REV. DR. CHAPMAN.

After a faithful service extending over forty-five years, Rev. Dr. Chapman closed his ministry, and his years pastorate at the Methodist church Sunday night, and will leave the middle of the week to take up his residence at Amherst.

Dr. Chapman, who is a native of Fort Lawrence, Cumberland Co., N. S., where he was born in 1835, was educated at Sackville Academy, and studied theology at Mount Allison College. He was ordained to the ministry in 1857, his first settled charge being at Pugwash, N. S. He afterwards served at Point de Bute, St. George, Bermuda, Richibucto, Albion Mines, now known as Stellarton, N. S., Fairville, St. John, Hillsboro, Point de Bute a second time, Sackville, St. Andrew's, Chatham, Newcastle, Baie Verte, Marysville, Fairville, again, Woodstock, Point de Bute a third time, and finally Fredericton. He has been chairman of various districts and president of the conference. In the earlier years of his ministry all the Methodist churches of the Maritime provinces, Newfoundland and Bermuda were embraced in the Eastern British America Conference and Dr. Chapman was present when the division was made into three conferences.

Dr. Chapman was ordained with eight other young men in Centenary church St. John, and only one other, Rev. Dr. Read, besides Dr. Chapman survives.

Dr. Chapman has been an earnest, faithful and popular preacher, a strong church worker, and a popular pastor, and his numerous friends all over the maritime provinces will wish him and Mrs. Chapman all possible happiness in their closing days.

The Methodist people of this city among whom Dr. Chapman has labored during the past year part with him and his esteemed lady with sincere regret. Their work, and social intercourse have been inspiring, and among members of other churches they have also enjoyed a large degree of popularity. The Herald joins the numerous friends of the worthy couple in wishing them continued prosperity, health and happiness in their new home.

STILL HOPEFUL.

The Toronto Globe, while admitting that the Ross Government's majority of one is not much to boast off, is not altogether discouraged. It says that "there is a fine optimistic spirit throughout the ranks, as if the impression prevailed that whatever the fortunes of war may be, Mr. Ross and the Liberal party, after the final move is made, will go on governing the province. The position is that up to date, with everything deducted that is in sight, the government has a clear majority of one. One constituency, North Renfrew, is vacant, the Liberal member, Mr. Munro, having died after being elected by a majority of nearly 500. We have no intention of counting chickens before they are hatched, but it certainly is proof of a strong Mark Tapley strain for the opposition to be virtually claiming the seat in advance, when their candidate was almost 500 "down" at the recent election. We prefer to wait for the verdict North Renfrew will itself render on the case in due time."

A local government in Quebec was kept in power for some time by the casting vote of the speaker, the British Columbia government came through the recent session with apparently no majority at all, so there would seem a fair chance for Premier Ross and his colleagues pulling through, although it must be admitted that the situation is ticklish.

Dr. R. H. Upham a former resident of Woodstock but now a successful physician practising in Boston and president of the Canadian club, writes to the Sun strongly advising the young men and women of Canada not to emigrate to the United States. He states that there is poor opportunity for securing employment, all kinds of labor being overcrowded by European emigrants who live more cheaply than Canadians, and can better stand starvation wages. Dr. Upham says: "My advice to the young men and women of Canada is, stay at home. There opportunities are better there at the present time than they are here. If the young people of the eastern provinces are not satisfied with home conditions let them try the Canadian Northwest."

People all over the province will sincerely regret to learn of the death of Rev. John Murray, parish priest of Johnville. The deceased had been a faithful and energetic clergyman of the Roman Catholic church for nearly half a century, and leaves behind ample evidence of the good work he accomplished in the various fields he occupied during his long life. Personally, Father Murray was a most companionable gentleman, enjoyed a very liberal education, and made warm friends wherever he went. His loss to his parish and to the church is a serious one.

The first Boer prisoners to return to South Africa, were those exiled at St. Helena, and forming part of Cronje's army, and it is a strange coincidence that the ship they sailed in was The Canada. Cronje's men surrendered to Canadians at Paardeberg.
