THE SPORTSMEN'S SHOW

Crown Land Department to Send an Exhibit to Boston.

Messrs. Chestnut, Edgecombe, McCready and Allen of the Fredericton Tourist Association, waited upon the local government at the executive council chamber last evening, and urged that steps be taken to have New Brunswick represented at the Massachusetts Sportsmen's show to open at Boston on February 19th. Messrs. Chestnut and Edgecombe acted as spokesmen of the party, and pointed out to the members of the government the good results that had accrued to the province from the part taken in the Boston Exposition of March, 1898. They expressed the opinion that the New England states afforded the best field for advertising, both from the sportsmen's and tourists' standpoint, as far as this province is concerned, and hoped that the government would take advantage of the opportunity afforded by the coming sportsmen's show. The proposition made by the Tourist Association was that the government loan the collection of game animals and birds in the crown land office and defray the expenses of several guides and representatives of the Tourist Association to look after the New Brunswick booth.

It was pointed out that the management of the show had promised free space, and that the prospects were good for getting free transportation over the several lines of railways.

Fishery Commissioner D. G. Smith, of Chatham, accompanied the delegation and made a few remarks expressing his hearty sympathy with the movement.

The delegation was given a most attentive hearing and the government promised to give the matter careful consideration.

It is understood that the government referred the matter to the Surveyor General to take such action as he thought best, and he has decided to have an exhibit made under the auspices of the Crown Land Department.

DIED IN CHURCH.

James S. Connor Called Suddenly Away at Davenport, Iowa.

WAS A FORMER RESIDENT OF THIS CITY

And a Brother-in-Law of Henry Chestnut.

DECEASED WAS PROMINENT IN BUSINESS CIRCLES HERE YEARS AGO.

Some of our older citizens will well remember James Smith Connor, who was prominent in the business circles of Fredericton in the fifties.

His sudden death in Davenport, Iowa, is tenderly described in nearly two columns of the Davenport Democrat. Deceased was in his pew in the Presbyterian church on the last Sunday in December, when he expired. He had passed his eightieth year, and his first wife was a sister of our respected townsman, Mr. Henry Chestnut.

The Democrat says he was called to his reward from the posture of prayer, with the invocation of the dominie ringing in his ears, his last thought one of supplication to the Divine Being whom he had sincerely and rigorously served from his earliest days to his 83rd year, his last moments spent in one of the most beautiful structures reared by the church of which he was one of the patriarchs—the death of J. S. Connor, Sunday morning, was just such a life's ending as his friends would have wished for him.

Mr. Connor had been in his accustomed place when the services began, had risen as the strains of the Doxology resounded from the organ, had joined in singing "Praise God, from whom all blessings flow," and as the voice of the pastor was lifted in invocation, had rested his forehead upon his hand, laid on the back of the pew in front of him. There the summons found him.

The death of Mr. Connor will be especially mourned in Masonic circles. He belonged to all the Davenport Masonic bodies, his life membership in the chapter and commandery indicating 20 years of membership in both, the life membership succeeding that period. He was a 32nd degree Mason for many years, a Noble of the Mystic Shrine.

Mr. Connor was twice married, and leaves a widow and three daughters, Nettie C. Hattie J. and Anne E.
