EDGECOMBE TAX MATTER.

Full Text of the Resolution Voted Down by the Council.

Following is the full text of Ald. Ryan's resolution, which the city council rejected last evening by a vote of 6 to 3: Resolved, That the valuation for assessment purposes of the properties owned by Frederick B. Edgcombe in this city, in compliance with his petition, be fixed at the sum of fifty thousand dollars as follows:

Brick factory and dwelling, York,	6,500
Double wooden dwelling, King....	4,000

And further resolved, that the valuation of the personal property owned by the said Frederick B. Edgcombe, be fixed at twenty-four thousand dollars, from which is to be deducted a mortgage of twelve thousand dollars upon real estate, making a valuation for assessment purposes upon personal property twelve thousand dollars.

MAN MISSING

Mysterious Disappearance of Robert Peppers.

WENT TO THE WOODS TO GATHER BARK.

And Has Not Since Been Seen — Search Parties Out.

Robert Peppers, a well known and highly respected farmer living at Barker's Point, in the Parish of St. Marys, disappeared from his home under mysterious circumstances yesterday afternoon and has not yet returned. His prolonged absence is causing great anxiety to the members of his family and has created quite a stir in the neighborhood.

From what can be learned of the case, it appears that Mr. Peppers left his home about the middle of the afternoon to go into the woods near by and gather some birch bark for kindling purposes. When darkness came on and he had not returned, the members of the family became alarmed and had a searching party organized. A number of the neighbors, armed with foghorns and guns, scoured the woods in the vicinity during the night, but were unsuccessful in finding the missing man. At one point they came to a small bunch of bark which he had evidently put up while on his way in the woods, and had laid it down with the intention of picking it up on his way out. From the point where the bark was found the trail led in the direction of the Nashwaak River, but could only be followed for a short distance.

The search was resumed early this morning, but up to noon the efforts of the party had not been rewarded by success.

It is feared that the old gentleman may have been drowned in the Nashwaak, and men are at work this afternoon dragging the river.

The missing man is about 75 years of age, and has a family of three sons and two daughters, all grown up. One of the sons is Dr. Hugh S. Peppers, of Centreville, Carleton county.

It is said that the missing man has been acting a little strangely of late, and it is feared that he may have made way with himself. At four o'clock this afternoon no clue to his whereabouts had been discovered.

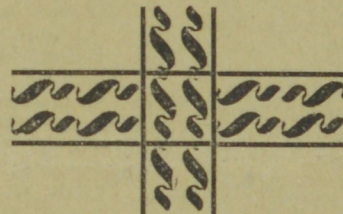
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
