The Schools.

The public schools of the city are to re-open on Tuesday of next week, when the changes lately made in the teaching staff will go into effect.

In Financial Difficulties.

The stock of Messrs Woodall & McKinley of the Imperial bakery, this city, has been seized under a bill of sale. The members of the firm have gone to the States.

Base Ball.

The Tartars and Imperials are to have a base ball match at Scully's Grove tomorrow afternoon for the local championship of the city. The game will be called at four o'clock.

Journalistic Improvements.

The St. John Sun is adding a new high speed news press, capable of printing 16 pages at one impression. It will be installed in a couple of months.

The Moncton Times is erecting a new brick building for itself, to cost \$8,000.

Good Fishing.

Owing to the very cold summer salmon fishing along the North Shore has not been quite as good as usual, but the lobster fishing has been very successful. The cod fishing has been very good indeed, considering the very boisterous season.

P. R. A. Matches.

Capt. Mersereau, of Doaktown, Sergt. Major James Pringle, Sergt. Arthur Pringle, Eric Clarkson, Dr. Wainwright and Rev. A. B. Murray of Stanley, passed through the city last evening, en route to Sussex to attend the P. R. A. matches which commenced at that place this morning. A. E. Massie and R. T. Mack of this city went down by the morning train to attend the matches.

Death at Nashwaak.

Catherine, widow of the late Thomas Shield, died this morning at the home of Spafford Wade, Nashwaak, aged 61 years. She had been ailing for about three months. The funeral will take place Wednesday at 1 o'clock. Interment at the Methodist cemetery at Nashwaak village. Rev. A. D. McLeod will conduct the funeral service, and R. B. Adams will have charge of arrangements.

For South Africa.

Hon. Joseph Chamberlain has cabled the secretary of state accepting the offer of two more Canadian teachers for South Africa. Cyrus Acheson, head master of the high school at Moncton, goes to be assistant master of the normal school at Pretoria, and Miss Anna L. Briggs, of the grammar school, Sussex, N. B., will be appointed assistant mistress at Pretoria or Johannesburg. Mr. Acheson was at one time a student at the U. N. B.

His Second Visit.

Joseph Starr, of Cornwallis, N. S., and Mrs. Starr, were among the arrivals in the city by boat yesterday. In conversation with a Herald representative, Mr. Starr stated that he visited Fredericton thirty years ago to attend a prize meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association held near the mouth of the Nashwaak, and had not been here since. He was struck by the many changes since his former

visit, and remarked that he should never have known the place.

WAR IN THE CAMP.

Local Salvationists are Having Heaps of Trouble.

Matters are not going along as smoothly in local salvation army circles as some of those connected with the organization would like. It will be remembered that several months ago, an officer connected with this station was courtmartialled for a breach of discipline and shortly afterwards went on the retired list and accepted a position in Palmer's tannery. It seems he had a number of sympathizers, who did not like the way he had been treated and of late some of them have not been attending the meetings, though continuing to wear the army uniform. Ensign and Mrs. Williams who have been in charge here since spring lately farwelled, and a young woman a lieutenant was sent here to take their place. The change seems to have given the "kickers" the opportunity they had been looking for and last Sunday afternoon they turned up in force and attempted to run things. The officer in charge and the audience refused to recognize them as Salvationists and the result was the meeting developed into a miniature bear garden. A similar scene is said to have been enacted at the evening meeting, and the trouble is not ended yet.

A staff officer from St. John is expected here during the week to endeavour to straighten things out.

For the Northwest.

About seventy five farm laborers, from points in York County and along the line of the Canada Eastern, left here last evening in a colonist sleeping car, attached to the six o'clock train, for Manitoba, to work in the harvest fields. Most of them were young men of rugged appearance and it is not unlikely that a number may remain in the west if the country suits them. There were also several girls and women in the party, including members of the family of James Craig, of St. Marys. The males from the city included J. W. Gerow, Alfred Slade, William Walker, L. A. Hagerman, and others. The total contingent from the Maritime provinces which started yesterday, numbered 2000 persons, and at St. John it was reinforced by fifty men from Boston. The fare to Winnipeg is \$10, and those who work a month at harvesting can return east for \$18.

Military Matters.

The following militia of fours have been authorized to join the Fredericton Military School for a course of instruction: 2nd Lt. G. A. West, 67th Regt.; 2nd Lt. E. W. McCleary, 67th Regiment; 2nd Lieut. E. B. Ross, 67th Regiment; 2nd Lieut. E. E. Wood, 74th Regiment.

