HUNDRED OF MINERS KILLED.

Awful Result of Explosion in a Mexican Mine.

San Antonio, Tex., Feb. 3.—[The latest information from the Hondo, Mex., mine explosion shows it to have been even more serious than at first reported. There was a total of 106 miners at work in the mine when the explosion occurred and all of them are believed to be dead. The majority of the victims are Mexicans and Chinamen, very few Americans having been at the mine.

Every mine in the mine was killed, three dead ones being taken from the debris today. The work of clearing away the wreck in order to get to the bodies is being rushed as rapidly as possible, but there is no hope that any of the men will be rescued alive.

The explosion occurred in mine No. 6 and was occasioned by striking a gas pocket. The mine is the property of the Coahuila Coal Company, R.M. McKenny being superintendent. The names of none of the victims have been learned here. The loss to the owners of the mine is very heavy.

MARRIED BY PHONOGRAPH.

Unique Ceremony [That United a Couple at Ottawa, Ohio.

Toledo, Ohio, Jan. 31.—Miss Nellie Stone, one of the prettiest and most popular young ladies of Ottawa, Ohio, was married at Oswego by phonograph to J. F. Duncan, of that city.

The regular marriage ceremony was impossible, owing to the fact that the home of the relatives with whom Miss Stone was stopping awaiting the marriage was suddenly placed under strict quarantine for smallpox. The young lady was in such a nervous condition over the delay that her physician thought of the plan of the "phonograph marriage," which is held to be perfectly legal.

In her room at the Creighton home, where she was quarantined, Miss Stone, in the presence of witnesses, repeated into the phonograph the words:

"I, Nellie Stone, do take this man, James F. Duncan, to be my lawfully wedded husband, for better or for worse, till death do us part."

The phonograph record was then removed, fumigated and taken to the Duncan residence, where the groom and a clergyman performed their part of the ceremony. The engagement is a romantic one. Both are newspaper writers and they became acquainted through their articles. Correspondence and an exchange of photographs brought about an engagement, and Duncan has been a frequent visitor at Ottawa, Ohio, for the last six months.

Last Monday Miss Stone went to Oswego for the marriage. A friend stopping with her relatives, the Creightons, was seized with smallpox of a virulent form, and, though he was promptly removed from the house, the sanitary authorities insisted on a rigid quarantine. The result on the young lady's nerves was so serious that the "phonograph marriage" was decided on by the doctor, and the contracting parties gladly assented.

GOT 1,000 HATS BY MAIL.

Endless Chain Joke on C. W. Bliss—Result of Football Wager.

Springfield, Mass., January 31.—As a result of a chain letter joke, Chester W. Bliss of this city, son of President Bliss, of the Boston and Albany Railroad, has received nearly one thousand hats by mail. Mr. Bliss, when seen, declines to discuss hats. He replied to every question about the hundreds of hats bearing his address, received at the Post Office in this city:

"Don't know anything about it."

Postmaster Hyde also was non-communicative. All he would admit was that hats of high and low degree and of all shapes styles and sizes have been received at the Post Office daily, since shortly after the Harvard-Yale football game all consigned to one person. The hats could not be delivered by the carriers, and when the person whose name, was notified to call for the packages, he refused to accept the headgear. The hats accumulated until the holiday season, when wagons were used to assist the carriers in the delivery of the Christmas mail. Then a wagon load was sent to the residence of Mr. Bliss, but he refused to take the hats, and back to the Post Office they went.

Every incoming mail brought its quota of ancient or second-hand "hats," until the storage room was exhausted, and the clerks were so tired of seeing hats they went bare-headed. It is said that Mr. Bliss won a hat at the football game in Cambridge last fall, and in consequence of a reply made to a friend, a chain letter was started which resulted in the flood of hats that transformed the Post Office into an imitation of a bargain day at a rummage sale.

Miss Thiery Jumped From Flying Train.

Winsted, Conn., Jan. 28.—Most of the men of New Hartford, in which the village of Pine Meadow is located, searched for Miss Thiery last Saturday night. She jumped from a passenger train on the Central New England railroad as it whizzed by the Cherry Brook flag station, going at the rate of 40 miles an hour, but was not missed until the train reached Pine Meadow. The railroad company ordered out a special train to look for the young woman, but the train hands were unable to find any trace of her.

A tributary of the Farmington river flows under the railroad close to the Cherry Brook station, and it was thought that Miss Thiery had landed in the stream and been carried down.

After the search had been given up by the train men Mr. Thiery hitched up his horse and started with a posse well supplied with lanterns for Cherry Brook to search for the missing girl. While descending what is known as Indian hill, in Canton, they discovered Miss Thiery walking home. She was unharmed after her daring leap. Asked why she left the train at Cherry Brook, she said she thought the brakeman called out Pine Meadow.

PELTS AS CURRENCY

MINKS AND OTTERS WERE LIKE UNTO GOVERNMENT BONDS.

The Days When Muskrats and Coons and Foxes and Wolves and Bears Were the People's Money, So to Speak, in New York State.

The man of leisure from New York City who had been lazing away a fortnight or so of his not particularly valuable time at Kyserick, in Ulster county, N. Y., had made up his mind to return to his haunts in the metropolis and nonchalantly tossed the tavern keeper a one hundred dollar note out of which to take pay for his bill. "It didn't seem pertic'lar queer in them days the way things was run on that pelt currency, but I've an idee it'd strike folks a leetle sing'lar nowadays. 'Pears to me I'd have to snort out laughin' my own self if a feller should come to me an' say:

"'Deacon, I'm a leetle financially embarrassed today. Ken you lend me a foxskin for a couple o' days or so?"

"'Leetle high, Silas. Can't stan' it. Give you three coons fer 'em."

"'No. Can't be did nohow. Best I ken do is three coons an' a muskrat."

"That'd be funnier to me than a nigger show now. An' somethin' like this would bu'st my buttons, I know it would:

"'Deacon, ken you give me change fer a wolf?"

"'Yes, but I'll have to give you all muskrats."

"'But we didn't think nothin' o' it in them days, 'cause it was reg'lar business. That circ'latin' mejum was a leetle onhandy in one way, though. Folks had to carry their currency around in a bushel bag if they was out to do much cash business, an' if they was b'arskin men, why, Judas preachin', they had to carry it in a wagon."

"'But them days o' pelt currency was the good old days, I tell you. Still," said the deacon after a pause, "I dunno but I ken manage to slide along jest as cheerful in these days o' gold an' silver an' paper currency, even though it is all pervadin' skeerce."
