CAPT. LISTER'S FATHER.

Interred at Sarnia Amid General
Mourning.

In Lakeview cemetery, Sarnia, Ont.,
Wednesday, almost within sight of the
school in which he received his early
training and the hall in which he fought
the first of his political battles which
made him famous, the last scene in the
life of Mr James Lister, late Justice of
the Ontario Court of Appeals, was enacted.
In spite of the blizzard men from
all parts of the County of Lambton,
gathered to pay their last token of res-
pect.

The body of the late Justice arrived
from Toronto at one o'clock, and the
casket was formally received by Dr. T.
G. Johnston, M. P., F. F. Pardee, M. P.
P., and others, who represented the
county. In response to a general wish to
view the remains the casket was taken to
St. George's Church, and there laid in
state for an hour. Before 3 o'clock hun-
dreds of people had passed into the
church and looked for the last time on
the face of the honored dead. The
chancel of the church was draped
in black and the coffin was liter-
ally covered with floral offerings.
Shortly after 3 o'clock the beautiful
burial service of the English Church be-
gan, Rev. Canon Davis officiating. The
church was filled to the doors, the
isles being almost impassable. In the
front pews sat the chief mourners:—Capt
Frederick Lister of Fredericton, N. B.;
Blake Lister of Toronto, sons; F. W.
Waddell of Hamilton and Dr. Harrison
of Sault Ste. Marie, sons-in-law; Lieut.-
Col Fisher of London; A. F. MacVicar
and Chas. MacVicar of Sarnia, cousins.
Canon Davis paid an eloquent tribute to
the life and character of the deceased
Judge. The funeral procession was the
largest seen in Sarnia for many years.

The service at the grave side was very
simple. Canon Davis read the burial
service and Rev. J. Thompson, of St.
Andrew's Presbyterian Church, led the
gathering in the Lord's prayer, the two
ministers standing side by side at the
foot of the grave.

Joseph Leiter, who made a sensational
corner in wheat in 1897 in Chicago, lies
dangerously ill in his apartments at No
22 West Thirty-third street, opposite the
Waldorf, New York. A consultation
of physicians was held. As its conclusion
no hopes were held out, but the doctors
said it would take two, or three days to
determine the result. Typhoid fever is
feared. Mrs Levi Z Leiter, the young
man's mother, living in Washington,
was telegraphed for. She arrived late
Wednesday afternoon, and is stopping at
the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, although
spending most of her time at her son's
bedside.

Last spring a Sudbury French-Can-
adian named Dumas, packed up a lot of
boots and winter wear in a box, in a
house where there had been smallpox.
The box lay in the back woodshed un-
til December, when Dumas started for
the lumber camps in the Lake of the
Woods district. He took the box with
him and used the contents, and was
immediately stricken with smallpox.
Dr Bryce reports that at least eight
cases of the disease have resulted there-
from.

couple of "polite burglars." Their method
was to "cover" Newark householders
with a revolver, and then enquire in the
sweetest and most dulcet tones where the
jewels and family plate reposed. History
repeats. The ways of the old-fashioned
gentlemanly highwayman of England's

housebreaker. The question, whether
this sort of politeness pays or not seems
to depend upon the vigilance of the
police.

Mrs Cohen, the Philadelphia Jewess—
arrested at Toronto, on the charge of be-
ing a party to a fraud by which her hus-
band got away with \$20,000, the proceeds
of goods supplied to his store by whole-
salers, was searched at Police Court head-
quarters by the matron, and \$3,000 in U.
S. bills were found concealed in her stock-
ing. Diamonds worth over \$500 were
found concealed in her skirt.

Indian Homes.

The young Indian wife of today is
clean, a fairly good cook and tidy with
her house, says an exchange. She is
not yet well versed in the art of decora-
tion, and red and green are pre-
dominating colors in all of her rooms,
whether in harmony or not. The house
has good furniture, but it is strangely
arranged. The lounge is a favorite
piece of furniture, and one sees it in
every Indian household, always in the
parlor. If the Indians have a piano or
organ, it goes into the bedroom. The
young buck's best saddle also goes into
the parlor, and in many houses it is
hung upon the wall. Red ribbons are
tied to everything, even the tail of the
cat, for no Indian household is com-
plete without a cat and a dog.

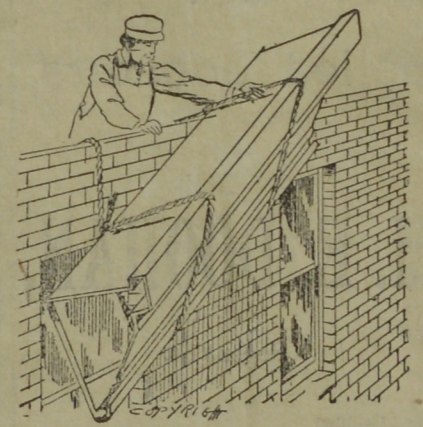

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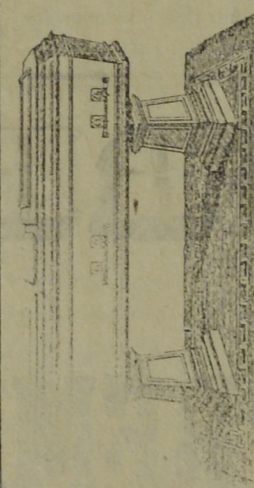
