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CANADIAN INDEPENDENCE.

Halifax, N. S., September 25.—Considerable sensation has been caused in political circles here by the outspoken declaration of the Liberal organ here, the Halifax Chronicle, in favour of the independence of Canada. It takes as its text the recent message sent to the Dominion Government by Colonial Secretary Chamberlain in which he thanks Canada for the service of the Special Service Battalion at this garrison. The Chronicle says: "This message is, no doubt well, if patronizingly, intended. But the Canadian people owe it to themselves to take steps as soon as possible to prevent their being the recipients of many more such messages. An official Englishman conveying to the Canadian Government the said official Englishman's 'appreciation' of the said 'Government' may be perfectly satisfactory from an Old Country stand point. His doing so is scarcely elevating to Canadian self respect or soothing to Canadian dignity. The Colonial status of Canada which this message emphasises is not, we hope, much longer to be tolerated. Canada is surely old enough and big enough and strong enough to assume a position of independent nationhood. Instead of having Old Country troops coming here to 'defend Canada,' fetching condescending thanks for what Canada has done, preceded by duns for contributions from us to the government of the United Kingdom and taunts for our refusal to make such contributions, we should take immediate charge of our own defences, and the complete management of our own affairs, subject only to the King, and if necessary a genuine Imperial Council. We owe this to ourselves, and we owe it to the Empire. We are now, however, we may try to blind ourselves to the fact, subjects of our fellow subjects in the Old Country. We occupy, therefore, a degraded and most degrading position. We must proceed to get out of it in some way at the earliest possible moment. Six millions of Canadians in contented dependency is a pitiful sight. The longer it continues the more pitiful will it become. If we cannot secure some free, dignified and certain position within the Empire, in the name of British manhood, let us get out of it, and take our stand among the independent and self-respecting nations of the world."

FIGHTING THE MOROS.

Manila, Sept. 25.—Captain John G. Pershing of the 15th infantry, operating against the Moros in the Island of Mandanao, has found the Moro position at Mocin, Island of Mandanao, to be strong and has delayed his attack on it. He must throw a pontoon bridge across a swamp, and possibly receive reinforcements before engaging the enemy. The Captain made a reconnaissance close to the Moro position and found a fort on an elevation, close to the lake shore, flanked by swamps, virtually making the promontory an island. The Americans built rafts preparatory to attacking the Moros from the lake, and they decided to bridge the swamp and make an attack from all sides. The Sultans of Macin regard the position as impregnable and have refused to treat with Captain Pershing. Brig.-Gen. Saml. S. Sumner will send the Moros an ultimatum demanding peace and the return of stolen property. If his demands are rejected the place will be assaulted. Captain Pershing has carefully examined the position and its surroundings, and is confident of his ability to capture it without serious losses. Captain Pershing has returned to Camp Vicas where he reports that the Sultans of Macin alone are hostile in that section of the Lanao country. In preliminary operations in the Macin country the Captain's force captured seven forts and killed 25 Moros.

THE SALVATION ARMY.

London, September 25.—Gen. Booth of the Salvation Army, who sails for New York September 27, made a farewell address last night in Exeter Hall. The building was crowded. General Booth said he would visit twenty-five cities in the United States and eleven in Canada, and conduct 150 meetings, besides 60 receptions. He said the chairmen of the proposed meetings would include Governor Nash of Ohio, Governor Yates of Illinois and Senator Hanna.

In his address, Gen. Booth characterized the United States as a nation of mighty ambitions. He said he trusted he would be able to do something to help forward sentiments which would stimulate the people of the United States along the paths of righteousness and truth, so that they as a nation would become truly great, glorious and free. The speaker declared that nothing was dearer to him than to be instrumental in bringing closer the bonds of Great Britain and America, so that these countries would stand together and fight for all that was good and true. He said the more direct object of his trip was to stir the Salvationists to more thoroughness and heartiness.

Referring to the defections of some members of his own family, the General said the Salvation Army did not belong to the Booth family, that it belonged to the Salvation Army.

The itinerary of Gen. Booth, chief of the Salvation Army, when in Canada, will be as follows: St. John and Halifax, October 12 to 17; Montreal, 18th; Ottawa, 21st; Kingston, 22nd; Hamilton, 23rd; London, 25th and 26; Toronto, 30th, 31st and Nov. 15; Winnipeg, Nov. 29 and 30.
