WHERE THEY ANTICIPATE MEETING THE MESSIAH

Who Will Lead Them to a New Land Southward.

MORE OF THE PILGRIMS HAVE GONE CRAZY.

A PECULIAR DEATH.
(Special to Daily Herald.)

Toronto, Nov. 5.—The death of Joseph Doyle occurred Sunday afternoon under peculiar circumstances. On Saturday morning deceased was found lying on his bed in an unconscious condition by his room-mate, who notified the boarding-house mistress that Doyle had a wound on the right of his head from which blood was oozing. Dr. Smack was called in, and after a few hours the patient regained consciousness. On being asked how he cut himself, he said he had been sitting up in bed paring his nails before he retired, and falling asleep had dropped the knife on the bed, afterwards falling back upon it.

NURSE POPE DECORATED.

Ottawa, Nov. 5.—A private telegram received here states that the decoration of the Royal Red Cross has been conferred upon Miss Georgina Pope, of Ottawa. Miss Pope was one of the nursing sisters who went out to South Africa with the first Canadian contingent, and visited that country a second time with the Canadian Mounted Rifles.

The Royal Red Cross is to the nursing sister what the Victoria Cross is to the soldier. It was instituted by Her Majesty the Queen and is conferred for special devotion and competency displayed in her duties with the army in the field or in the naval and military hospitals.

[Miss Pope is a daughter of the late Judge Pope of P. E. Island, and a sister of Mrs. W. F. Mitchell, whose husband was a former manager of the Royal Bank in this city.]

MARCH OF THE DOUKHOBORS.

Winnipeg, Nov. 5.—A despatch from Solgirtin says that three more Doukhobor pilgrims have gone insane. Many are exhausted and have been carried on litters. They now expect to reach Winnipeg next Tuesday. Women to the number of 1,000 will be sent back to the villages by train.

The Doukhobors expect to meet the Messiah when they arrive at Winnipeg, and that He will lead them to a land to the southward.

Western Tragedies.

Effingham, Ill., Nov. 5.—Hon. Hale Johnson, a prohibition leader of national prominence, and a vice-presidential candidate on the prohibition ticket in 1896, was shot and killed by Harry Harris yesterday afternoon at Bogota. Mr. Johnson, who was practicing law at Newton, the county seat, went to Bogota to collect an account against Harris.

An altercation occurred between Johnson and Harris at the Harris home and the latter secured a shot gun and shot Johnson dead. Harris attempted to escape but was apprehended.

Harris committed suicide in the county jail last night by taking poison.

Wedded at Vancouver.

Many New Brunswick friends were in attendance at Christ church last evening to witness the marriage of Miss Jane Fawcett of Sackville, N. B., who arrived in the city yesterday to Dr. W. C. Sprague, the Granville street dentist. The ceremony was performed by Rev. L. His Father Dead.

A telegram from Newcastle, states that William Robinson, a well known citizen of that place and father of Rev. W. R. Robinson, pastor of the Gibson Baptist church, died this morning. He had been ailing for some weeks and his death was not unexpected. J. W. Robinson, game overseer of Newcastle is also a son of deceased.

Boy Brave in Face of Death.

New York, Nov. 3.—Nerve and fortitude that won the admiration of all those about him were displayed by a seven-year-old boy who was run over and fatally injured yesterday by a Long Island railroad train in Brooklyn. The lad, "Jimmy" Randazzo, who lived with his parents at 1,307 Pacific Street, was on his way to school with several playmates when he attempted to cross the railroad tracks in front of an approaching train at Classon and Atlantic Avenues.

He was struck and the engine and forward car passed over him, both of his legs being cut off at the knees. The little fellow was conscious when picked up, and, despite his terrible injuries, did not even whimper. "Jimmy" still held to his school books.

"Please don't lose them," he pleaded as one of the men took the books gently from him.

"Don't tell mamma I got hurt," he said

again to the ambulance surgeon who was called from St. Mary's Hospital. The boy died in the hospital several hours later.

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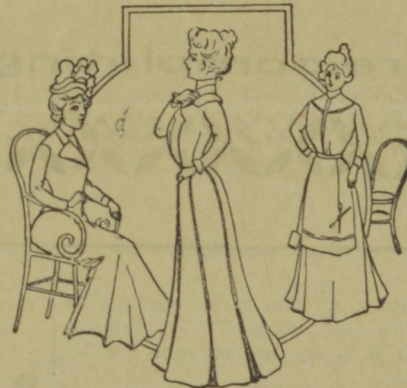
