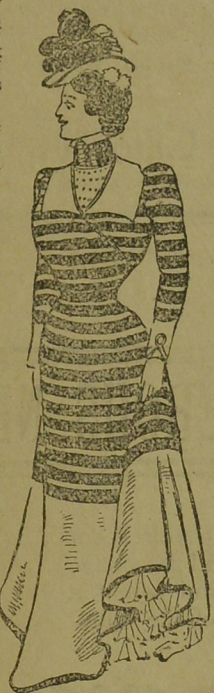

BULLER NO COWARD

AN ACCOUNT OF HOW THE GENERAL WON THE VICTORIA CROSS.

A Great Favorite With the Rank and File of the Army—How He Was Converted to Home Rule for Ireland—Stories of His Obstinacy and Opinionativeness.

In discussing the attack now being made on General Buller for his telegram to Sir George White, the Marquise de Fontenay writes in The Chicago Tribune an account of how General Buller won the Victoria Cross, and adds: "With such a record for personal bravery it is needless to talk of his being a coward in having informed General Sir Geo. White that it might be necessary for him to surrender Ladysmith, and directing him what steps to take in that eventuality. In fact the way in which he conveyed these instructions to Sir George, expressly stating that if it were necessary he could put the responsibility on his (Buller's) shoulders, and state that it had been done by his directions, shows better than anything else the courage and also the generosity of the man. Whether he is forced to resign his command or not he will always remain a great favorite with the rank and file of the army, and even with the officers. In fact, there have been few generals more popular, that, too, in spite of his harsh manner, which conceals a singularly warm heart, and none of those who have served under him can forget that readiness to shoulder the blame in order to exculpate others has been one of his most distinguished traits.

"Irish people in this country may possibly recall that while acting as Government Commissioner to Kerry and as Assistant Irish Secretary during one of Lord Salisbury's former administrations he became so disgusted by what he then saw in his official capacity of the oppression of Ireland that he demanded to be relieved of his duties at the Irish Office, and has often since confessed that his Irish experience had the effect of converting him to home rule. It is just as well that it should be remembered in his behalf among the Irish here that he not only resigned a lucrative and important office rather than be identi-

fied with the wrongs inflicted upon them, but has likewise contributed in the most generous manner to the treasury of the home rule cause.

"Of his obstinacy and opinionativeness I could tell many a story. I remember, one in particular in which his intimate friend and crony, Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, was involved. The scene was in Egypt during the Nile campaign of 1885. Buller got into a discussion with Beresford as to the proper channel that should be taken by their steamer in descending through one of the cataracts. Each obstinately defended his own course. But in the end that which Buller insisted upon was adopted, and the steamer got through without accident.

"You see I was right," replied Sir Redvers; "mine was the right course."

"That was mine, too," coolly replied Sir Charles. "I only recommended the other because I knew you would go against whatever I said."

"If I mention all these things it is because there seems to be a general disposition to make Sir Redvers the scapegoat of the present war, a project which is being fostered by the press, which does not forget the general's pronounced aversion to newspaper correspondents in general, and to war correspondents in particular. The British public is anxiously demanding a scapegoat. There is always one required at the close of each war, who is sacrificed to appease popular indignation excited by the shortcomings of the military in general and the army administration in particular. Field Marshal Benedek, one of the most capable commanders of the Austrian army, was sacrificed in this way at the close of the war with Prussia in 1866, and was thus made to pay for the disobedience to his orders on the part of those Generals of Imperial and noble rank who treated him with disdain on account of his plebeian birth. Field Marshal Bazaine was the scapegoat offered to the French people for the reverses sustained by the French army in the war of 1870, and, although he may have erred in judgment, he has long since been acquitted by impartial students of military history of all treachery in connection with the capitulation of Metz. Indeed, so well aware was his comrade, Field Marshal MacMahon, that he was unjustly condemned and made to bear the entire brunt of the disastrous defeats inflicted upon French arms, that he declined to permit the execution of the death sentence, and is generally understood to have given instructions that he should be allowed to escape from the endurable imprisonment—it was more nominal than anything else—to which his sentence had been commuted.

"There were scapegoats at the close of the Crimean war, both in France and England, although these two countries had been victorious in the struggle. But the public demanded that somebody should be sacrificed for the reverses sustained and the mistakes made."
