Premier Tweedie Tells of What was Effected at Quebec.

PROVINCIAL SUBSIDIES.

Effort to Secure an Increase.

Montreal, Dec. 23.—Hon L J Tweedie, premier of New Brunswick, and Hon. William Pugsley, attorney-general, arrived last evening from Quebec, where they have been attending the inter-provincial conference, and left for New Brunswick by the Canadian Pacific.

In an interview Premier Tweedie said that he was greatly pleased with the result of the inter-provincial conference.

The unanimity with which the ministers had been able to arrive at a plan of readjustment of the provincial subsidies which would do equal justice, as well to the large provinces of Ontario and Quebec, as to the five smaller ones, and the evident desire manifested by all the representatives to ask for only such readjustment as would be likely to be regarded as reasonable by the dominion government was, he said, especially gratifying.

Premier Tweedie stated that they had been materially assisted in arriving at an agreement by reason of the very exhaustive manner in which the relations between the dominion and the provinces had been dealt with by the inter-provincial conference in 1887, in which such eminent and experienced statesmen as Sir Oliver Mowatt, Mr. Blair and Mr. Fielding had taken the leading part.

Mr. Tweedie stated that it was understood that the resolutions adopted by the conference would not be made public until they were submitted to the dominion government, but he felt sure that the people of New Brunswick as well as those of the rest of the dominion were desirous of seeing the finances of the provinces placed upon a proper basis in order that the provincial governments may more efficiently discharge the important duties devolving upon them under the British North America act relating to education, agriculture, maintenance of roads, bridges and wharves, assistance to railways and other local enterprises which are required in the interest of the people, and would heartily approve of the conclusions arrived at.

Your correspondent also asked Premier Tweedie regarding the fisheries question and the right of the provinces of Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island to receive the amount of the Halifax award.

Mr. Tweedie replied that this subject had also been further considered by the representatives of the provinces interested. The minister of justice, who was in Quebec at the time of the conference, had agreed to recommend to the council the submission of a case to the Supreme Court of Canada, in order to have the rights of the provinces and the dominion in the in-shore fisheries more clearly defined. This case would also determine the question of

the right to the Halifax award. He had no doubt whatever that the amount of the award belonged to the provinces, and if the provinces succeeded, as he had no doubt they would, the portion coming to New Brunswick would, with interest, amount to about \$2,000,000.

The Attorney-General, of New Brunswick had prepared a very exhaustive brief on the subject, which was submitted to the conference, and he believed that any lawyer of standing would say that it was unanswerable.

Premier Tweedie referred in warm terms to the hospitalities which had been extended to him and the other provincial representatives by the Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec, likewise by Premier Parent and his colleagues, and by the Quebec Board of Trade, all of whom had done everything possible to make their visit to that most interesting and charming city a delightful one.

MARRIED A TITLE.

Miss Violet Twining, Former Fredericton Lady,

WEDDED TO MARQUIS OF DONEGAL—80 YEARS OLD.

Union Created a Sensation in London.

London, Dec. 23.—Miss Violet Twining, of Fredericton, N. B., who was presented at the King's first court by Lady Strathcona, was married today to the Marquis of Donegal, who is 80 years of age.

The civil marriage service was performed yesterday afternoon.

The marriage has caused quite a sensation.

The brother of the Marquis, who supposed himself direct heir, has opposed the marriage.

The wedding took place at St. George's church, Hanover Square, and the bride was given in marriage by Lord Strathcona.

[Miss Twining, or as she is now, the Marchioness of Donegal, is well known in Fredericton, having resided here some years ago with her mother, Mrs. Ada Twining, widow of H. St. George Twining of Halifax. The bride is a native of Halifax and on her mother's side is a granddaughter of the late Mr. Chas. Black, of that city, who was a brother of the late Mrs. (Governor) Wilmot and Mrs. Edward H. Wilmot of this city. With her mother, Mrs. Twining, she went to England from here about three years ago and shortly afterwards left for Capetown, where Miss Twining became engaged to Captain Dangers a British army officer who, however, died in England a few months later, leaving a considerable fortune to his affianced. The young lady is also sole heir prospective to her mother's estate, which is a valuable one, including considerable property in Fredericton.

The new Marchioness, a very bright, handsome and attractive lady, is about twenty years of age, and was a general favorite among her friends in Fredericton. She has resided with her mother in England for the past two years, and created quite a sensation when presented at court by Lady Strathcona, her picture appearing in the London Illustrated papers.]

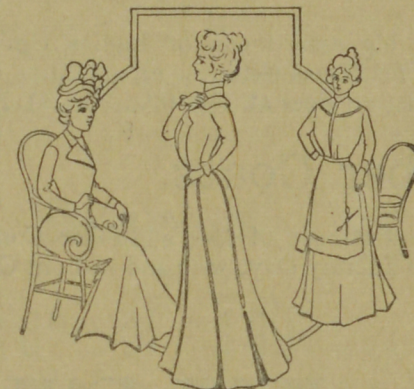
