

A GLOOMY OUTLOOK.

The Financial Condition of the University Far From Satisfactory

TO THE FRIENDS OF THE NOBLE INSTITUTION.

Legislature Will be Urged to Increase the Grant.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SENATE—THE NEW GYMNASIUM.

The annual meeting of the Senate of the University of New Brunswick convened at the Education office yesterday afternoon with the president, Dr. J. R. Inch, in the chair. The other members present were Judge Barker, Judge McLeod, J. D. Hazen, M. P. P., W. J. Brodie, W. A. Park, Inspector Bridges, Hon. Archibald Harrison and the secretary, Dr. A. M. Scott.

The annual report of Chancellor Harrison for submission to the Legislature was read and adopted.

The financial statement for the year together with the report of the auditor was submitted to the meeting and adopted.

The resignation of James Farrell, who has held the position of forest ranger for the past thirty years, was accepted, and William McAllister, an employee of the college, was appointed to the vacancy.

It was decided to have the gymnasium rebuilt as soon as possible, and a committee, composed of Dr. Harrison and Prof. Jack was appointed to solicit subscriptions to help defray the cost of the work.

In the evening the annual conference was held with the members of the faculty and was most satisfactory. The members of the senate were much pleased with the reports submitted and with the earnestness and enthusiasm shown by the professors in their work.

So far as the educational work is concerned the University was never in better condition than at the present time, but the members of the Senate say that the financial aspect is rather discouraging. The maintenance and care of the new Science building has added from \$800 to \$1000 to the annual cost of expenses, and a reduction of the rate of interest on the institution's investments has materially cut down the income from that direction, so it is practically impossible to make ends meet. To put the matter in a nutshell, the institution is scarcely able to meet its liabilities, and the Senate sees no hope of being able to carry on the work in the future as efficiently as in the past without an increased revenue from some source. The hope is entertained by the senate that the government and legislature will in the near future come to the assistance of the venerable institution by making a substantial increase in the grant.

The Senate will meet again on Monday evening of next week to finish the business.
