St. John Exhibition.

On Saturday last we bailed with fitting expressions of joyous loyalty the event of the King's coronation. Although we could not personally witness the pageant in London, yet, in spirit, we were there. However, through the enterprise of Mr. G. H. Ireland, of Moving Picture fame, whose services the Exhibition Association has been fortunate to secure; our people will be able to view the whole grand affair; actually as it took place, and this much more comfortably than had they incurred the expenditure of hundreds of dollars by going over to London.

Mr. Ireland, with commendable foresight, some time ago engaged a high-classed photographer on the other side, to obtain for him moving pictures of the great event. "These pictures," he says, "are, from a technical standpoint, the finest he ever saw."

The foregoing is only one of a large series of intensely interesting events which the moving pictures will depict in the most life-like manner. Among the chief of these will be Mount Pelée in eruption, with lava flow-

ing from its crater, and showing the awful destruction cast over Martinique and the adjacent islands.

There is nothing fanciful about these pictures. They represent the truth, terrible and unadorned; for immediately on hearing the news of the appalling catastrophe, Mr. Ireland, regardless of expense, sent a highly capable photographer to the scene of devastation, and thus a full line of forcible, descriptive photos was obtained. This is certain to prove one of the Exhibition's most popular attractions; and will practically illustrate in a manner unlikely to be forgetting, the Titanic forces of nature in activity.

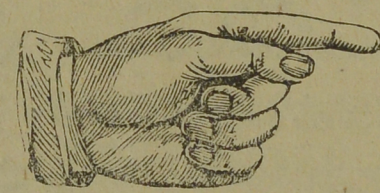
