Flint and Steel Again.

One difficulty that our soldiers in South Africa had to contend with is little known and realized by the good folk at home, who sent pounds of tobacco and cigarettes by the million, only too often, we hear, to lie untasted and unsmoked for want of serviceable matches to ignite them with. Imported matches were next to useless during certain seasons of the year, and a cry almost a bitter cry, went up for something that would light Thomas Atkins' pipe or cigarette. It remained for an individual unconnected with the War Office to move that august department to give a trial to the old flint and steel, a form of ignition scarcely known to the present generation. After much trial and trouble a suitable steel was selected, and the languishing flint industry of Brandon in Norfolk received an immense fillip by very extensive orders which were there placed for flints, which were artificially chipped, every one of them, to the proper shape, at the munificent rate of 4s. a thousand. These were exported in tons to various parts of South Africa. This was, indeed, a strange reversion to ancient methods which the whirligig of time brought about. It suggests, too, possibilities at home in these days of cheap and nasty foreign matches.—London Times.

His Brother Died 140 Years Ago.

There are probably not many men living who had a brother that died one hundred and forty years ago! This, however, appears to be the case with an old man who was called as a witness in a small town of Styria. His father was married the first time in 1760, at the age of 19. The following year he had a son, who died after a few months. His father married again in 1811, at the age of 70, and witness was born the next year, which made him 89. 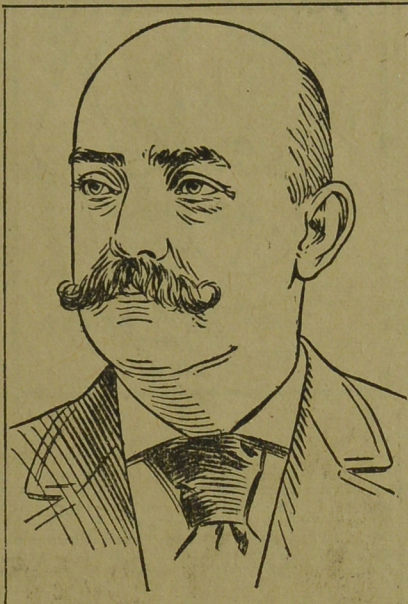
