

AWFULLY SAD

Husband and Wife at
Moncton in Apparently
Good Health

DIED WITHIN A FEW HOURS OF
EACH OTHER.

Sat at Breakfast Together Sun-
day Morning and Now Both
are Cold in Death.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Moncton, Mar. 31.—One of the saddest incidents in the history of Moncton occurred yesterday.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Gallagher ate breakfast together yesterday morning. During the forenoon Mrs. Gallagher was taken ill and a physician was summoned. She became rapidly worse, however, and passed away during the afternoon. Paralysis or hemorrhage of the brain is the supposed cause of death.

During the afternoon Mr. Gallagher who had been in perfect health, was taken ill. At night he grew worse and died about two o'clock this morning, just twelve hours after the death of his wife. The cause of death is unknown.

Deceased was foreman shunter in the Moncton I. C. R. yard and leaves a father and two brothers. Mrs. Gallagher was a Miss Boyle, of Bloomfield, Kings Co.

CIVIC MATTERS.

Interesting Information Disclosed in the
Published Accounts.

The city blue book has at last made its appearance and copies may be had on application to the city clerk. The most striking feature of its contents is the large defaulters' list, representing no less than \$13,718.63, due the city in taxes. Of this amount \$1,533.38 is for the year 1900 and the balance is for 1901. The amount collected in dog taxes during the year was \$323, out of which \$64 was paid in commissions to be policemen. The total amount collected for miscellaneous licenses was \$289, the Pan-American circus contributing \$115. The sum of \$36 was collected for drag licenses, \$50 for wagon licenses and \$90 for auctioneers' licenses. The revenue from ground rent amounted to \$843.75. The gross payments in connection with the city hall amounted to \$1,902.96, against receipts of \$1,122.45, leaving a deficit of \$780.51. The expenditure on administration of justice was \$3,370.47, and the receipts in fines and fees amounted to \$3,171.19. The receipts from wharves amounted to \$441, and from the sale of sewer permits \$22.50. The total liabilities of the city are estimated at \$287,977.35, against which there are assets valued at \$336,434.

EASTER SUNDAY.

How the Day Was Observed in the City Churches.

The Easter services in the different churches of the city yesterday were of a specially interesting character and despite the inclement weather had a good attendance. Rev. Dr. Chapman was the preacher at the Methodist church in the morning and Rev. J. J. Teasdale in the evening. A splendid programme of hymns and anthems was rendered by the choir. The church was tastefully decorated for the occasion.

At the Baptist church, Rev. J. H. McDonald occupied the pulpit both morning and evening, and preached sermons appropriate to the occasion. The pulpit platform was banked with potted plants and presented a most attractive appearance. Special music was rendered by the choir.

At the Free Baptist church the services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. F. C. Hartley, and were of a very interesting character. The church was attractively decorated with potted plants.

The services at the Cathedral, as usual, were of a most interesting and appropriate character. Very Rev. Dean Partridge was the preacher, and his remarks were attentively listened to. The choir, under the leadership of Prof. Saunders, rendered a splendid program of Easter music.

At St. Ann's Church in the morning service was conducted by Rector Roberts. The officers and men of the R. C. R. were present in uniform.

At St. Paul's there was communion service in the morning with sermon by pastor McDonald. The choir rendered a special program of Easter music at the evening service.

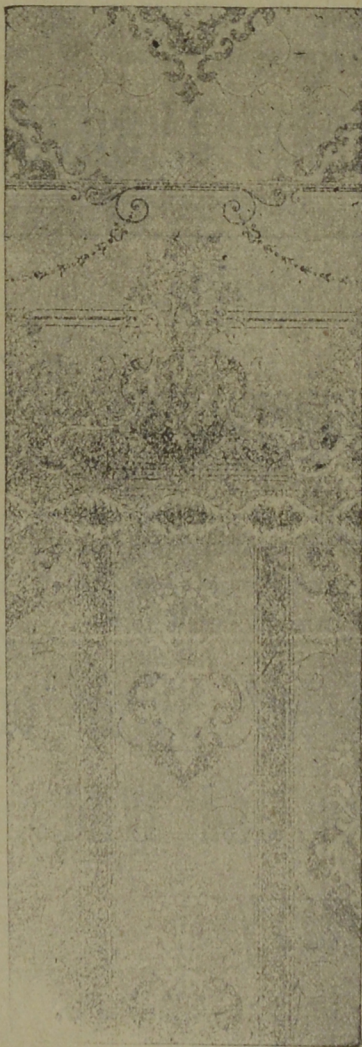
Funeral Yesterday.
