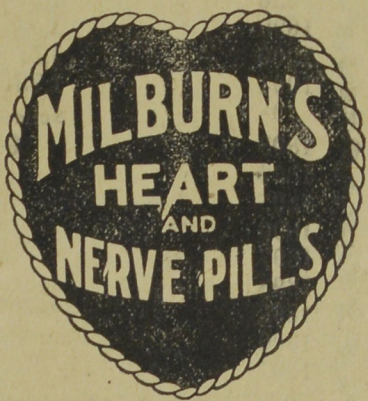
Swallowing Salt Water.

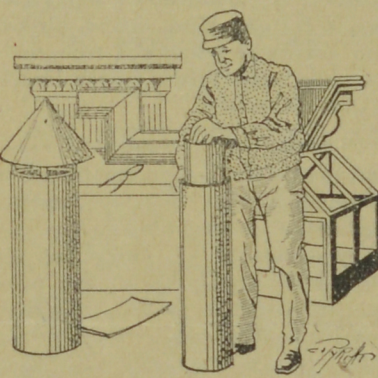
