

THE DOHERTY MURDER.

St. John Police Have not yet Discovered a Tangible Clue.

(St. John Telegraph.)

Another day has passed and still no clue that would lead to even a suspicion as to who the slayer of William Doherty is.

Deputy Chief Jenkins and Detective Killen are working faithfully night and day following up every slight piece of information heard regarding the terrible tragedy. Chief Clark was also hard at work yesterday but his inquiries and searching, like that of his officers, were evidently fruitless for no suspect is yet behind bars. The police have a good many difficulties to contend with in ferreting out the truth. Many rumors are constantly being heard by the police and are found on investigation to have very little information in them or have been merely passing remarks made by persons who know nothing of the affair any more than what they have read in the daily papers.

Coroner Berryman for the past two evenings has had his office occupied by about a dozen of Doherty's young friends and companions. Deputy Chief Jenkins and Detective Killen have been present and the coroner has held a thorough investigation, closely questioning the boys regarding Doherty. But he does not care to talk much as to the result of his inquiries, any more than to say that very little light has been thrown on the case. The boys all speak in the most friendly manner regarding their late companion.

In connection with the theory that Doherty on Friday was seen with South African soldiers, it is learned that the men who returned on the Castrian did not have an issue of revolver, nor did those who went out of the previous contingent under Colonel Evans. The second contingent men were equipped, however, with Colt weapons of 45 calibre. About all the second-hand stores were visited yesterday, and inquiries made relative to the recent sale or pawning of revolvers. In one Dock street establishment it was found that on Friday last a 22 and 32 calibre revolver had been sold an old man, presumably from the country, who was accompanied by a child.

The Old Pikemen.

In the days when the musket was in its infancy as a defense against charging cavalry it was almost useless. It was as much as could be hoped for if the musketeer got off one shot, to a certainty badly directed, owing to the eccentricities of his weapon, before the horsemen would be on him. Consequently we find that the pikeman was a person of considerable importance, and in a volume of 1659 the most elaborate instructions are given to govern the drill and tactics of the pikemen, who in action were, as a rule, placed in bodies among the musketeers to stand the brunt of the shock of the cavalry attack.

And we learn from history that these pikemen did vallant service on occasion; for instance, when the pikemen of the London trained bands withstood the repeated and desperate assaults of Prince Rupert's cavaliers. But their drill was no child's play. For example, in the pages devoted to "The Postures and Charges of the Pike" we find the following:

"And here, Fellow Souldier, whoever thou art, thou maist perceive that there are no more than eight Postures of the Pike and foure Charges, that is to say, to the Front, Reer, and both Flanks."—Contemporary Review.

Peculiarities of Lichens.

The lichen is remarkable for the great age to which it lives, there being good grounds for believing that the plants endure for 100 years. Their growth is exceedingly slow, almost beyond belief, indicating that only a little nourishment is necessary to keep them alive. In a dry time they have the power to suspend growth altogether, renewing it again at the fall of rain. This peculiarity alone is enough to make the lichen a vegetable wonder, as it is a property possessed by no other species of plant.

Another interesting fact about lichens is that they grow only where the air is free from dust and smoke. They may be said to be a sure indication of the purity of the air, as they are never found growing in cities and towns, where the atmosphere is impregnated with dust, soot, smoke and other impurities.

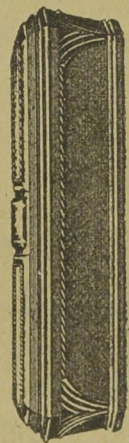

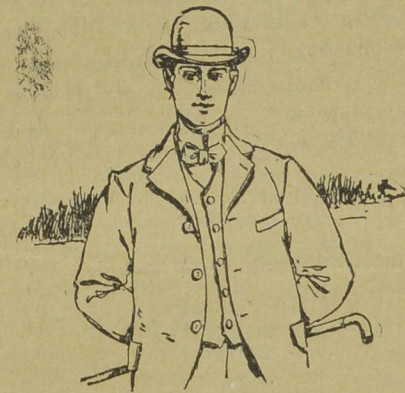
