An American paper, noting Ambassador Choate's dinner to the King says that that gentleman has often sat at table with kings and queens and an occasional tennspot.

Gentlemen of the city council who meet this evening — the citizens will be pleased if you make the coronation grant \$600. Every cent of it will be wanted to pay the bills.

The Ontario Tories have met a reverse. Their candidate elected in Algoma was a postmaster, who neglected to resign the job, and is disqualified from holding his seat in the legislature. Ross will probably capture the seat in a new election.

The Halifax Herald and the St. John Sun object to Judge Armour's appointment to the Supreme Court of Canada because he is seventy-two years old. The same newspapers vigorously supported Sir Charles Tupper for the premiership of Canada when he was eighty years old.

Says the Toronto Globe: The Fredericton Herald defends the Canadian coronation contingent from some paper in Quebec which called the men a lot of hayseeds. Surely "hayseed" ought to be a title of honor in a country which is proud to be called "the granary of the empire." Hurrah for the hayseeds, we say.

The report that a plot to assassinate King Edward has been discovered, is probably attributable to the overworked imagination of American correspondents serving up hot stuff for the Associated Press. The King is recovering from his rheumatic troubles and is expected to be in good form for the coronation.

It looks as if the coronation celebration in St. John will be a failure. The firemen, polymorphians and societies refuse to take part, and only the military are left for the parades. The general committee met last night and closed with a wrangle, members of it accusing each other of want of loyalty. The firemen's kickup is due to the fact that no grant has been made them. In the meantime the Herald cordially invites the St. John people to come up to Fredericton and see our big celebration. Everything is running smoothly here and everybody is doing all possible to make the day a notable one.

In an interview at New York before sailing for England, Sir Wilfrid Laurier said he hoped before returning home to have an opportunity of devising some plans for the greater encouragement of emigration to Canada. Canadian emigration has increased materially within the last three years, but it is far below what it should be, when one considers the comparative greatness of the country and the unequalled advantages which it offers, particularly to the agriculturally inclined. Emigration from the United States, he was glad to note, is increasing every year. Fully 50,000 have gone from this country across the border during the last three years, and we will be glad to have all the fifty thousands more she can send.
