THE CEREMONY WITNESSED BY A LARGE NUMBER OF SPECTATORS.

A Description of the Happy Event—List of Invited Guests, etc.

The Methodist church was the scene of a fashionable wedding at 3.45 o'clock this afternoon, the principals in the happy event, being Miss A. Cora Reid, daughter of Robert A. Reid of St. Leonards, and Harry W. Bailey, a prosperous young lumberman of Little River, Sunbury county. The church was crowded to its fullest capacity with interested spectators, nearly one hundred of whom were invited guests. The decorations consisted of cut flowers and potted plants, tastefully arranged about the altar, and made a very pretty effect.

Punctually at the appointed hour the bridal party entered the church and moved up the aisle to the strains of Lohengrin's wedding march from the organ, presided over by L. A. Wilmet Lemont. The marriage ceremony was performed by Rev. James Crisp, of Gibson, in the absence of Rev. J. A. Rogers, the regular pastor of the church.

Murray Bailey of this city, cousin of the bridegroom, discharged the duties of best man, and the bride was given in marriage by her nephew, Mr. Fred Percival Colter.

At the conclusion of the impressive ceremony, the members of the bridal party and guests left the church, to the strains of Meodelshon's wedding march from the organ, and repaired to the residence of the bride's sister, Mrs. J. E. Colter, King street, where a reception was held by the bride and groom and a sumptuous wedding dejeuner was served. The parlor and dining room were very prettily decorated with flowers and evergreens, the dining table with its load of choice viands, looking particularly attractive.

THE GRIDIRON.

The Acadia Team Played to a Stand by the U. N. B. Boys.

The football match on the college athletic field yesterday afternoon between teams from the U. N. B. and Acadia College, were keenly contested and proved very interesting to the large number of spectators in attendance. The game resulted in a draw, neither side being able to put the pigskin over the line, though they tried hard enough to accomplish that end.

Acadia won the toss and kicked off, but the ball was soon returned to the territory, and with such vigor did the U. N. B. boys follow it up that the visitors were forced to touch for safety quite early in the game. The first half was played in the vicinity of Acadia's goal and the boys from over the bay had to do some tall hustling to prevent a score from being made on them. Their forward line was much heavier than that of the U. N. B., and got settled down much quicker, but the home players displayed more agility, and while unable to force a defence line of their opponents, usually managed to break it up. Lombard an Acadia forward was slightly injured during the first half, and White, the big colored gladiator, had his boots torn to pieces, and had to be re-shod, which operation necessitated a delay of about ten minutes. The referee's whistle for half time found the ball dangerously close to Acadia's goal line.

The Acadias started in with a rush on play being resumed, and sent the ball quite close to the U. N. B. goal. It was quickly returned however, but the visitors were on their metal and did not allow it to remain long in their territory. A series of scrimmages followed, and there was considerable dribbling but not much headway was made by either side. When the referee closed the game the ball was in scrimmage inside the U. N. B. 25 yard line.

While the colored player, who was the most conspicuous figure on the field, was ever on the alert for business, a close watch was kept upon him and he was never allowed to get very far with the ball. He received some hard knocks during the last half, being partially stunned on one occasion, but soon recovered. Boggs, Estey, Bates and Bowes also did good work for Acadia.

For the U. N. B. team Goodeed played a star game, and was always in the right place at the right moment. Peters, Delong, Coleman, Patterson, Loggie and Malloy also made a splendid showing.

James Tibbits refereed the game in a highly satisfactory manner, and the touch judges were William Babbitt for the U. N. B., and Hawkins for Acadia.

MONTREAL'S GREETING.

Montreal, Oct. 18.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier arrived at the Place Viger station at half past two o'clock on the regular train from Quebec, to which was attached a private car for his accommodation.

On his arrival at the station he was met by the Mayor and a deputation from the city council as well as commercial bodies and a large number of citizens who welcomed him heartily to the metropolis.

The presentation of the civic address was made by Mayor Cochrane on the balcony in front of Place Viger Hotel.

Sir Wilfrid went on to Ottawa by train leaving this city at four o'clock.

A BRITISH BLUE BOOK.

London, Oct. 18.—A blue book has been issued containing a detailed report of officers appointed by the commander in chief of the army to inquire into the working of the remount department. The reports generally speak favorably of the arrangements of the department and of the class of animals purchased.

Dealing with Canada the report says the Dominion does not appear to be able to furnish a very large number of horses and that the supply is not likely to increase unless breeding is stimulated by a steady and permanent demand for army horses, and unless suitable selected stallions are introduced.

A GOOD SHOWING.

Montreal, Oct. 18.—The traffic department of the C. P. R. feel particularly well satisfied with the way in which the wheat crop is being moved this year.

Up to the 15th instant there were 9,771,920 bushels marketed against 4,368,158 for the same period last year, and 5,919 cars loaded against 4,353 last year.

RESTOCKING BOER FARMS.

Pretoria, Oct. 18.—Hon. Arthur Lawley, lieutenant governor of the Transvaal colony, in replying to a deputation of farmers who had waited upon him, announced that the government had decided to loan on first mortgages on land a sum not exceeding £2,500,000 at 4½ per cent. for the exclusive purpose of re-stocking the farms.

THE MINERS' CONVENTION.

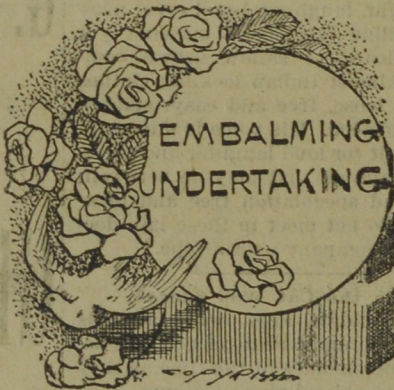
