THE PREMIER'S RETURN.

No returning hero ever received a more hearty welcome than has been extended to Sir Wilfrid Laurier on his landing on his native soil after an extended European trip.

The reception was all the more significant and pleasing from the fact that it was non-political. The despatches say that almost the entire population of Quebec city turned out to welcome Sir Wilfrid. Partyism for the time was forgotten, and Grit and Tory united to celebrate the premier's home coming. Sir Wilfrid's opponents may criticize his political acts, but in their hearts they highly esteem and admire his splendid personality, his ungrudging, patriotic services to the country.

Since Sir Wilfrid's departure some months ago he has participated in the conference of colonial premiers with Mr. Chamberlain, the coronation festivities, has been honored by the rulers of France, the land of his ancestors, has visited Switzerland and other European countries for recreation, paid his respects to the head of his church at Rome, and on his return from the continent participated in a grand demonstration at Liverpool where he was given a rousing send off.

Many reports regarding the premier's health have reached Canada, some of them representing him as a sick man, advised by a celebrated physician to retire from public life, but the presence of Sir Wilfrid at home in good health gives the lie to the rumors industriously circulated alleging that he was a broken down man and unable to longer continue in his exalted position.

The people of Canada rejoice, not only because the premier is home again, but because of the assurance that he is physically fit to discharge his responsible duties in the government of the country.

A thousand welcomes to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the most popular premier Canada has ever had, a statesman, a patriot and a gentleman.

It is expected that the striking coal miners will be at work on Thursday next, and it is estimated that the first twenty-four hours' operations will yield ready for shipment from 40,000 to 60,000 tons of coal. It is the purpose of the railway officials to send the first train load direct to New York, the second to Philadelphia and continue to send to the distributing agents' trains as rapidly as they can be loaded. Probably some months will elapse before any products of the mines reach Canada, and by that time our fuel problem will be pretty well solved. It is a misfortune to Canada that in the matter of hard coal supply we are dependent upon a foreign country.

The Chatham Advance observes that when Mr. Hazen went to Chatham to beard the lion (Premier Tweedie) in his den, as the Sun editor put it, the opposition leader knew Mr. Tweedie was in Fredericton attending a meeting of the government and that the "den" was empty and as safe to Mr. Hazen as a sheepfold. This explanation removes all the heroism from Mr. Hazen's exploit at Chatham, and shows that he has still a reputation to make as a lion barker.

Justice was prompt in the case of a Texas negro who murdered a whole family. Ten days after the crime, the

murderer was judicially hanged, the execution occurring two hours after he had pleaded guilty and received sentence. The judge's great haste in fixing the date of the execution was due to the clamor of a mob for the person of the murderer.

British Columbia newspapers publish extended accounts of the very hearty reception accorded to Hon. A. G. Blair at Vancouver and Victoria. In the former city the Minister of Railways was made honorary president of the Liberal club.

It is said that Lord Roberts has promised the American generals visiting England, that he will come to America next year. "Bobs" will be given a welcome scarcely second to that received by royalty.

The Hampton and St Martin's Railway Co., yielding to pressure put upon it by the local government, has decided to operate its road during the winter.
