RECOUNT GRANTED IN LAVAL.

Lord Dufferin Apparently Near-
ing the End.

PECULIAR PLEDGE EXACTED FROM
MAYOR OF SLIGO.SMALLPOX IN MONTREAL.

Montreal, Jan. 25.—Some idea of the extent of the smallpox scourge which has existed in the city for some months, is gathered from the fact that, since October last, 200 cases have passed through the civic hospital.

OTTAWA HOTEL BURNED.

Ottawa, Jan. 25.—The Cecil Hotel, on Wellington St. was completely gutted by fire at five o'clock this morning. The fire originated from an overheated flue, and only the walls remain standing. The loss is about \$22,000, partly insured.

RECOUNT IN LAVAL.

Montreal, Jan. 25.—Judge Langelier has granted an application made by Mr. C A Wilson, asking for a judicial recount of the votes cast in the recent by-election in Laval county, where Mr. Leonard A Conservative was elected by a small majority. The recount will take place on January 27.

EXCITING GRAVE ANXIETY.

London, Jan. 25.—The condition of the Marquis of Dufferin, who has been ill for some time, is causing grave anxiety. Until his recent attack the Marquis was busy revising voluminous memoranda which he had been completing for years. They constitute secrets, records of diplomatic events with which His Lordship had been connected since he first went to Constantinople as ambassador, and fill a number of volumes.

SLIGO MAYOR'S PLEDGE.

Dublin, Jan. 25.—The Sligo corporation passed a resolution yesterday afternoon that the mayor of the town for the present year should be required to pledge himself that during his term of office he would not accept any favor from any representative of the English Government in Ireland, and that he would not take part in the ceremonies in connection with the coronation. The new mayor, Ald. Keenan, said he was in thorough accord with the resolution and gave the pledge required.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

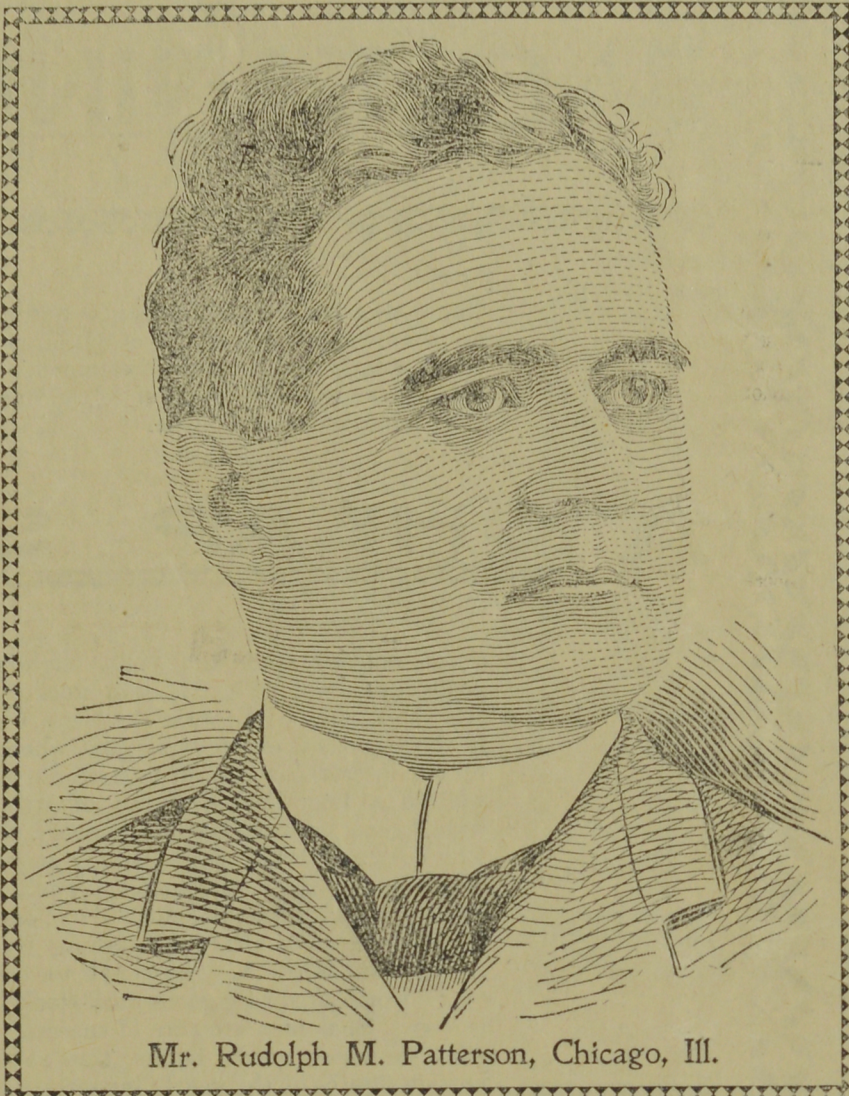
Montreal, Jan 25.—At the annual meeting of Erskine Church of which Rev Dr. A. J. Mowatt formerly of Fredericton is pastor, the financial report submitted showed a revenue of \$10,879.02 for the year. It was stated that there was a small balance on hand, that \$5,000 of the building debt had been paid off, and that the mortgage on the church now only amounted to \$10,000. Upwards of \$11,500 had been subscribed to the century fund of the Presbyterian church, of which amount \$11,150 had been paid in.

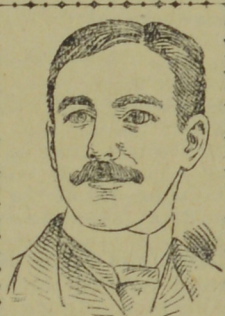

THEY WANT \$50,000.

The Work Which Rev H F Adams Has Undertaken For the Baptists.

Rev H F Adams, formerly pastor of the Truro Baptist church, who has been preaching in various parts of the States and Upper Canada recently and is now making his headquarters in this city, has accepted the position of manager of the Maritime Provincial Twentieth Century Fund, which the Baptist convention decided upon about a year and a half ago. The scheme is to raise \$50,000 in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. Of this sum it has been decided to use half to advance missions in India, and the other half to be sub-divided among home missions, the Northwest and Grand Ligne. Rev. Mr. Adams in undertaking the work, has planned upon each of the clergymen in the Maritime convention subscribing five dollars, the Sunday schools ten thousand altogether, and general contributions will make up the remainder. There are 250 clergymen in the Maritime Provinces and 544 Sunday schools.

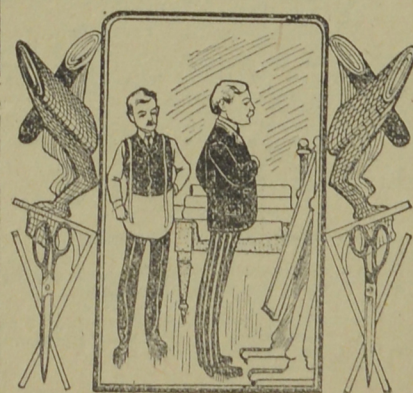
