USE OF THE POST CARD.

Britain Allows a Privilege Which the Canadian Regulations Forbid.

A correspondent of The London Times draws attention to an interesting point in connection with postcards. It appears that the word "only" has for some time been omitted from the injunction, "The address only to be written on this side." The impression is, however, still general that writing must still be necessarily restricted to the reverse side of the postcard. This is not the case, since, in reply to an inquiry, the secretary of the General Postoffice has written: "Any writing or printing on the address side of a postal packet should be confined to the left-hand half, the right-hand half being reserved exclusively for the address and postage stamps." This is a considerable concession, though we hope that the addressers of postcards will always take pains to let the direction be intelligibly distinct from the writing or printing.

Let anyone should regard the system in Britain as warrant to make similar use of postcards in Canada, it may be stated that the Dominion regulations allow no such liberty. Though the printed instructions on the Canadian postcard do not include the word "only," the act distinctly provides that the stamped side of the card shall be used for the address, "and for this purpose alone." A special business postcard is provided, the address side of which may contain printed advertising matter in a space set apart for that purpose.

Fifty Years of Coaching.

In an experience covering fifty years of public coaching in England the Duke of Somerset never met with an accident. Just for the pleasure of driving he served as coachman at one time or another on nearly every fast mail coach running out of London, sometimes sitting on the box seventeen hours at a stretch. His fancy was for night runs because, he said, the horses were always so lively. Up to the time railways drove the stages off the road he never owned a coach.

A PAN AND A LEOPARD.

An Astonished Woman and a Still More Astonished Animal.

Kula is a district in the Himalayas consisting of a chain of the most lovely valleys conceivable, with this drawback, among others, that each hill path that runs by the inhabitants' huts more often than not contains a lurking leopard. One day a worthy Kula housewife came out from her cooking and, standing on the edge of rock, emptied a pan of boiling water into the rank herbage growing below. It fell splash on the back of a sleeping leopard, who jumped perpendicularly into the air as high as the roof of the hut.

What might have happened next who can say? But the astonished woman dropped the pan with a clang on the rock, and the leopard took one leap down hill. The pan followed, and the leopard's downward leaps became longer and swifter as the pan bounded after it from rock to rock. Dividing a Long Sermon.

Dr. Samuel Buell of the last half of the eighteenth century, who used to preach two or three hours, like Isaac Barrows, was ingenious in detaining his congregation. On one occasion, after preaching nearly two hours—as long as he could feel secure in the presence of all his hearers—he remarked that he was done preaching to sinners and that they were at liberty to go. The rest of his discourse would be addressed to good people.

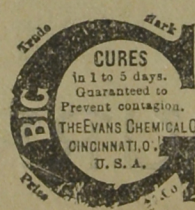
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
