.
