Convicted and Sentenced.

Mrs. Andalusia Rogers, charged with poisoning her husband was convicted in the Victoria Circuit Court, and sentenced to five years in Dorchester penitentiary by Judge Hannington. Rogers is still living but is a physical wreck and cannot recover. The Judge in delivering sentence approved of the verdict, and stated that subsequent events might render her guilty of a graver crime, since if her husband died she could be indicted for murder and convicted on the same evidence.

The Burton Fire.

Jordan and J. Smith's, mill which was destroyed by fire at Burton, Wednesday night was uninsured. The fire broke out at 9.30 o'clock and in less than an hour the building was levelled to the ground. None of the machinery and very little of the lumber in the vicinity was saved. The pine lumber belonging to Gilman

Bros and Burden, which went up in smoke was valued at \$2500. The proprietors of the mill lost a quantity of their own lumber besides 200 cords of dry wood. They have not as yet made up their mind about rebuilding.

AN AUSTRALIAN VISITOR.

A Medical Man who had Three Famous
Boer Generals for Patients.

A representative of the Herald today had the pleasure of a brief chat with Dr. C. deWolfe Heard, a prominent physician of Sydney, Australia, at present visiting the city, a guest at the Barker. The doctor is a native of Prince Edward Island, and was at one time a pupil of Dr. Inch at Mount Allison, from which he graduated with the degree of B. A. in 1870. He afterwards took a course in medicine at McGill University, and after graduating with the degree of M. D., went to the old country, where he took a post graduate course and practised his profession for some years. For the last sixteen years he has been a resident of Sydney, Australia, and is now enjoying for the first time in that period a holiday trip to his native country. On leaving home early in the spring he proceeded to Durban, South Africa, where he engaged a passage for England by the steamer Saxon of the Union Castle Line. Among his fellow passengers during the trip to Southampton were none other than the famous Boer generals, Botha, DeWet and Delarey, and the doctor shared his stateroom with Botha's private secretary. During the passage out the Boer generals, never having been on the sea, suffered greatly from seasickness, and Dr Heard was called upon to serve them in a professional capacity. He was in constant attendance for two days, at the end of which time he succeeded in putting them on their feet once more. He was one of only three passengers who obtained the autograph of the generals, though hundreds of others applied for them. Delarey and Botha inscribed theirs on the same page of a small blank book, but DeWet took a page all to himself. The doctor describes Botha and Delarey as being educated men who speak English fluently, but says that DeWet knows only his native tongue.

During his sojourn in London the doctor called on the Boer generals at their hotel on one occasion, and as he was leaving the place a big crowd, which had assembled, mistook him for Botha and followed him several blocks before discovering their mistake.

During the passage to Canada an American gentleman, on being shown the book containing the signatures of the Boer generals, offered \$100 for it, but the doctor declined to accept it.

Dr Heard is a brother-in-law of Rev Dr Spragne of St John, and also of C N Vroom of St Stephen, and will go to St Stephen by this evening's train to visit Mr Vroom. He will also visit relatives in the States before leaving for his home in the Antipodes.

The doctor made the trip from St John yesterday by the steamer Victoria, and expresses himself as being charmed with the beauty of the St John river.

OUT ON BAIL.

Mrs. Marsten Released from Jail Today
by Col. Marsh.

Mrs. Annie Marsten, who is accused of poisoning her husband, the late George Marsten, of Meductic, was this forenoon taken before Col. Marsh by Deputy Sheriff Hawthorn and admitted to bail. Her own reconnaissance was accepted in the sum of \$4,000 along with sureties of \$2,000 each furnished by Gideon Stairs of Southampton, William Simmons of Northampton and Moses L. Palmer of Dumfries. Mrs. Marsten seemed to be in a cheerful mood, and there was no indication that her month's sojourn at Granite Hill had disagreed with her.
