Metcalfe married in St. John's some years ago, but deserted his wife shortly afterwards. He was wanted for express robberies in various parts of Canada and the United States.

CANADA WILL BE REPRESENTED.

Kingston, Ont. July 18.—Annie O'Leary and John Milane, Syracuse, N.Y. elopers, were arrested here and held for return to Syracuse. Miss O'Leary was accused of stealing \$303 from her mother. The amount, save \$80, which was spent here in enjoyment, was recovered. The couple reached here Monday. They said they were married, but now Millane denies it. Police Officer Craig nabbed them as they returned from a drive. Officers are taking them to Syracuse. Millane is 21 and the girl 18.

MURDERER HANGED.

Rice Went to His Fate Bravely and Faultlessly Attired.

Toronto, July 18.—Rice was successfully executed at 8.02 o'clock this morning.

Fred Lee Rice was one of the convicts

who murdered Constable Boyd in June 1901.

He died bravely on the scaffold. He was faultlessly attired in a broadcloth suit and wore a white tie, and it is believed he died a Christian.

He engaged in prayer shortly before the execution, and with his spiritual advisor sang the hymn "Jesus Lover of My Soul."

There was no hitch, and Rice was pronounced dead soon after the drop fell.

The body, contrary to the usual custom, was given to his heart-broken mother, who will take it to Illinois for interment.