A Halifax despatch says: The Royal Reserve Regiment, now being formed in England, will relieve the third Royal Canadian Regiment on this station. The reserve regiment is composed of men of all regiments in the British service, who are about finishing their time, and has no young men in the ranks. The transfer will probably take place before two months. Two companies of the 3rd R. C. R. will remain in Halifax to form an infantry school, one company will go to St. John (N. B.), one to Montreal, one to Ottawa, the balance to British Columbia and the west.

The Junction Picnic.

Rev. H. E. Dibblee was in the city yesterday making arrangements for the annual church of England picnic to be held at Fredericton Junction on the 27th inst. The picnic is to be held on the Lutz intervalle, and will be an all day affair. An attractive list of sports and amusements has been prepared and dinner and tea will be served on the grounds. The Fredericton brass band has been engaged to furnish the music. There will be special rates on the Fredericton branch railway for those wishing to attend the picnic, and the houseboat Vivian C., is to make a trip up the Oromocto river, starting at seven o'clock, a. m.

Sunday School Picnics.

The annual picnic of the Church of England Sunday school is being held today on Mr. Taylor's grounds at Sheffield. A very large crowd accompanied by the band of the R. C. R., went down on the Steamer Victoria this morning, and will return by the David Weston this evening.

The Baptist Sunday school picnic is being held today at Swan Creek, Sunbury County. The steamer Aberdeen with a large party on board, left here at 8.30 this morning, for the picnic grounds and will return at seven o'clock this evening.

Police Court.

The Bolter lad, who is in jail on a charge of burglarizing S. H. McFarlane's residence, was further remanded by Col. Marsh this morning until Friday.

A hack driver was convicted of an assault upon an employee of the C. P. R. station and was fined \$4 and costs.

The case against a St. Marys resident, who is accused of stealing grass, was stood over until next Tuesday.

THE GAME OUTLOOK.

A Large Influx of American Sportsmen Expected this Autumn.

The big game outlook for the approaching season is very bright, and there promises to be an unusually large influx of American sportsmen to the New Brunswick woods during the months of September and October. Henry Braithwaite, the veteran guide, is now at his camps on the Little Southwest, getting ready for the fall campaign. He has arranged to start out early next month in company with Fred Irland of Washington, and N. T. Depauw, a prominent western sportsman, both of whom will remain in the woods until the end of October. Mr. Irland has been almost an annual visitor to the big game regions of New Brunswick for ten years, and has done much to make this country known to the sportsmen of the United States. Mr. Depauw had his first hunting trip to New Brunswick last fall, and so pleased was he, that before returning home, he engaged Mr. Braithwaite for this season. He also arranged to come on a fishing trip in June, but remained at home on the advice of Mr. Braithwaite, who found the conditions unfavorable for a successful outing at that time.

Adam Moore, the heavyweight guide of Scotch Lake, is to leave tomorrow for the Tobique region, and does not expect to see home again until the end of November. He has two Providence sportsmen coming the latter part of the month, to remain all through September, fishing and hunting under his guidance. His son, John Moore, who is also a very capable guide, will take out an American party early in September, and several parties are booked for the month of October.

Edwin B. Holmes, a Boston sportsman who has hunted on the Northwest Miramichi with great success for many years, has arranged to spend the month of September in that locality, and will have his son for a companion. Arthur Pringle of Stanley, his guide of former years, will again look after his interests.

The western side of the St. John river, which has been closed for moose hunting for several years, is to be thrown open this fall, and no doubt there will be a number of American sportsmen visit that locality. The best moose ground on the west side is in the Maguagadavic region, York county, and hunters in that section this fall should stand a good chance of getting their game. C. L. Tracey, deputy crown land surveyor, whose duties take him to that locality quite frequently, says that moose are more plentiful there now than for many years. The close season for duck and woodcock expires on September 1st, and local sportsmen are eagerly looking forward to that date. The open season for partridges commences on September 15th, and the outlook for this class of game is said to be very favorable. The big game season also begins on September 15th.

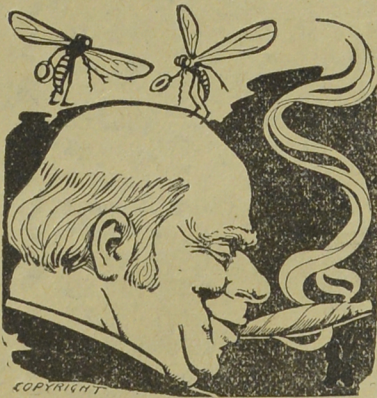
