## THE CASE OF LaFOREST.

Some of the opposition are weeping because of alleged ill-treatment of Mr. LaForest in the local budget debate. For instance the Moncton Times says:

"It is well known that the member for Madawaska has not for some time enjoyed very good health and when he rose at a late hour on Tuesday night in the budget debate it was evident to his friends that he could not do justice to the subject. At midnight Mr. LaForest asked for an adjournment in order that he might conclude the following day, but this the Premier refused. It was a physical impossibility for Mr. LaForest to continue and he was obliged to bring his speech to an abrupt close. Such an exhibition of arrogance and boorishness is not creditable to the Premier, but perhaps nothing better was to be expected."

The Times drew on its imagination for the above statement. Mr. LaForest commenced to speak at ten o'clock in the evening, and when he had been going about half an hour asked for an adjournment, which the premier quite properly declined to grant. He and the house were anxious to get the debate through, and could see no good reason why it should be stopped at such a comparatively early hour to suit the convenience of Mr. LaForest or anybody else. The member for Madawaska proceeded with his address, speaking nearly two hours altogether, and after he had concluded three speakers on the Government side continued the debate until one o'clock in the morning. The Opposition papers have sought to convey the impression that as soon as Mr. LaForest finished the premier was willing to adjourn the debate, but such was not the case, as the record will show.

If Mr. LaForest's contribution to the debate was so important why have not the Opposition papers published it.

## A GOOD EXAMPLE.

Commenting on the result of the election in Beauharnois, the Toronto Globe says: "The result is exceedingly satisfactory from many standpoints. A direct appeal was made to French electors to reject Mr. Loy because he was English and Protestant. It was argued that no English and Protestant constituency in Ontario would elect a French-Canadian. The Liberals, and particularly Mr. Tarte, met the issue squarely and courageously, and seemed to have no difficulty in persuading the French electors of Beauharnois to set aside all such unworthy appeals to their racial sympathies. Mr. Tarte's utterances were broad and courageous, and all Canada should be grateful for the example he set in this contest. He was representing the ideals to which Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been faithful from his very entrance into public life thirty years ago. On the other hand, it is fair to point out that for two Parliaments a French-Canadian has presided over the Ontario Legislature, with the general approval and to the complete satisfaction of both political parties in this Province. The truth is that, except when demagogues seek to play upon racial and sectarian prejudices for party purposes, there is small fault to be found with the relations that now obtain between the races in Canada, and certainly Quebec does not need to take lessons in toleration from any of the English-speaking Provinces."

King Christian of Denmark, father of the Queen of Great Britain is about to celebrate the 85th anniversary of his birth, and there will be a great gathering of royalties for the event.

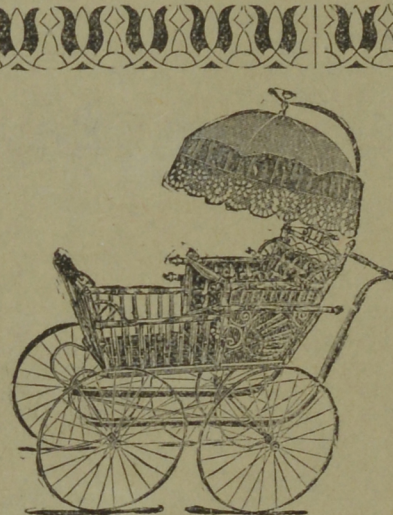
