

AWFUL FATALITY.

W. A. Alward of Frederic-
ton and Thirteen Others

DROWNED AT ISLE OF SHOALS,
N. H.

Sudden Squall Capsized Their
Boat

AND ONLY THREE OF THE PARTY
WERE SAVED.

Isle of Shoals, N. H., July 18.—A fierce squall that suddenly swept off the main-land yesterday afternoon caught and capsized a whaleboat, in which were 17 of the help of the Oceanic house, out on a pleasure trip. Fourteen of the number, two men and 12 women were drowned, while two women and Fred Miles, who was in charge of the boat, were rescued by fishermen. The names of the drowned are:

The saved are Alice Haggarty, Lillian Bresnahan, Skipper Fred Miles.

The bodies of Farrington, Alward, Bessie Chase, Eva Mitchell and Isabell Kaouska have not yet been recovered.

All the others were taken from the water by fishermen and taken to the island, where they were worked over for a long time by Drs. Warren, of Boston, and Richter, of Portsmouth, but to no purpose.

Farrington and Alward were both law students at Harvard University, rooming at Forsyth hall. Both were good swimmers and lost their lives trying to rescue the others.

The party put off from the hotel some time after the lunch hour, intent on having a few hours' sail and relaxation from their hotel duties.

The boat was a long, open one, such as is used by whalers and seiners, rigged with a small sail. Such boats are usually considered quite safe.

The 17 who got into her, however, sent her well down in the water, and left Miles, an experienced seaman, but little room to work her.

A fine southwesterly breeze was blowing, however, and the boat soon sped out of the little sheltered harbor just below the hotel. A circuit of Appledore Island was made. The party was a jolly one and very little attention was paid to the weather until suddenly the western sky began to darken. At this time the boat was some distance off from the island, but Miles managed to get her round and headed back for the harbor.

But the squall, with its mission of death, outsped the boat, and catching it some few hundred feet off shore, whirled it over in a twinkling. Every person in the boat was thrown into the water and then began that frantic struggle which always succeeds such an accident.

The three men, all good swimmers, fought heroically to save the lives of the crazed women, but were badly handicapped, for the boat, heavily ballasted, immediately sank, leaving them nothing but their own strength to keep up 14 women.

The clutch of four or five women carried down one of the men and the other soon followed, but Miles, although working hard, managed to keep two of the women away from the other and sustained them until help arrived.

The steamer Sam Adams was the first on the scene, but could do little on account of the proximity to some rocks. The crew, however, managed to reach the Haggarty women, but could not get the others.

A dozen dories manned by fishermen came and each took a body ashore, where doctors tried resuscitating, but without success.

The victims were young people not averaging more than 20 years. Most of those from Massachusetts were school teachers who passed their vacations as waitresses in the hotel.

The accident was witnessed by nearly 100 guests of the hotel, who rushed to the beach, where they stood helpless.

Skipper Miles has been employed at the island for years and has always been considered thoroughly reliable. He is severely criticized, however, for taking out such a large party. He has since been in a dazed condition and unable to talk regarding the affair.

THE LATE W. A. ALWARD.

Son of the Legislative Librarian and a
Very Promising Young Man.

The unfortunate young man was the 2nd son of W. Abraham Alward, Legislative Librarian of this city, and the news of his tragic death was a painful shock to the friends of the family here as well as to others who knew the deceased personally. He was a native of Butternut Ridge, Westmorland county, having been born at that place January 1st, 1875. About nine years ago he removed to Fredericton with his parents and shortly afterwards entered the University of New Brunswick, from which he graduated with honors in 1897. He was a remarkably clever student and during his course carried off the Brydon-Jack scholarship, the Montgomery-Campbell prize and the Alumni gold medal, in addition to taking first class honors in mathematics and mathematical physics. After graduation he accepted a position on the staff of the Essex High School, which he filled in a highly satisfactory manner for two years. At the Exceenia of 1899 he took the degree of M. A. in course from his alma mater, and in the fall of the same year entered Harvard University, taking the degree of M. A. in the spring of 1900. He afterwards entered the law school of that University and had he lived, would have graduated in June of next year. When the school closed some weeks ago, he went to the Isle of Shoals, N. H., and accepted a position as waiter at a large summer hotel there, with the object of acquiring sufficient means to enable him to complete his studies.

The deceased was a young man of exemplary character, and for many years has been an active and useful member of the Baptist church. He had hosts of warm friends in this city and other parts of the province who will sincerely mourn his sad and untimely death, terminating what gave promise of a most brilliant career.

Besides his parents the deceased is survived by four brothers, Harry F. barrister of Port Elgin; Lee W. of Kalispel, Montana, and Hugh and Roy, students of the U. N. B. who live at home; and also two sisters the Misses Agnes and Lena Alward.

The family received the sad news in a private despatch from the employers of the deceased at Isle of Shoals, which was followed later by a despatch from the Recorder of Harvard University. The Misses Alward were at Stanley visiting friends and returned home this afternoon in response to a telephone message, acquainting them with the sad news.

Mr Alward has forwarded instructions to have the body as soon as recovered, prepared for burial and forwarded to this city.

Ottawa, July 18.—Canada's aggregate trade has passed the four hundred million mark and the customs returns for the year ending June 30 show the unprecedented figure of \$414,517,358, compared with \$377,689,705 last year, or an increase of \$36,826,653, or 72 per cent. over 1893, the best year of which the late government can boast. The total import trade for the year was \$202,791,591, compared with \$181,225,389 last year in 1901 and 1902, and \$121,705,030 in 1893.
