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CANADIANS REVIEWED.

Men of the Coronation Contingent Under Royal Eyes.

A BRILLIANT PAGEANT AT LONDON

In Which the Queen, Prince of Wales and Canadian Statesmen Were Prominent.

London, July 2.—Heat and mist hung over Alexandra Palace at an early hour on Tuesday morning, as the Canadians started for the great Royal review. Though the haze cleared somewhat the sky was still clouded when the colonial troops, headed by the Canadians, marched into the Horse Guards' parade grounds, shortly before 11 o'clock, to the music of the Queen's Own Bugle Band, of Toronto.

As the men drew up across the parade ground Colonels Pellatt, Thompson and Turner commanding the multi-coloured uniformed force, varying from khaki to vermilion, formed a striking contrast to the uniformity of the other contingents.

The arrival of royalty was heralded by the approach of a body guard of the first Life Guards, who were immediately followed by a carriage containing Queen Alexandra, the Princess of Wales, Princess Victoria and Princess Charles of Denmark.

Shortly after followed the Prince of Wales, in the red uniform of a British general, on horse back, accompanied by the Duke of Connaught, Lord Roberts and the headquarters staff, and lastly, a brilliant detachment of foreign envoys, the splendour of whose uniforms added immensely to the picturesqueness of the spectacle.

The Grenadier Band now played the National Anthem, and the Queen's carriage, followed by the Prince of Wales and his staff, and the foreign envoys, drove along the line. The Royal party received a tremendous reception from the assembled crowds following the review.

The Prince of Wales presented Victoria Crosses and distinguished conduct medals to a number of officers drawn up before him, shaking hands with those who won Crosses.

Then came the grand march past. The Canadians were most warmly cheered, though they suffered in appearance from the irregularity of their uniforms and headgear in comparison the Australasians, all of whom were khaki clad, with wide awake hats.

Intense interest was displayed in the bare legged, bare headed men from Borneo and the Fiji Islanders, who received a great ovation.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Lady Laurier, Lord Strathcona and all the Canadian Ministers and Premiers, were present on the grand stands erected for the coronation.

The Queen passed four times, graciously bowing and smiling in response to the huzzas and cheers of the vast multitude.

Colonel Pellatt, with his staff, created a good impression.

At the conclusion of the ceremony the Canadians celebrated Dominion Day by marching to the Canadian arch, at Whitehall, where they formed up to the music of the Canadian Bugle Band. A huge crowd awaited the arrival of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Lady Laurier. The troops went through various evolutions, being photographed by scores of cameras. They then marched away to Victoria station.

New York, July 2.—The correspondent of the Tribune in London cables:

The review of Colonial troops yesterday, which hastily arranged, was a picturesque spectacle, which created marked enthusiasm among the multitude of sightseers from Victoria station to the Horse Guards' parade. About 2,150 men were in line, including all the body guards and escorts which were to have taken part in the second day's procession after the coronation. The Canadian contingent was large and the stand made a fine display, the men marching with true military bearing, the bulk of the force being well-seasoned veterans of the war in South Africa. The Australian contingent was next in strength and, like the New Zealanders, was made up of sun-browned, brawny men.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Edmund Barton, Mr. Seddon and a great company of Colonial officials occupied seats of honour and witnessed the honours paid the Imperial contingents as the Queen and Prince of Wales passed up and down the five or six lines of troops drawn up across the parade ground. The Queen looked

handsome and animated, and the Prince of Wales older and graver than usual. Nearly all the members of the royal family were present, and many of the foreign envoys and princes still remaining in London. The reception of the Queen by the immense throng of spectators, exceeded in heartiness any recent demonstration of loyalty and affection to any member of the royal family.

The Dominion troops made a detour from the Horse Guards parade to Whitehall for the purpose of passing under the Canadian arch, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the other premiers followed them in royal carriages.

CANADIAN SOLDIERS DINE IN LONDON.

