The Grand Orange Lodge of New Brunswick adjourned at 4.30 o'clock this morning after an all night's session, during which considerable business was transacted.

The election of officers for the ensuing year took place early in the evening, resulting as follows:

The above named were installed into office by Col. A. J. Armstrong, Past Deputy Grand Master of British North America.

C. N. Skinner of St. John was a candidate for Grand Master and received 33 votes against 52 cast for Mr. Thomas.

After the installation a sumptuous luncheon was served in the lodge room by the members of local lodges.

Upon the resumption of business, considerable time was taken up in discussing propagation work, and it was decided in order that the work could be carried on to better advantage, to divide the province into seven districts, each to be under the supervision of a grand lodge officer. The divisions are to be as follows:

Section 1—Carleton and Victoria counties.

Section 2—York, Sunbury and Queens, west.

Section 3—St. John, Charlotte and Queens, east.

Section 4—Kings and Albert.

Section 5—Westmorland and Kent.

Section 6—Northumberland and Gloucester.

Section 7—Restigouche.

Grand Master Thomas, Secretary Morrison, H. H. Pitts and Col. Armstrong were appointed to have charge of the funds for carrying on propagation work in the above divisions.

It was decided to hold the next annual meeting at Osham, on the second Tuesday in March.

The majority of the delegates returned home by this morning's train.

GREAT MUSICAL TREAT.

The Chapman Concert Enjoyed by a Large and Cultured Audience.

"The most enjoyable musical event of the season," is the unanimous verdict of those who composed the large and fashionable audience present at the Chapman concert at the opera house last evening. People who went there anticipated a great treat and their most sanguine expectations were more than realized. The chorus work was superb, as also were the selections by the trio of talented artists who accompanied Prof. Chapman to the city.

Mr. Francis Archambault, the talented basso, was down on the program for two numbers, and a considerate audience let him off a triple encore on each occasion. He possesses a magnificent voice over which he seems to have complete control, and his selections given in French and English, took immensely with the audience.

Mademoiselle Josefa, the young violinist, showed perfect mastery of her instrument, and was not long in winning her way into the good graces of the audience. She was encored at every appearance, and responded cheerfully to all the demands made upon her.

Madam Bouton, the gifted soprano, more than sustained the high reputation which had preceded her to this city. She possesses a fine stage presence and a voice of great range and sweetness. Her selections were mostly in the French language, but on one occasion in response to a second encore she sang Annie Laurie in a manner which took the audience by storm.

For a closing number, Madam Bouton

and Mr. Archambault rendered a duet, which elicited rapturous applause.

The selections by the chorus club were of the first quality and several times had to be repeated to satisfy the demands of the audience.

Prof. Cadwallader assisted Prof. Chapman conductor, and Miss Beatrice Fenety played the accompaniments for the choruses. Mrs. Black took a solo in good style.

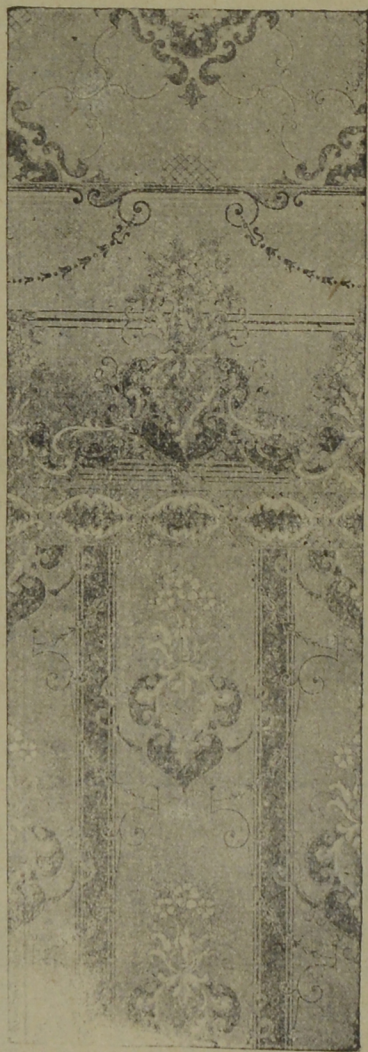
Montreal, March 20.—Stewart S. Campbell, an insurance agent, was found dead today in his home, 50 Crescent street. The police are working on the case. It is not known whether it is murder or suicide.

The Japanese Wax Tree.

"Japan wax," as it is called, is obtained from a tree, Rhus succedanea, which is found in Japan, China and throughout the East Indies in general. In the Japanese language it is called haje or haze. The tree commences to bear fruit when five or six years old and increases its product every year till at the age of fifty years a single tree will produce 350 to 400 pounds of berries, from which seventy to eighty pounds of wax can be obtained.

The wax is formed in the middle of the berry, between the skin and the seed, like the pulp of a grape. It is extracted by boiling the berries in water and allowing it to cool, when the wax separates from the skin and seed, sinking to the bottom of the vessel in a solid cake. The specific gravity of this wax is .970 and its melting point 131 degrees F. It is largely used, either alone or mixed with tallow, by the Chinese in the manufacture of candles.

This tree should not be confounded with the "tallow tree" of China, which has a pith of solid tallow in all trees that have fully matured.
