THE KING WALKS.

Able to Pace Yacht's Deck Without As
sistance.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Cowes, Isle of Wight, July 31.—Today's bulletin on the condition of King Edward says: "His Majesty has made rapid progress since Monday last.

His general condition continues all that could be desired.

The wound is closing satisfactorily, the King is now able to walk the entire length of the pavilion deck, without assistance."

Cowes, July 31.—Favored by perfect weather the royal yacht cruised westward today. (The King sat in the shadow of an awning with the Queen by his side.

London, July 31.—King Edward's progress continues to be in every way satisfactory. He slowly paced the deck of the royal yacht Victoria and Albert without any assistance and the exercise is reported to have done him good.

The Earl of Denbigh, one of the King's lords in waiting, speaking at a public meeting, said he saw no reason why the King should not be strong enough to undergo the fatigue incident to the coronation on Aug. 9.

Queen Alexandra, while attending the coronation fetes at Whippingham, Isle of Wight, last evening, confirmed the statements concerning the King's splendid progress, and said he could now walk across the deck of the royal yacht, and that he preferred remaining off Cowes to taking another cruise.

The king has signed his approval of the arrangements for the coronation procession, which provide that their majesties shall travel to and from Westminster Abbey in the great state coach and by the route originally arranged. King Edward feels entire confidence in his ability to carry out this intention. Should the weather prove fine enough it is expected he will cruise to Portland and back today. It is said that he has moved, practically unaided, from his couch in the cabin to the table.

BROKER ARRESTED.

Alleged to be Guilty of Embezzlement at
Sydney.

Halifax, July 31.—L. L. Gullivan of Sydney, real estate and stock broker, was arrested here yesterday on a warrant from Sydney charging him with absconding and embezzlement. L. E. Prowse, of Prowse Brothers & Crowell, laid the information, stating that he had given Gullivan \$2,400 to invest in a certain stock and that he had fraudulently converted the money to his own use. The creditors and Prowse Bros. & Crowell, \$2,400; Dr. Rice, \$3,000; Dr. Copperthwaite, \$600; employees of the Sydney Record, \$400. Gullivan's stock brokering transactions were made through the firm of McCurdy & Co. of this city, who, it is said, may have a balance on hand sufficiently large to meet Gullivan's liabilities. He was taken to Sydney today.

London, July 31.—John Redmond, leader of the Irish party in the house of commons, entertained Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Premier Edward Barton, of Australia, at dinner last night in the House of Commons. 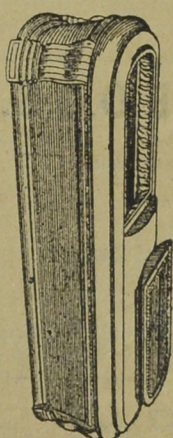

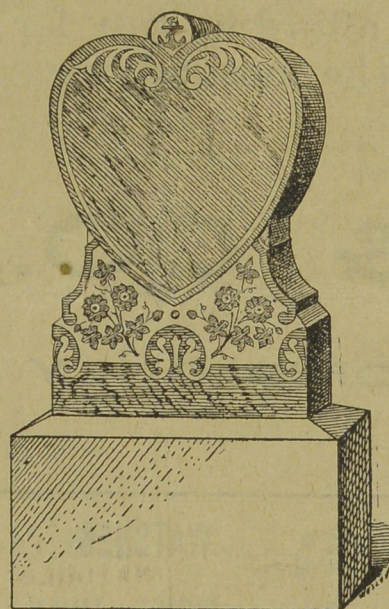
