THE GOVERNOR'S SPEECH.

The speech from the throne delivered by His Honor Governor Snowball at the opening of the legislature, deals with several important matters and gives promise of considerable legislation of a character likely to aid in the development of the province's resources.

The speech, after referring to the visits of the Prince and Princess of Wales and the vice-regal party, speaks of the horror felt by the people of New Brunswick at the assassination of President McKinley. Reference is also made to the splendid results from the government's policy of encouraging the dairy industry and the promised development of the mineral resources of the province by the building of the Fredericton-Chipman railway. The bonusing of flour mills has greatly encouraged the raising of wheat in New Brunswick, and thousands of dollars that formerly went out of the province to buy bread for our people now remain and circulate at home.

The speech quite properly expresses gratification at the great expansion of St. John's winter port business, and intimates that the government will press for its share of the Halifax fishery award, and for the realization of the Quebec conference resolutions making claim for a readjustment of the subsidies paid the various provinces by the federal government.

The government's proposal to press on the Dominion authorities the advisability of the latter operating the various branch railways of the province in connection with the I. C. R., is one that should have the unanimous support of the legislature. Several of these lines are in an advanced state of decay, but could be made profitable and better serve the public if operated in the way proposed by the government.

The measures promised for the session are of much importance, and the opposition certainly cannot complain that the speech is lacking in good things, worthy of the earnest attention of the members of the House.

Mr Monk the Tory adjutant at Ottawa, was taken in hand in Parliament by Sir Wilfred Laurier and taught something about constitutional practice. Mr Monk wanted the correspondence between the British and United States governments relating to the Clayton-Bulwer treaty and the Alaskan boundary, but the premier pointed out to him that while negotiations were pending, it would be the highest breach of parliamentary etiquette to expose any negotiations pending with foreign countries.

Prince Henry of Prussia spent a couple of hours on Canadian soil yesterday at Niagara, where he viewed the falls and was welcomed on behalf of Lord Min'ro by Major Maude, and received an address from the Ontario legislature.

Members of the legislature will miss the presence of the genial and popular Hon H A McKeown, who is abroad seeking to regain strength after the terrible domestic affliction which overtook him.

DeWet has not been captured, but he was winged by the British, receiving a wound in the arm during his recent successful attempt of breaking through the British lines.

Editor Scott of the Sun has gone to Ottawa for the session, and we may anticipate some tall yarns from that vicinity during the next few weeks.
