

WELCOMED AT HALIFAX.

Canadian Mounted Rifles Received
With Enthusiasm on Arrival From
South Africa.

Halifax, July 22.—The big troopship Winnifredian, with the second C. M. R., and Field Hospital Corps and nurses on board, arrived early this morning from Durban. The trip was made in less than 24 days, and was characterized by beautiful weather. With the exception of a case or two of slight colds, not a man was sick, and the members of the second C. M. R., return in fine health, brown as berries and proud of their record.

Lieutenant Markham of St John, remains in South Africa. He is engaged in railway work.

The regiment is more than 100 under strength, through casualties, invalidings and men remaining behind in South Africa.

The imperial and Canadian services paymasters went on board the ship early. A lot of flags and bunting flew throughout the city in honor of the arrival of Colonel Evans and his gallant men, and much of the shipping was decorated with bunting.

Large numbers of troopers managed to get ashore, some landed as early as 5 o'clock, and were soon stirring about the city to the great delight of the cab men. Crowds of citizens gathered about the streets expecting to see the troops parade, and were disappointed.

The troopship, which anchored at quarantine on arrival, remained there till 2 p. m., when she moved up harbor and docked at north side of No. 3 pier, deep water terminus, and, shortly after 3 o'clock, the gangways were got out and the men started to disembark.

A guard of honor and the band of the R.C.R. were at the wharf, and the band played the Maple Leaf and other selections as the men came ashore. Governor Jones, Admiral Douglas, General Sir Charles Parsons, and staff; Lieutenant-Colonel Humphrey, D. O. C., and staff; the mayor and aldermen and a number of militia officers welcomed Colonel Evans and the troops of the landing pier.

A special train to convey them west was in waiting, but it was several hours before the men had been collected many having gone in town with friends. The special, however, got away about 6 30 o'clock in the evening. The men were given a rousing send off. Quite a number of men missed the train.

The regiment reached Halifax in a sorry plight so far as underclothing was concerned. Some one nicknamed them the shirtless brigade, for practically none of the men wore shirts. They had none to wear. When they reached Durban, from which port the Winnifredian sailed, the stock of underclothing possessed by the men was filthy and worn out, and a new supply was expected, but no new stock was given out and all the way from Africa to Halifax few of the men had a shirt to their name.

A complete fit out was purchased in this city and served out, so that the men now have shirts, unless going so long without them they became accustomed to doing without and are still shirtless.

LOST IN THE WOODS.

Experience of a Young Woman in Restigouche County.

Dalhousie, July 22.—William Cook, farmer and postmaster of Black Lands, Restigouche county, accompanied by his 18-year-old daughter, started from his house at 5 o'clock Monday morning to search for missing cows. When in the woods they became separated and when Mr. Cook reached home at 10 o'clock he was alarmed to find that his daughter was not there. As he had had quite an experience in reaching home he at once thought his daughter had lost her way, so he notified the neighbors and a posse of 40 men turned out to search for her. They scoured the woods for several hours and finally came upon Miss Cook sitting upon the side of an old portage road. She had heard the calls of the search party and sat down to await their arrival. In her wanderings she had traveled to a spot more than eight miles from her home, having gone through a patch of dense woods five miles in extent. When found she was very much exhausted and her face and hands were badly cut and scratched, the result of contact with the bushes.

FIVE THOUSAND GUESTS.

Immense Gathering at Lord Salisbury's Garden Party

London, July 19.—Five special trains took a thousand distinguished persons to a garden party at Hatfield House (Hertfordshire, the seat of the former Premier), today, and 5,000 guests in all were present. Lord Salisbury's guests included the Cabinet Ministers, Indian Princes, members of the diplomatic corps, including all the officials of the United States Embassy, and a number of Peers and members of the House of Commons.

No social event of coronation year has exceeded the brilliancy of the scene and the personnel of the gathering. Lady Gwendolin Cecil, daughter of Lord Salisbury, assisted the former Prime Minister in receiving his five thousand guests beyond the archway leading to the south front of the house. The Grenadier Band was stationed on the lawn, which was dotted with many colored marquees, in which refreshments were served.

THE BISLEY MEETING.

Canadian Marksmen Meeting With
Some Success—The Kolapore
Scores.

Toronto, July 22.—The Telegram's cable from Bisley Camp says: After having shot at 600 yards, the last range in the first stage of the King's prize competition, nine Canadians will qualify for the second stage, which will take place Friday.

Canada stood at the top in the 500 yds. range for the Kolapore cup, but fell away behind at 600 yards. Lance Corporal Mortimer did phenomenal shooting, making the largest individual score of any team. His total at the three ranges was 102 out of a possible 105, seven shots each, distance, 200, 500 and 600 yards. The individual scores of the members of the Canadian team were:

The total scores of the teams competing were: Canada, 756; Australia, 770; Mother Country, 755; Natal, 746; Rhodesia, 758; Gurnsey, 748; New Zealand, 744; India, 708; West Indies; 602.

Canadians figure in the Keystone Burgundy prize list; Sergeant Skedden of Hamilton, was awarded second place, winning £6; Sergeant Bayles, Royal Grenadiers, fourth, £2; Lance Corporal Mortimer, seventh; Sergeant Perry, eighth, each winning £2; Captain Davidson, tenth, and Pte. Peddie in twentieth place, won £1 each.

Captain King, 46th Battalion, took 13th position in the Premier, 600 yards, with eight shots, and won £2; Captain Davidson, in 27th place, got £1.

In the Armors' Company match, Sergeant Smith landed fourth place, prize of £2. Captain Rennie, fifth position, and Captain Davidson, eighth, also won £2. Captain Marzette, 10th; Sergeant Bayles, 15th; Captain Mitchell, 16th and Major Spearing added £1 each to their winnings in this match.

Captain Mitchell took seventh place in the competition for the Wimbledon Cup and won £3. Captain Rennie, in eighth place, also got £3, and Captain King, in 15th place, got £2.

The Raymond and Whitcombe excursionists took their departure for St. John this morning by the steamer David Weston, and go from there to Nova Scotia. Several members of the party with whom the Herald conversed expressed themselves as being delighted with Fredericton, their only regret being that they could not make a longer visit. 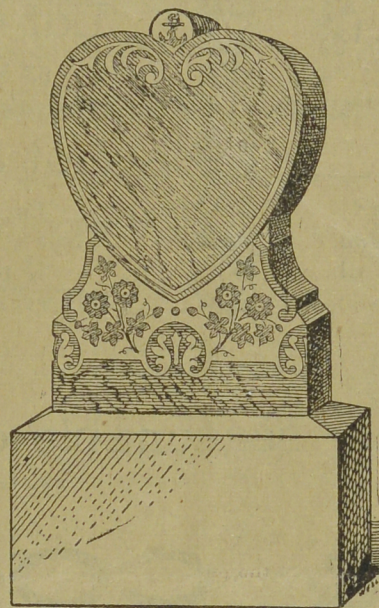

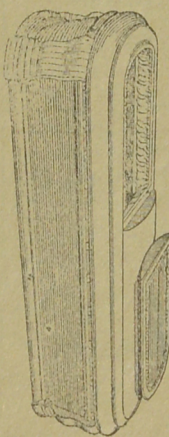
