

LINE OF ATTACK.

In closing Mr. Macinerney announced that there was no dividing line in the opposition party and intimated that all who are "agin the government", are invited to enroll themselves under Mr. Hazen's banner. The gauntlet had been thrown down by the Conservatives in the last contest but Mr. Emmerson had declined to take it up. He held that no Liberal would be false to his principles who voted against the present government. Mr. Hazen already had the support of many leading Liberals in the province, and the St. John Globe and Moncton Transcript were at his back. He hoped all would unite under the banner of good government, a government of the people and for the people. (Applause).

Mr. Macinerney occupied exactly one hour and was given a good hearing. He is a pleasing speaker, is more graceful in his gestures than Mr. Hazen, and seemed to make a very good impression upon the audience.

J. D. Hazen, M. P. P.

was the last speaker and was given a most cordial reception by his friends in the audience. He said at the outset that he was very proud of Mr. Macinerney and felt sure that he would be returned for St. John at the approaching election. He was also proud of Mr. Glasier and assured the audience that they invariably saw eye to eye on all great public questions. He thought it rather remarkable that every time he (Hazen) spoke in his native county of Sunbury, he was received with more favor than the last time, or in other words he wanted the audience to understand that he was growing in popularity, and that the people knew a good thing when they saw it. He wanted it understood also that the coming election was not to be run on party lines by him. He wanted all electors regardless of party to take hold and help him defeat the government. Many Liberals had pledged him their support, not only in Sunbury, but all over the province. He would extend the right hand of friendship to every Liberal, and when he achieved a victory he would not claim it as a Conservative victory, but a victory for pure government.

Mr. Hazen next treated the audience to an account of his stewardship as a representative of Sunbury in the Legislature. He told how he had been chosen to lead the opposition and how under his leadership the party had increased in numbers from five to seven members. The first recruit was Fred LaForest who had abandoned the government with all its patronage to throw in his lot with the opposition. He said Mr. LaForest's course was to his ever lasting credit, but did not tell the audience that he bolted to the opposition because the government declined to entrust him with the patronage of his county. The other recruit was J. Kidd Fleming, who had proved himself a tower of strength to the opposition.

Mr. Hazen devoted the next twenty minutes to the bridge charges and subsequent investigation by a committee of the Legislature. It was the same old story, told in the same old way and fell decidedly flat upon the audience. He claimed as a result of the enquiry that a large sum had been saved to the province. He thought it disgraceful that Dr. Pagley should have acted as counsel for the government during the bridge investigation and draw \$1,600 for his services. George Robertson, M. P. P., had been paid by the government for acting as secretary to the Duke of York's reception committee, and other members of the house frequently came in for extras.

The Rothesay fraud was dealt with at length by the speaker, and he claimed as a result of that affair, and at his suggestion, the Legislature had adopted the one man, one vote principle. The bill was introduced by the government but he would have taken action if the government had not. He was very sorry that St. John county did not come under the act, as they might be in a position to defeat the surveyor general. He was not a blue ruin advocate, but whenever he called attention to the danger of the burden of maintaining the road and bridge service being thrown on the municipalities, he would come in for a lecture on patriotism by Mr. Tweedie. Discussing the financial situation, he stated that there was a deficit of \$40,000 last year instead of a surplus of \$26,000, even after adding the amount of the Eastern Extension claim to the receipts. He would not say the salaries of the members of the executive were high, but they were certainly well paid for the work they performed. In Nova Scotia the government members were required to live at Halifax but in New Brunswick you would find them home attending to their private affairs. He took credit to himself for having the route of the proposed railway

from Chipman changed so that it would connect with the Canada Eastern at Gibson instead of at Pennic, indeed he had forced the government to make the change. He had also made it possible for students from Sunbury to attend the Fredericton High School without the payment of fees as they formerly had to do. He admitted that Sunbury had been generously treated by the government during the last four years, but thought that he and Mr. Glasier should have been consulted in regard to expenditures. The Oromocto bridge had fallen as a result of government neglect, and there was a bridge at Florenceville ready to fall down. He held that the roads of the province were not as good as they were twenty years ago.

Mr. Hazen next produced from his pocket, several type written pages of foolscap, which he announced contained his platform and proceeded to read it to the audience. There were fourteen planks in all, and each was in turn explained to the audience. He promised to amend the election law, to let all contracts by tender, to restore to municipalities the right to appoint the third revisor, to reduce travelling expenses of the executive, to abolish the office of solicitor general, to divide the province into 38 electoral districts, each returning one member, to have the bye road appropriations expended by county councils, etc., etc. Regarding the proposed division of the province into electoral districts he offered no explanations as to how Sunbury was going to fare by such a transaction.

In conclusion Mr. Hazen again reminded his hearers that Sunbury was his native county, and that he was ready to continue as its representative in the Legislature. He could have had a nomination in St. John had he desired it, but could not think for a moment of going back on Sunbury. He promised if returned to power at the next election to deal out even handed justice to all irrespective of race or creed. (Applause.)

About one third of the audience had moved out while Mr. Hazen was speaking, and when he sat down those who remained at the request of the chairman, joined in cheers for the King. Nobody had the courage, however, to propose cheers for Messrs Hazen and Glasier or even Mr. Wilmot.

The visitors spent the night at the residence of R. D. Wilmot, M. P., and this morning drove to Wasset and boarded the train for St. John.

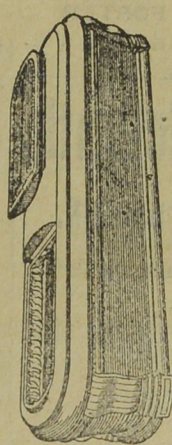

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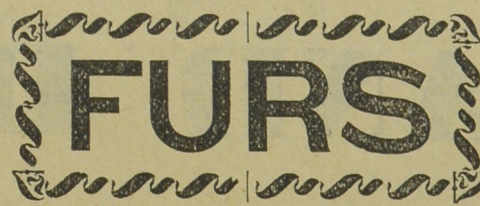
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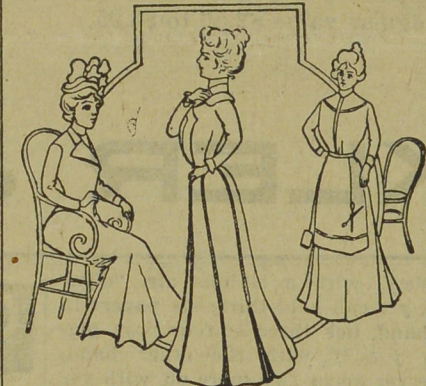
