VERY KIND OF HIM.

Mr. Pitts, who comes home occasionally to regulate the community, drops a stray paragraph into the Reporter columns, just to keep his hand cunning in the gas business.

Mr. Pitts' article this week is a warning to the electors of York to get ready for a local election, which he thinks will be called on in a couple of months.

It is very kind in the gas manager to drop in upon us and put us on our guard in such an important matter.

Mr. Pitts also assures his brethren of the opposition that there is a good opening in this county for a solid four of that party—a fine piece of optimism that must be appreciated by those whose hearts are intended to be cheered by Mr. Pitts' assurance.

We fear Mr Pitts is looking at the situation through smoked glasses, and cannot realize the real position of his party in this constituency. He is well enough up in matters hereabouts to know that a large part of the backbone of the opposition has removed either westward or into the government camp since the election of 1899, when Mr. Pitts and his colleagues were so badly downed in their appeal to the people. Let him count heads of those who still profess allegiance to the opposition, and he will discover that there are very many breaks, not only in the line of alleged leaders, but also in the rank and file; that the opposition is practically disorganized and dismantled, spiritless and hopeless.

For this condition Mr. Pitts himself is in a measure responsible, and his friend and co-worker, Mr. McLeod, must share part of the blame. They thought they were the whole opposition outfit,—“captain, cook and bos'n's mate of the schooner Nancy Jane.” They forced election contests when the people did not want to fight, and alienated a great many level headed, influential men from the party, which will resent Mr. Pitts' present cheerful words, when a funeral oration over the ruins of the party would be more in order.

IDENTIFIED WITH CANADA.

Major Wood, of the Northwest Mounted Police, who is acting administrator of the Yukon during the illness of Governor Ross, is a Haligonian, son of Capt. J. Taylor Wood, a Southern gentleman who settled in the Nova Scotia capital at the close of the American Civil war and has actively identified himself with the interests of that city. Capt. Wood enjoys the distinction of having taken a Southern warship out of the dangerous Eastern passage at night while a federal warship was diligently watching at the Halifax harbor mouth to gather him in as one of the spoils of war.

A son of Capt. Wood was among the first of the Canadian officers to meet death in the South African war, and now another son has risen to the dignity of deputy governor in Canada.

The Woods came of the best Southern stock, and during the rebellion were high up in the councils of the late Jefferson Daws.

FREDERICTON'S CELEBRATION.

Now that it is definitely known that a public holiday will be proclaimed throughout Canada on the occasion of the King's coronation on Saturday Aug. 9, the proposed celebration of the event in this city, will be pushed forward with all the zeal the committee and the citizens can command.

The mayor has called the committee to meet at 8 o'clock tomorrow evening, and doubtless there will be a full attendance. Preparations for the celebration were practically completed, so far as the committee could accomplish the business, when the coronation was postponed, and it will be an easy matter to set the machinery again in motion. The co-operation of all the citizens however, is necessary to make the day's program a complete success, and no doubt this will be cheerfully given. There should be a cessation of business on the day of the celebration, so that employers and employees alike may be able to participate in the events of the programme. The people will rejoice at the King's recovery from a dangerous malady, as well as at the completion of the ceremony which crown him as the sovereign of the Empire.

Let everybody be prepared to enter heartily and enthusiastically into the celebration.

THE KING'S HEALTH.

Very satisfactory reports come from the King. His Majesty apparently is steadily regaining his strength, is able to walk a little about the deck of the royal yacht, and if nothing unexpected occurs in his case, he will be able on August 9, to undergo whatever fatigue may be connected with the coronation ceremonies.

It is clear, however, that some weeks must yet elapse before His Majesty will be fully equal to assume the full duties and responsibilities of his exalted position—that a season of absolute quiet and rest must succeed the coronation, but His Majesty's loyal subjects rejoice that a kind Providence has watched over his sick bed, is gradually restoring his strength, and that the prospects now are most favorable for his complete convalescence.

Mr. Blair, Senator Thompson, Mr. W. T. Whitehead and Mr. David Russell are off for England together. This looks like business.—Sun.

Yes, and pleasure too. The gentlemen comprising the party will pay their own expenses. There are at least a couple of the Sun's staff, who during the Tory regime, enjoyed a trip to England at the country's expense.

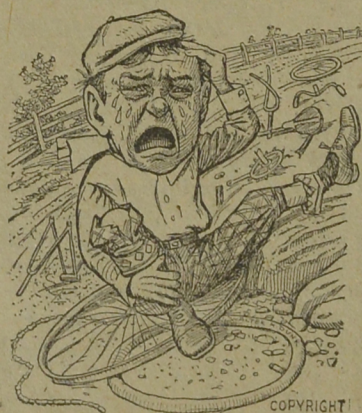
