THE MILITARY CAMP.

The assembly of militia men at Sussex is a unique gathering, an experiment which will doubtless prove satisfactory. All the Maritime Provinces will be represented in the camp, but it is not a general drill of the rank and file, but a gathering of officers and non commissioned officers for instructional purposes. All the infantry regiments of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island, except the city corps, have sent a detail of officers, non-commissioned officers and a sufficient number of privates for fatigue duty, and the twelve days will be devoted to mastering the new drill, and becoming generally proficient in the art of war. It will be a good thing to get so many officers together, to compare notes and to receive instruction. The non commissioned officers should profit much from contact with their superiors in rank, and the lieutenants will also extend to the privates in the ranks.

Lord Dundonald, the new commander-in-chief, is already on the ground, and will spend a week among the men, learning something of the Canadian militia-men, as well as inspiring and instructing them by his presence, and no doubt the results to all concerned will be very satisfactory.

MOVING FOR REFORMATION.

A St. John alderman has made a move to institute a curfew bell in that city warning all children under fifteen years of age off the streets at 9 p. m., in summer and 8 p. m., in winter. The alarming evidences of juvenile immorality in that city has led to the movement which should have the support of every parent who desires to receive assistance in shielding his children from the temptations of the street. In this city youthful hoodlumism is apparent to all who are on the streets in the evening. Small boys and small girls too, run riot in the most public thoroughfares. Noisy urchins who should be in bed may be seen on Queen street as late as ten o'clock at night, evidencing great parental disregard for the future of the rising generation.

The Herald is not an advocate of blue laws, but the time has arrived when some curb should be put upon the night prowlings of children of tender age, and there seems to be no better method than the institution of the curfew.

Sacred Concert.

The Coronation Choir Glee and Concert Party which was compelled to postpone their visit to Canada on account of the King's illness and the change necessitated in the great function sailed for Canada on August 13th having first sung at the Coronation on August 9th. The Coronation Choir Glee and Concert party is under the direction of Mr. Edward Branscombe and the Canadian management is in the hands of Mr. Stewart Houston of Toronto. England is justly celebrated for its wonderful boy soloists and the Coronation Choir party will be found to include some of the very finest that can possibly be found there. The phenomenal success which attended the performances of Master Percy Phillips and Lionel Craven in Canada and the United States has induced Mr. Edward Branscombe to increase their number to eight, and to include Master George Forsyth, another celebrated boy soloist. These three, together with Master Alfred Bobington, form a combination of juvenile artists the equal of which has never been heard outside of England. They will be heard in several items for boys voices alone. They have been specially selected from the Coronation Choir which performed the musical portion of the ceremony of crowning of King Edward VII in Westminster Abbey, while prior to their departure a number of them

had the honor of singing before the Prince and Princess of Wales at Marlborough House. The choir will give a sacred concert in the Methodist church on Wednesday evening, 17th inst.

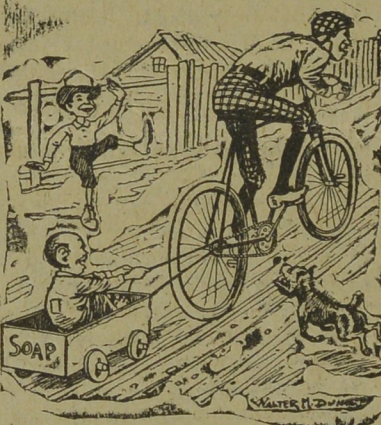
