A FALSEHOOD NAILED.

That contemptible sheet, which never could mind its own business and which has been telling its readers over and over again for the past ten years that Messrs. Thompson and Whitehead owned the Herald, yesterday started on a new tack by stating in its columns that Mr. John T. Hawke of Moncton is the owner of this journal. For the benefit of those who do not know James Crockett and his reputation for lying, we wish to state that Mr. Hawke does not and never did own one cent's worth of stock in the Herald. Indeed, we might add that his financial interest in this paper is possibly less than is Mr. Crockett's in the Gleaner.

Now if Mr. Crockett wants to give the public information that would be of interest regarding the ownership of Fredericton newspapers, let him tell who owns the Gleaner. It is a strangely mixed up affair to say the least. Frequently creditors have consulted the York County records to learn just what chances they would have of payment out of the Gleaner and other property which Mr. Crockett calls his. They have found that on October 29, 1901, Geo. F. Gregory secured a judgment against Jas. H. Crockett for \$8,025. Then, about the same time, Jas. H. Crockett gave a bill of sale to a member of his family to the amount of \$4,000 on printing presses, boilers, engine, type, stands, paper, ink, stones and printing stock plant and implements of every nature and description now under possession of James H. Crockett; also all additional or renewal or substituted stock, plant or implements which he may hereafter acquire; also all furniture, books of reference, materials, goods, chattels and effects of every nature which he may now have in his possession in connection with his business of printing and publishing, or may hereafter acquire and have; also all office books, books of accounts and subscription lists and all bonds, bills, contracts, book debts, choses in action, debts and evidences of debts now due or hereafter during the continuance of this security. They also discovered that a few years ago, Papa-in-law Vradenburgh, secured a Bill of Sale for \$1,050 on 1 parlor sett of 7 pieces, 1 piano, 1 sewing machine, 2 water colors in frames, 2 oil paintings in frames, 2 vases, 2 rattan chaires, 7 steel engravings in frames, 2 hall chaires, 3 stoves and pipe, music rack, 2 single ornamental parlor tables, silver ice water pitcher, 10 curtain poles, 10 setts curtains, 1 hall rack, 1 extension table, 1 side board, 1 desk, 1 book case, 1 doz. chairs dining and kitchen, 3 lounges, 5 carpets, 2 platform rockers, 7 wall pictures in frames, 1 cherry marble top bedroom sett, including two rockers and three chairs, 2 common bedsteads, 3 wash stands, 1 bureau, 1 book rack, 1 complete sett Britannica encyclopedia, 11 volumes Appleton's Annual, a lot of miscellaneous books, 1 horse (bay), 1 express wagon, 1 other wagon, 1 sleigh, 2 setts harness and all property including crockery ware, kitchen furniture, pantry sundries; also knives, forks, spoons, etc., stove utensils, all the personal property of every other kind, unnamed, of the said James H. Crockett, or to be owned by him in connection with his household furniture.

Then, the York county records show that the residence where Mr. Crockett makes his home was purchased a short time ago and is held in the name of a member of his family. The purchase price was \$4,000 and the mortgage thereon is \$3,700.

The Herald regrets that it is necessary for it to refer to these matters, but Mr. Crockett, prompted by jealousy of this journal because it minds its own business and pays its debts, deliberately and maliciously stated what he knew to be untrue. He had hoped to do an injury to our business, but we feel the above will prove to the public that the Herald can stand such babble from its contemporary.

THE REDISTRIBUTION OF SEATS.

The probability of a reduction of the representatives of some of the provinces in the House of Commons is creating a great deal of unfavorable comment in the provinces affected. Prince Edward Island in particular is raising quite a vigorous kick. Still, while we would greatly regret to see New Brunswick have fewer representatives that she now has it is nothing more than we can expect. At present Quebec sends sixty-five members to Ottawa and this is the basis of representation for the other provinces. Now if the Northwest progresses as we hope and firmly believe, the House of Commons will soon grow to enormous proportions. It is not unlikely then that at no distant future the confederation act may be amended so as to reduce the representation of Quebec and with it that of the other provinces which cannot keep pace with the growing west. The Hamilton Times has this to say on the subject: "We do not think Prince Edward Island will succeed in taring up the Confederation Act just because the representation of the little island is likely to be reduced in the House of Commons by the relative increase of population in other provinces. If any change is made in Parliamentary representation it should be to increase the unit of population to 50,000 or 60,000, and reduce the number of representatives all around, including Quebec. If this province is to keep its 65 members, while the Northwest sends representatives in proportion to its growing population, the House of Commons will soon have to be enlarged. Two hundred representatives could look after the business of ten million people as well as four hundred. Our system of representation may have been all right in 1867, but it was not calculated to meet the requirements of the future."

The Boston Herald (Aug. 6) says: "Considering that the Canadian trade is the best trade that the American people possess, that our neighbors across the border buy more of our manufactured wares than perhaps any other foreign customer we possess, and that we can supply them, because of similarity of tastes, with the same class of goods that we produce for our own people, it is apparent that their trade is something which we can well afford to cultivate through the most amicable diplomatic and commercial relations. Such feelings and influences on our part are all the more essential when it is taken into account that the Canadians are justly dissatisfied with our treatment of them, and are strongly urged by those representing their best customer—England—to come to an agreement with the mother country which would tend to seriously interfere with the easy entrance of American goods into their markets."

Old-home week, as it is called, is being celebrated in many United States communities these days, just as our old boys' associations are holding their jaunts in Canada. One of the towns that celebrated was York, Maine, which, with its 250 years, claims to be the oldest incorporated English town on the American continent.

LONG LIVE THE KING

King Edward was crowned without untoward incident and the folk-lore prophecy that this would never occur is forever refuted. The world cheers Edward as he steps down from the coronation throne comparatively a well man and the recipient of the highest honours one of the greatest of all nations can bestow upon him. He has earned sympathy and respect by his demeanor under danger and in the face of one of the bitterest personal disappointments a monarch ever suffered. His dignity, good nature and philosophy have

greatly strengthened him with his people. He is more their king than though the original program had been followed and he had been crowned with all the pomp and ceremony arranged for the June date. The fact that the affair was comparatively simple, that it was not attended by the brilliant delegations representing practically all the rulers of the world, does not detract from its significance. The Act of the Coronation itself means little save that the King has recovered and for that the British people are heartily thankful, and their friends the world over offer their congratulations to both nation and King.—Washington, D. C. Star.

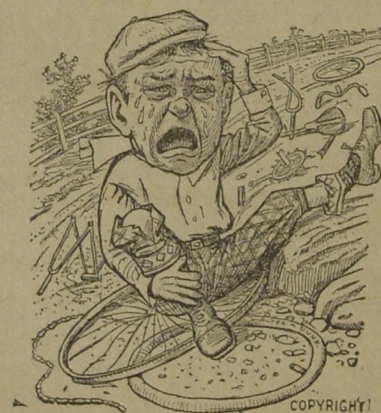
