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CECIL RHODES' WILL.

Views of a Couple of Canadian Educationalists.

PRINCIPAL GRANT ATTACHES LITTLE IMPORTANCE TO IT.

But by Dr. Parkin It is More Favorably Viewed.

Kingston, April 10.—Principal Grant is not an admirer of the late Cecil Rhodes, and when asked this evening for an expression of his opinion on the Imperial aspect of the will of the deceased he remarked, with some degree of vigor:—"In my opinion a great deal of nonsense, or rather inflated language, has been used with reference to it, especially in the London press. I believe the effects will be by no means as great as the papers seem to imagine. But it is perhaps better not to discuss a will until its full text is before us. However, so far as reported, not a few of his notions seem to me to be impracticable and characteristic of the egotism of the man. My opinion of Mr. Rhodes has not been changed in the slightest by his will, but it may be better to say nothing now about a man who is dead and not buried. I do not believe that Imperialism, in the true sense of the word, is likely to be permanently benefited by the legacies of Mr. Rhodes, any more than the people of Rome were benefited by the few drachmae which Caesar left to each citizen by his will."

Ottawa, April 10.—Dr. G. R. Parkin, who is in Ottawa as the guest of the Governor-General, was asked this evening by The Globe correspondent what he thought of the bequests made by the late Cecil Rhodes. Dr. Parkin said:—

During his recent visit to Canada, Earl Grey, who is Chairman of the British South African Company, and was one of the great imperialist's most intimate friends, said to me very positively that Mr. Rhodes' character would stand out in British history in a very striking light. I was greatly impressed at the time with the emphasis that Earl Grey laid upon this point, and now I appreciate better what he meant. I look upon Mr. Rhodes' will as quite in keeping with the great ideas which influenced him all through life. For some years past I have very strongly had the feeling that a little lack of scrupulousness had ruined one of the greatest careers that our age had known, and that the Jameson raid was the gravest mistake to which any public man of modern times had lent himself. It is a great relief to find that Mr. Rhodes has taken such a noble way of rehabilitating himself in the opinion of the nation to which he belonged. If he made a mistake he has redeemed himself in a very noble way. He was certainly a man who took a world-view, and when he died I expressed the opinion that he would make some great use of his wealth—that he was a man quite above the ordinary idea of leaving his wealth entirely to his own family—and I am delighted that he has justified this opinion which I held about him.

"It seems to me that the educational plan which Mr. Rhodes has outlined is likely to have a profound and far reaching effect. It is stated, but I do not know how true it is, that his bequests will provide for three hundred students from various parts of the world at Oxford. This means about one-tenth of all the men in residence at that great institution. The provision is liberal for the individual, and will enable a man to live at Oxford and to get all the advantages. Three hundred picked students from all parts of the British-speaking world, inspired as they naturally would be with the idea that sent them there, ought certainly to be felt as a force in that great centre of learning. Plans like this justify the possession of great wealth, and give a new lease of life to millionaires. The world will be quite content to see vast fortunes piled up if they are used for ends so unselfish and so noble as we have outlined in Mr. Rhodes' will. I think the provision made for students from the United States must influence American opinion in its relation to Britain. It is one of these germ ideas which will impress the imagination of the world and will gradually have a profound effect upon men's way of thinking. I, therefore, feel that it will

go a great distance towards promoting a closer relation between the two branches of the Anglo-Saxon race, and so far it is an exceedingly good thing. There is evidently a mistake made about the way in which the Canadian scholarships are distributed, but I believe that the trustees, who embrace men like Lord Grey, Lord Milner and Lord Rosebery, have discretion to modify the conditions to a certain extent, and I have no doubt that when the proper representation is made to them the distribution of these scholarships through all parts of Canada will be properly provided for.

"The gift of a residence and the means of supporting it for the Premier of a confederated South Africa is another splendid move. With this to direct the thoughts of the politicians, who are promoting the future of South Africa, and with the romance which will naturally gather round the tomb of Mr. Rhodes on the hills in the centre of South Africa, I feel that our grip upon that great continent will be enormously strengthened. It is another of those things which will appeal to the imagination of generations to come."

DROWNING ACCIDENT.

George Trafton, of Tobique, Loses His Life by the Upsetting of a Bateau.

A party of twelve men in a bateau, while crossing the Tobique river at Plaster Rock, April 5, met with a sad accident. They had been stretching a carrier wire across the river, with the aid of a warp. After the wire had been safely placed in position, the party started down river, the boat coming in contact with the warp which had not been removed, turned the bateau broad side, capsized it, throwing the men into the river. By the prompt action of Mr. Hale, and others, boats were quickly launched, and all but one man was saved. The unfortunate man was not missed for an hour after the accident, as he was thought to be on his way home, having received orders from the boss to go. On counting up it was found he was one of the party. Immediate search for the body was made, but up to the present time, the body has not been found. The young man's name is Geo. Trafton, a resident of Tobique, age 34 years. He leaves a widow and one child.

Where Canada Can Beat Persia.

Prof. Ward, of the Natural History Museum, of New York, lately returned from a trip through parts of Europe and Asia. While in Persia Mr. Ward was shown a meteorite weighing 113 pounds, which fell in 1880, and which, it was claimed, was the largest ever found. As a token of good will the professor was presented with a piece of it, weighing 2 1-5 pounds, which now safely reposes in the New York Museum, and which, he says, is worth its weight in gold. There are only four meteorites known he says.

If the professor would make a trip to Oakville he could be shown a fifth meteorite, weighing 130 pounds, and which, curiously enough, fell in the same year as the Persian one—1880. The owner of the farm near Oakville, and his family, were sitting on the verandah one evening, when they saw something bright strike the earth 500 yards away, and with a hissing sound, sunk out of sight. The heavy mass had buried itself over seven feet. It was allowed to cool, and afterwards was raised, and now is an object of curiosity to the neighbors. It is as well as the farm is now owned by Mr. Harry Giddings, of the Cedar Grove Stock Farm, who says that Prof. Ward can have it at a slightly less price than its weight in gold.
