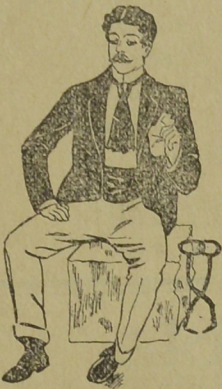

COURT IN HOLYROOD.

Historical Old Palace in Scotland Being Set in Order—Has Been Uninhabited for Over a Century.

Holyrood Palace, once the home of Mary Queen of Scots, but practically uninhabited for over a century, is waking up now, much as the enchanted palace in the story of the "Sleeping Beauty" did when the prince aroused the King's daughter with a kiss. The great kitchens of the ancient royal residences in Edinburgh, in which for 150 years nothing has been cooked, are now in the hands of an army of workmen, being cleaned, repaired and equipped with modern cooking utensils, preparatory to being taken possession of by a staff of cooks capable of catering for unlimited guests. All the other apartments of the palace with the exception of two or three which will be left undisturbed on account of their historical interest, also are being refurbished and refitted in the restoration of their splendours.

All these changes are being made at Holyrood, because King Edward means to hold court in the stately pile from time to time in the future, and possibly may preside, in accordance with ancient usage, over the next General Assembly of the Scottish Peers, known as the "Parliament of the Kirk," held there annually. The last royal resident at Holyrood was Prince Charles Edward, the "Young Pretender," who held court there for a short time in his invasion of Scotland, in 1745.

Queen Victoria and the Georges III. and IV. made short visits to the old palace, too, and the glories of the levee held by the latter sovereign are remembered throughout Scotland to this day. It was attended by over 2,000 Scotch men and women of high degree, who were delighted to find the King wearing Highland costume. Some of the burly Scots, it is true, were inclined to approach their sovereign with more regard for heartiness than for strict court etiquette, but George IV. had a sense of humor, and was considerably more tickled than offended by his guests' bluntness.

It was at Holyrood that Darnley, the husband of Queen Mary, had Rizzio murdered, and it was in the little house near by that he himself was blown up with gunpowder as he lay ill in bed with smallpox, a proceeding in which his royal spouse was popularly supposed to be implicated, as she had sworn to avenge her secretary. The royal apartments at the palace, with the exception of the Queen's bedchamber, have been occupied of late by the hereditary keeper of the palace, as he is called.

In these rooms few alterations will be made. The Queen's sleeping room never has been disturbed. It contains her great four-posted bed, canopied and hung with rich curtains, as well as several articles of old-fashioned furniture, and its walls are hung with tapestry, part of which conceals the small door leading to the flight of stairs that the Queen used in going to and from prayers in the abbey, which now stands in ruins beside the palace. Up this narrow stairway crept the band of assassins whom Darnley hired to make away with Rizzio. The King himself led them into his wife's cabinet and held the queen firmly while her secretary was done to death. The murderers stabbed him 56 times with their daggers.

The folk who live in the neighborhood of the palace affirm positively that the spirit of the beheaded Queen makes nightly visits to the scene of her former activity, and this romantic belief is substantiated by the remarkable experience of the late Countess of Salisbury.

asserted that she not only saw the Queen, but had a long interview with her. The countess, who was, by the way, an ardent spiritist, got permission to spend a night in the apartments of the long dead royal lady, and she related afterwards that as the moon was shining brightly she determined to visit Mary's old chapel, and did so by ascending the famous, winding staircase and going on to the ruined altar before which Darnley and the Queen were married.

At that moment the Queen appeared before her and addressed her at some length on the subject of her sufferings while in the flesh, being apparently not at all incommenced in conversing by the fact that she carried her head in one hand. The countess was so struck by the way in which the Queen defended herself against the charges history makes against her that she wrote a book about the interview and presented a copy of it to Queen Victoria, who remarked to her friend, Lady Ely, that she found it very interesting and "so amusing."

The Artist and the Duke.

When Gustave Dore was at the height of his fame he visited England, and Blanchard Jerrold took him to a public dinner for one of the literary charities. The Duke of Cambridge was in the chair. Jerrold suggested to the secretary that he should arrange for his Grace to speak of the famous French artist when proposing the toast of the visitors.

"Just write the gentleman's name on a slip of paper, and I'll put it under the Duke's eye." Whereupon Jerrold wrote "Distinguished visitor—Gustave Dore," but unfortunately marked the accent over the surname's last letter so faintly that it was invisible to His Royal Highness. Presently, hot and anxious, the secretary came back to Jerrold. "By all means, says the Duke, but who the devil is Dore?"

Jerrold had to make this clear, and did so on another slip of paper, with the words, "Gustave Dore is the celebrated French painter whose pictures are the admiration of the whole civilized world."

The Duke is too much a man of the world not to have accepted the snub with gracious savoir faire, and he did full honor to Dore in a kindly and appreciative reference to the guest—and did not forget the accent.

Look how they stand!

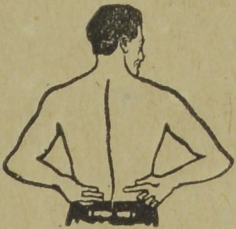
They regal rule where tropic heat

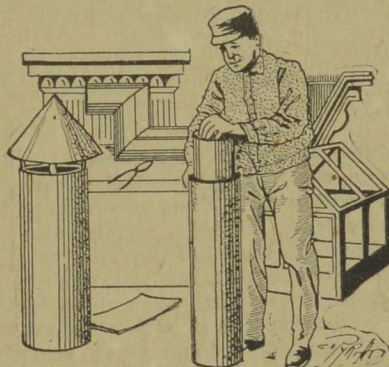