The officers of the Colonial contingents in London were entertained at dinner at the Cafe Royal, on June 23 by the officers of the Canadian contingent. Lieut. Colonel Pellatt presided, and the company included the Hon Dr Borden, Canadian Minister of Militia; General Cooke, commanding the colonial contingents at Alexandra Park and C. A. Duff Miller, Agent-General for New Brunswick.

After the toast of "Comrades in Arms" had been drunk, the health of General Cooke was submitted by Colonel Thompson, M. P., who pointed out that as sturdy a race of yeomen was reared on the broad plains of Canada, New Zealand and Australia as in England itself.

General Cooke briefly acknowledged the toast.

The Hon. Dr. Borden afterwards spoke. He said he was privileged to meet the soldiers of the King from all parts of the Empire, because he had lived to see the day when British officers were prepared to acknowledge Colonial officers to be on a level with themselves. These were days in which the history of the British Empire was made. The visit of the Colonial premiers to London in '97 was the first important step in bringing about that feeling of good-fellowship which had resulted in sending a magnificent army of Colonials to South Africa to fight the battles of the Empire. They heard of busybodies worrying about the future of the Empire, but it seemed to him that there was no occasion for them to trouble. The future of the British Empire was already solved. It had been solved on the battlefields of South Africa.

There was no need for the Colonies to write down a bond of what they should do, for there was a bond which had been written in the blood of the Colonists which had been spilt in South Africa in defence of the Empire. That was the true bond; that was the only bond which was worth anything. All they needed was freedom to solve their own problems of self-government. He hoped the Boers would follow the example of the French Canadians.

DUCHESS OF FIFE ACTED AS ENGINEER.

Brighton, Eng., July 4.—As an engineer the Duchess of Fife has made her latest daring venture. The experience of King Edward's daughter was novel in the extreme. She and her husband had come to this city on purpose to inspect a new express passenger engine, named "The Duchess of Fife," in honour of Her Royal Highness. The engine is designed to draw heavy trains between Brighton and London in less than an hour's time and cost \$50,000. Having heard an explanation of the mechanism, the Duchess said she wished to take the engineer's place on a trial. Thereupon the driver and fireman vacated their places and the Duke and Duchess took them. Then with the engineer standing on the footplate, the Duchess started and skillfully drove the engine along. The Duchess says she is delighted with the experience.

A MODERN HORSE SHOW.

Lovers of the horse will see lots to interest them at the St John Exhibition. On Monday, September 1st, Labor day, there will be a parade of 500 cart and team horses; these animals will be judged before the Grand stand and prizes awarded. On Tuesday there will be a grand parade of double and single hitches and prizes awarded. On Wednesday and Thursday there will be the horse racing of the season at Moosepath Park and on the remaining days as well as every day there will be horse parades with all the modern horse show features.

The Colonial Secretary and Mrs. Chamberlain were "at home" last night, at 40 Princes-gardens, to meet the Royal guests from the colonies. It was a notable gathering, representative of every part of the Empire and every clime. Time seems to overlook these Colonial chiefs. Who would think that Sir Wilfrid Laurier was sixty-one? Here is Mr. Seddon at fifty-seven with all the energy and self-reliance he possessed when he left Lancashire forty years ago; and here Sir J. Gordon Sprigg, at seventy-two, whom delicacy in youth sent to South Africa and caused him to become thrice Prime Minister of Cape Colony. Sir Gordon looks at the bright side of things, and optimism is one of the secrets of longevity. Sir Albert Hime, "saviour of Natal," you take on trust, is sixty; but how much cheerier he looks today than in the dark hours of 1899! Lord Strathcona is by the records eighty-two, but is lithe and alert and straight as an arrow. The mingling of guests and visitors was charming, and all agreed that the suggested triennial gathering of Colonial Premiers will be a most desirable consummation. It was impossible to associate with these builders and rulers of the Empire without feeling that they have much to teach the Mother Country and each other.
