THE VOYAGE ENDED.

Ottawa, Feb. 17.—The Governor-General has received a cablegram from the General of Communications at Capetown, stating that the Manhattan, with the first half of the Second Canadian Mounted Rifles, has reached Cape Town. Out of over 400 horses on board, only eight were lost during the voyage. [Five Fredericton members of the Mounted Rifles were on board the Manhattan.]

A RAILWAY RUMOR.

Montreal, Feb. 17.—It is announced from New York that Dr. Seward Webb, president of the New York Central railway, has made arrangements for the purchase of the Canadian Northern Railway, which runs from Quebec connecting with the Canadian Atlantic system at Hawkesburg, Ont. This will give a complete system for grain shipments from Parry Sound, Ont., through to Quebec.

NORTHWEST APPOINTMENTS.

Ottawa, Feb. 17.—Mr. Justice McGuire, of Prince Albert, has been appointed Chief Justice of the North-West Territories. Chief Justice McGuire will move to Calgary, and will be succeeded at Prince Albert by Judge Prendergast, of Winnipeg. This fills the vacancy on the Territorial bench caused by the death of Judge Rouleau, Mr. Royal, a Winnipeg barrister, and son of ex-Lieut-Governor Royal, of the North-West Territories, is spoken of as likely to succeed Judge Prendergast, as County Court Judge in Manitoba.

PERILS OF THE DEEP.

Steamer Arrives With Eighteen of The Crew of a Ship Wrecked in a Hurricane.

Galveston, Tex., Feb. 17.—The Head line steamer Torr Head arrived in port yesterday with a shipwrecked crew of 18 men of the ship Helene, which went to pieces in a hurricane on Feb. 3rd in lat. 37.13 N., and long. 40.43. Capt. H. Kohlstedt, master of the vessel, is included in the rescued crew.

The Helene left New York for Liverpool on Jan. 19 with a cargo of naphtha valued at \$80,000. On the morning of Jan. 31 the ship encountered the hurricane and for three days the crew struggled to keep the ship afloat.

Five of the crew succumbed to exhaustion before the end of the second day.

For 38 hours the 18 men aboard worked without food, pumping the water from the hold. The food that escaped the water was saturated with naphtha.

The Torr Head having steered 120 miles out of its course to avoid the hurricane, came across the Helene, which was sinking rapidly and before leaving his vessel Capt. Kohlstedt fired the ship and she sank in ten minutes. The crew of the Helene were brought to Galveston and delivered to the German consul here. All but four of the men have recovered and now are out of danger.

BABY WITH TRAVELING RECORD.

Only Sixteen Months Old, But Has Journeyed 35,000 Miles.

A sixteen-months-old girl who has travelled 35,000 miles is little Miss Katherine Lenore Adelia Glenwood. Since her birth in Glenwood Springs, Col., in the famous Colorado Hotel, until the present, sixteen months in all, she has been constantly on the go. She has visited thirty of the states and territories, have traversed the country from ocean to ocean and from Dainty to the Gulf several times, has toured Canada, and has been a guest at the principal English and continental cities. Her journeys cover a distance equal to 10,000 miles more than the circumference of the globe.

The average distance travelled each month since her birth has been 2,187 1-2 miles, or 72 8-10 miles a day. She has never been ill a day or an hour.

Probably the most remarkable phase of this young lady's remarkable life is that in all her travels by water she has never been seasick, although she has experienced some rough weather, which quickly drove her mother and father to their cabin.

Some amusing errors creep into the best conducted newspapers.
