CELEBRATED CASE CONCLUDED.

Montreal, June 18.—Today judgment was given in the celebrated military case of Col. Cooke vs. Col. Cole, which arose out of the Valleyfield riots when Cole ordered Cooke's arrest because he refused to parade with his regiment.

A portion of the judgment of the military court upholding Colonel Cooke was published, but that portion of the finding that the colonel had acted hastily, was not published, and Col. Cooke claimed damages for false arrest, and libel in procuring this publication.

The court condemned Col. Cole to pay \$100 damages and the costs of action.

Equity Court Orders.

In the case of A. Stanley Clowes et al. vs. Fred W. McPherson et al., a suit for foreclosure and sale, on motion of C. E. A. Simonds, on behalf of the plaintiffs, the bill was taken pro confesso against all the defendants, except Allen B. Wilmot, for want of an appearance, and against Allen B. Wilmot by consent. The amount due was assessed at \$2,000 principal and \$257.70 interest. The sale of the property was also ordered with leave to the plaintiffs to bid. J. A. Belyea, K. C., appeared for Allen B. Wilmot.

In the suit of Ella O'Jell et al. vs. Robert Macklin, on motion of G. C. Coester an order was made for sale with leave to the plaintiff to bid. The amount due was assessed at \$2,000 principal and \$257.70 interest, and it was ordered that \$6,550.88 be paid to the plaintiff and the balance into court.

Cataract Removed.

City Treasurer Golding who was operated on very successfully by Dr. Vanwart some time ago, for cataract of the eye, is improving rapidly and will be able to resume his duties at the city building in a few days. His eyesight is already much better than it was before the operation.

Ancestors of Some Familiar Plants.

Some well established and interesting facts in botanical history relate to the origin of familiar plants. The ancestor of the large and fleshy cabbage was a veritable pigmy, a small plant weighing altogether scarcely half an ounce; a diminutive little vegetable, reddish in color and bitter in taste, has been metamorphosed into the inestimable potato; the sweet, juicy Altringham carrot, weighing from five to six pounds, is in a wild condition a dry, slender root unfit to eat; the delicate well flavored Vienna glass kohlrabi, as large as a man's fist, is when wild a slender, woody, dry stem; the cauliflower in its natural locality is a thin branched flowering stem, with the little green, bitter flower buds.

Florence Nightingale.

Florence Nightingale was born May 15, 1820, and is yet living in honored retirement at Embley Romsay, Hants, England. She was educated as a nurse by the Protestant Sisters of Mercy at Kaiserswerth-on-the-Rhine, and proceeded to the Crimea in 1854, where she organized the nursing of the sick and wounded soldiers as it had never been attempted before. She received from the nation a testimonial of £50,000, which she devoted to the foundation of the Nightingale Home. She has published several valuable books on nursing.

Tolstoi, a Bicycle and a Theory.

Tolstoi seems to have carried his theories into practice even in the smallest details of life. On one occasion, relates "M.A.P.," he mounted a bicycle belonging to that aristocratic son of his. He soon mastered the art of balance, and was delighted with the swift, smooth motion. His wife noticed his enjoyment, and immediately offered to give him a machine. Tolstoi at first accepted, but, on reconsidering the matter, he decided that as other less-favored mortals could not afford to possess bicycles, he had no right to one either. So he declined the gift and renounced the pleasant exercise.

The Order of the Garter.

The Order of the Garter was founded in 1344—some writers say 1350—by Edward III. The original number of knights was twenty-five, his majesty making the twenty-sixth. The emblem of the order is a dark blue ribbon edged with gold, bearing the motto "Honi soit qui mal y pense" in golden letters, with a buckle and pendant of gold richly chased. It is worn on the left leg below the knee. Regarding the adoption of this emblem and motto the story is that the Countess of Salisbury let fall her garter when dancing with the king and that he picked it up and tied it around his own leg, but that, observing the jealous glances of the queen, he restored it to its fair owner with the exclamation, "Honi soit qui mal y pense!"

Oxford's Bodleian Celebration.

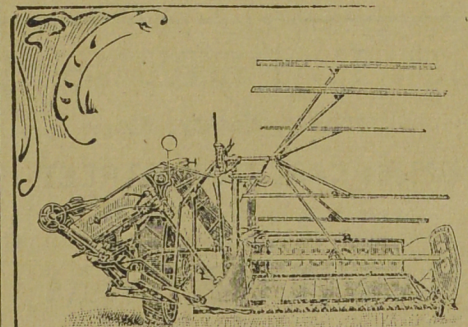
The University of Oxford proposes to celebrate in October next the tercentenary of the opening of the Bodleian library, says The New York Evening Post. The commemoration ceremonies will take place on Oct. 8 and 9, and a very large and distinguished attendance of delegates from all parts of the world is expected at Oxford for the occasion. The Bodleian library was actually founded in 1598, but it was not opened till 1602 by Sir Thomas Bodley, who died in 1612. It contains over 500,000 volumes.

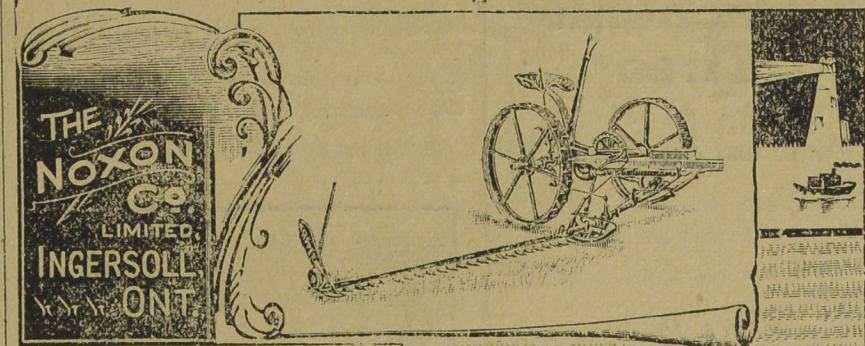
During the war the officers and men of the Gordons have gained seven Victoria Crosses, the highest won by any regiment in the British army during the war.

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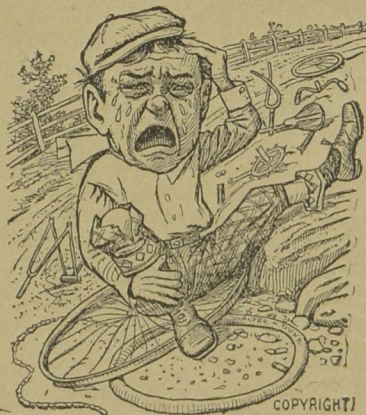
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
